### Rural Free Libraries.

The Democratic General Assembly of 1901 passed an act appropriating \$5,000 to the establishment of rural libraries, says the News and Observer, the number being limited to six in any county, and the conditions being that the district applying for libraries should raise \$10 by private subscription, and that \$10 should be taken from the school fund and \$10 from the state appropriation, making \$30 in all for the library. The general assembly of 1903 appropriated the same amount for the establishment of new libraries upon the same terms, and \$2,500 in addition for supplementing libraries already established, not more than \$15 to be allowed for the supplementary libraries, \$5 from the state appropriation, \$5 from the district fund. Under these two acts of the Democratic General Assembly, eight hundred and thirty-three rural libraries containing about eighty thousand volumes of well selected books, have been established. In addition a number of supplementary libraries have also been established.

LOOK ON THIS PICTURE AND THEN ON THAT AND SAY WHICH WILL YOU TAKE.

The Democratic ticket, as we have heretofore shown, was nominated by the people in open daylight, in open convention, in an open court house, in the presence of the assembled multitude. There was no secrecy or mystery about it. The men chosen are well fitted and qualified for the positions for which they were nominated. They are worthy of the support of every citizen who desires to secure and preserve the blessings of good government. From the very moment they were nominated there has been no doubt as to who were the Democratic candidates. They were our candidates then, they are now, and will be on the day of election. With us there has been no shifting of candidates, no dickering, no trading, no taking one down and putting another up, and indeed, there can be none, for our candidates were put up by the people and nobody can take them down or change them. They are now going from place to place in the open day and in speech telling the people what they stand for and what may be expected of them and the people hear them gladly. That is one picture.

Now look on the other. It is said we are to have an opposition ticket on the day of election. Who knows what that ticket will be? Will it be Republican or Populist or a little of both, or some of neither? Who can now say what names will be on it? Whose name will head it for senator? Will it be our friend who said anything to beat the Democrats, or will it be one who is less outspoken in meeting? Who will be on the ticket for treasurer? Will it be a Republican, a Populist or a skeleton or a fragment of either? In fact, who can tell us who will be on the ticket for any position? The last set of names we heard of bear very little resemblance to the first set of names? A skeleton of the Republican party was first to name its candidates who were to antagonize the Democratic candidates. Then a fragment of the Populist party took a hand in naming candidates. Many of them have been retired and others have swapped about. By whom and how was this done? We know how Mr. W. J. Thigpen, Dr. R. J. Grimes, Dr. J. E. Nobles and Mr. W. L. Smith were retired. They retired themselves. Be it said to their credit they all published cards declining to permit their names to be used in any such connection and for any such purpose. It was manifest that undue liberty had been taken with their names and they were prompt to say so. But how about the other changes that are said to have been made. Who made them and by what authority? What secret agreements and influences brought them about? Who knows? What other changes are to be made before the election and what influences are to bring them about? Who knows?

This much, however, we do know. The people have had nothing to do with making this Republican Populist combination ticket, nor with making the changes in it. They have not been consulted, nor per-

mitted to take any part in it if they had been so inclined to do. We venture the assertion that out of the four thousand white votes in Fitt county there are not today forty who can name the whole of the mongrel ticket they will be asked to vote. On the other hand we venture the further assertion that there are not forty voters who cannot name the men on the Democratic ticket. One ticket will be the outcome of a trade. The other will be the work of the people. Voter, which will you take? It is for you to say.

Roosevelt has found an imitator in North Carolina. A special from Statesville to the Raleigh News and Observer says that J. A. Sisk, the Republican nominee for Senate in that county, has been visiting the homes of negroes and taking meals with them, all sitting at the table together.

James H. Tillman, the slayer of Editor Gonzales at Columbia, S. C., is said to have made application to join the Methodist conference and enter the ministry.

A member of the grand jury at Beaufort county superior court got drunk and the judge sent him to jail. It ought to be a good lesson.

The improvements talked about by the Howland Improvement Company are enough to make everybody along the road glad of the lease.

We have not seen any mention of Maj. Stedman taking part in the campaign over the state.

One thing for Farmers to Do.

Not satisfied with almost absolute control of the prices of tobacco, the three largest tobacco companies, the American Tobacco Company, the Consolidated Tobacco Company and the Continental Tobacco Company, have merged into one great trust. There will be little more competition in the buying of the raw material and the farmers can have very little hope of the future in the way of high prices unless they cut down the production. That is the only way they will be able to hold their own against the big trust.—Wilmington Dispatch.

It is surprising that the Southern people are displaying so much apathy in regard to the coming national election. To our mind it is the important one that has occurred in many years. The South will go solid for Parker, but this fact should not cause any man to lose interest. No Southern man can afford to miss the opportunity of casting a vote against Roosevelt, who has slandered the southern people and tried to force social equality upon them.—Mr. Olive Tribune.

The Raleigh News and Observer which is "on the ground" and doubtless knows says that the Associated Press was in error in stating that the decision of the U. S. supreme court in the South Dakota bond case would validate the other bonds of a like nature to those held by South Dakota. The News and Observer says it will do nothing of the kind.—Greensboro Telegram.

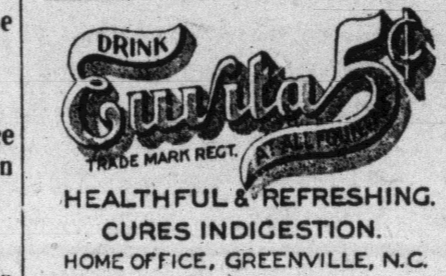
