A Tribute to the Southerner.

Their love of home, their chivalrous respect for women, their courage, their delicate sense of honor, their constancy which can abide by an opinion or purpose or an interest for their States through adversity and through prosperity through the years and through the generations, are things by which the people of the more mercurial North may take a lesson. And there is another thing—covetousness, corruption, the low temptation of money, have not yet found any place in our Southern politics.—Senator Hour

Shocking Carnage.

One of the most unpleasant reflections concerning the latest battles in Manchuria is that, in spite of the great number of casualties, the engagements have not been at all decisive.

Some way a battle which, while it left its thousands dead on the field, would at the same time hasten the dawn of peace, would not be such a shocking matter to think upon. But each man of all the thousands killed on either side in this eleven days' fight near Mukden has literally died for nothing. Not a perceptible bit of military advantage has come to either side through the spilling of all that blood. With thirty or forty thousand men lost, neither the Russian nor the Japanese cause has been advanced a foot. All of which makes the carnage doubly shocking and disgusting.—Atlanta, Constitution

The cost of the Philippine islands to the United States tax payers is something enormous. Judge Parker charges that it amounts to over \$600,000,000. Ex-Governor General Taft, of the Republican administration owns up to \$180,000,000, but he only includes the expenses of civil government and ignores the maintenance of a standing army double as large as before the Spanish American war. Mr. Edward Atkinson rubs the figures to above one billion dollars. Imperialism comes high.—Winston Sentinel.

Governor Aycock has been compelled to cancel his appointments to speak in the North and West for the Democratic national committee because his son is ill with typhoid fever.

A great many claims with more or less significance to them have been made for North Carolina as a State of which many remarkable things are true. But an item we read the other day quite staggers us. "Is our contemporary aware," asks a Kentucky paper of an exchange in this State, "that at one time exactly half of the members of the United States Senate were natives of North Carolina?" It is something certainly that we were not aware of; nor has any mention of it ever come to our notice before. It was a time, too, says the Kentucky paper, "when the Senate was at its best" and the observation is added that this proud boast belongs to no other state. We wish the papers that have sprung this matter would go into it a little more elaborately and tell the when, and who, and how of it. That half the members of the United States Senate at one time should be natives of the same state is a remarkable occurrence even if that state should be some other than old North Carolina. It is the proud boast of Virginia that she was the mother of presidents; is the Old North State to acquire equal renown as the mother of United States Senators?—Gastonia Gazette.

The old timers who watch the betting in election contests have been digging up the records in the past presidential campaigns, and they find that in 1892 the odds were very much as they are now and that election day brought disappointment to a great many confident plungers. George Williamson, who is the Washington authority on all matters pertaining to betting, said lately that he well remembers the betting in 1892 when Cleveland defeated Harrison. At a stage of the campaign approximating the present time the odds were 3 to 1 on Harrison. A few days later they backed down to 2 to 1, and in the last days of the campaign were 10 to 8.

At Rutland, Vt., on Wednesday, fourteen pretty young ladies inaugurated a new plan for raising money for missionary work. They acted as conductors and were allowed by the street railway company to retain all they took in over the average day's receipts. One citizen gave \$500 for riding a few yards, and there were many similar donations in smaller amounts. Several thousand dollars were cleared. How many ways have women got anyhow to make man pay the freight?—Wilmington Star.

The Indianapolis News, which is perhaps the most influential paper in Indiana, is authority for the statement that the result there is a matter of serious doubt. This paper, which is partly owned by Senator Fairbanks, says that the Democratic state organization is well nigh perfect and that Republican leaders are thoroughly alarmed over the situation in Indiana.

Two of the most prominent farmers who live near Rocky Mount, General W. R. Cox and Mr. T. M. Davenport, had their gin houses and a great amount of cotton burned Saturday night, the former losing about \$10,000 and the latter \$3,000. The fire is supposed to have originated from a spark.
