What a Year Brings Forth.

Last October the three eastern provinces of China were to be evacuated by the troops of Russia, according to a solemn convention, but the promise was cynically disregarded. The efforts of the Japanese and other governments, to say nothing of the Peking Government, to get the Russians to adhere to their engagement were resented and evasive replies were made to requests for fresh assurances. Instead of giving re-assurance, Russia seized new points and made clear her intention to hold the country by military force. Hence the present war, which, in the short space of one year, has shown that Russia's insolence to China and disregard of the rights of other nations was insufficiently backed with force. Force often makes good a title which is morally defective, but Russia has failed to "make good," having overrated her might. Her sense of duty, or care for veracity was insufficient to take her out of Manchuria when she promised to go, but little Japan has been able to expel her from the best part of it. The race is not always to the swift, nor the battle to the strong if swiftness and strength are not supplemented by intellectual and moral soundness.—Baltimore Sun.

The Charlotte Observer gives account of an unusual mortgage executed in that county. A man borrowed \$40 and to secure the loan gave a chattel mortgage on 160 hens, putting the value of the fowls at 25 cents each. That looks like 'pretty fair security. It is not stated whether the mortgage includes the "increase" of the hens; as we remember to have been the case once in Pitt county when a mortgage was given on a sow.

THE REFLECTOR wants to again urge every Democrat in the county to register and vote. This is the last week of registration and the books will close Saturday, 29th. All who have not registered should do so at once. And just because the Democrats are going to carry the county by a large majority anyway is no reason any one should stay away from the polls. Every township should do its best to get every voter out. The coming election gives the townships and the county their standing in conventions for the next four years, the number of delegates being based on the number of votes cast. Do not stay away from the polls, but every man go and vote on election day.

The effort of Republicans to drive votes from Hon. F. D. Winston, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, by means of the cartoon associating him with the negro George White, and giving a letter purporting to have been written by him to White, are falling short of the work. Several demands have been made for that letter but the Republicans have been unable to produce it. All that could be found about it was that the negro White said he did receive a letter from Mr. Winston some eight years ago but could not find it, and wrote down as best he could what he recollected of the letter eight years after. So that is all there is in it--no evidence but what a negro says he got in a letter eight years ago. Even several Republicans of prominence are quoted by the state papers as saying the matter is a fake and without foundation.

Governor Aycock's friends all over the State will regret to learn that his young son has typhoid fever. On this account the Governor fears that he won't be able to fill his engagements with the National Committee for speeches, beginning October 24th in West Virginia, New Jersey, New York and other Northern points. It is also a matter of regret that the Governor will probably not be able to take part in the spell binding. What he would do and say on the stump would be bound to help the cause of Democracy. He will hold his own with any speaker and is equally well posted on the national issues with the best of them.—Wilmington Dispatch.

President Roosevelt has had the White House attendants arrayed in shining livery, with brass buttons, gold lace, and all that. "He is now attended," we are told, "by an array of obsequious subordinates and surrounded in his going and coming by a bodyguard, and no one may sit without permission or remain covered in his presence." The Philadelphia Record says, in remarking upon these evidences of royalty, "Mrs Roosevelt, not to be behind her lord, we are now informed, has organized a cabinet of her own, made up of the wives of cabinet members. This body she intends shall be absolute in social matters. It will meet on Tuesdays at the White House at the time the President and his cabinet are in session and arrange social events. It will decide who is and who is not in society and pass on all visitation lists for social functions." It pleases The Observer to learn of the hen cabinet. With her maw at its head, it is certain to enlarge the social importance of Miss Alice, and nothing is good enough for Miss Alice. Sweet girl! They say, by the by, she is going to throw herself away on a Cincinnati Congressman who rejoices in the name of Longworth, or something like that; but while she remains in Washington we want to see her reign like a queen.—Charlotte Observer.

Importing White Farm Labor.

Reports are that Mississippi planters are employing whole families of Mexicans for work in that State. There is a general movement in Mississippi, it is said, to get rid of negro laborers as far as possible on account of the great trouble which they have given during the past few years. Planters in that part of the country have pooled their interests in an effort to change the character of labor. This is along the same line of an editorial which appeared in this paper yesterday. The time has come when the Southern people are not going to continue to put up with the trifling negro labor. If the members of that race are smart they will improve the character of their work. There is no time for lagardness on the part of the negro.—Wilmington Dispatch

It has come. Mr. J. P. Caldwell, editor of the Charlotte Observer, has long been maligning the blood hound or any other kind of hound or dog as a trailer of human beings. Now it is up to him. Parties at Maxton have offered to pay all expenses if he will come down and let certain dogs at that place chase him. 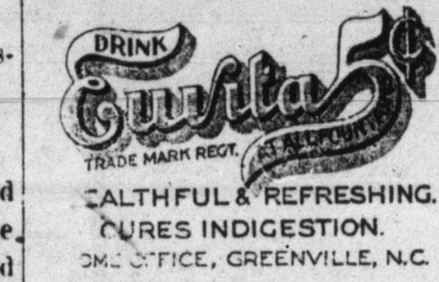
