### The Hello Girl and the Impatient Patrons.

Considered rightly, the "hello" girl treads no primrose path. Did you ever stop to think that you are not the only one who turns in a call to central during the day? Bless your life, no! Here in Statesville between 8 o'clock in the morning and 6 in the evening an average of about 3,500 calls are made. That means that during the 8 hours that each of the girls is on duty she answers about 6 calls a minute or one every ten seconds, or, when both are on duty at the same time, you can split those figures in two. That's an average, but when everybody gets in the notion to use the 'phone at the same time, as often happens, it's worse than that—much worse. So be patient. If you don't get connection immediately don't allow yourself to think that the "hello" girl is, perchance, asleep, or gone on a journey, or that she cannot hear. Just consider that she is dreadfully busy and is doing her level possible. It is more than likely 'stenn dozen other calls are being turned in at the same time.

The date set for the North Carolina Day in the public schools of the State has been fixed for Friday, the 23rd of December and in future the last Friday before Christmas will be the regular date for these distinctive exercises.

The subject this year will be "The Pamphlet Section" Superintendent Joyner has been busy arranging the program which is now in the hands of the printer and will be ready for distribution in pamphlet form, it is hoped, not later than November 10th—Raleigh News and Observer.

### Tobacco Ahead

Tobacco is now beating cotton on price. Farmers express much satisfaction at the prices they are getting for tobacco, while they do not like to be selling cotton at less than 10 cents.

### Progress.

Along educational lines wonder ful progress has been made, as the following facts gleaned from a statement issued by Mr. J. Y. Joyner, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, will show. The comparison is made between the years 1900 and 1904.

The school term has increased from 14.6 weeks to 17 weeks.

The number of local tax districts has increased from 30 to 228.

The amount raised by local taxation has increased from \$135,000 to \$330,000.

The public school fund has increased from \$702,702 to \$1,765,362.

The value of public school property has increased from \$1,153,311 to \$1,869,890.

The sum spent for new school houses has increased from \$56,207 to \$170,420.

The number of log houses has decreased from 1,132 to 508.

The number of districts without school houses has decreased from 953 to 57.

The school enrollment has increased from 400,452 to 440,264.

The average attendance has increased from 206,918 to 261,149.

The number of school libraries has increased from 0 to 840, with 75,000 volumes of good readable books

### Solid Delegation Predicted.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Oct. 26.—States Senator F. M. Simmons, chairman of the state Democratic Executive Committee, who spoke here tonight, in an interview this evening stated that North Carolina would certainly return a solid Democratic delegation to Congress.

"Gudger will be re-elected in the Tenth district by a largely increased majority, and W. C. Newland will certainly defeat Spencer Blackburn in the Eighth by fifteen hundred or two thousand," said the Senator, who was emphatic in the statement that Newland was certain to win. Senator Simmons said that the Democratic majority in the State would be very large, that he had never seen the party in finer shape than now since he had been chairman.

### Serious Accident.

Leon Rieves, a son of W. H. Rieves, of West Greenville, met with a serious accident this morning. Leon in company with his cousin went out to his father's farm on a wagon. As they were riding along the road Leon was leaning against a round that was sticking up in the wagon. The round broke and he fell out to the ground, striking heavily on the back of his head. The fall dislocated his spinal column and he is partially paralyzed from the injury.

### Arm Dislocated.

Wednesday afternoon Alfred Tyson, a son of Moses Tyson, about 4 miles from town, got his right hand caught in a gin belt and badly dislocated his arm at the elbow. Dr. W. H. Bagwell was in the neighborhood at the time and was quickly summoned and soon had the boy's injured arm set.

B. C. Copeland, superintendent of the electric lights and water works construction force, left today for Wilson in response to a telegram announcing the death of a relative.

The county candidates, Hon. J. Bryan Grimes and Hon. John H. Small will all be at Bethel tomorrow and speak there.

Russia has agreed to make full apology and pay all the damage, so that may end the trouble caused by one of her fleets shooting on British fishing vessels.

We send felicitations herewith to the Charlotte Observer. No doubt our esteemed contemporary feels exuberant over the fact that another flying machine did fly.

Thirty speeches in one day, beginning at 6:30, A. M., and closing just before midnight, is the record Mr. Bryan made recently. He is putting in some effective work for Judge Parker.

It's a forlorn hope the Republicans have of trying to gain strength by opposing the Watts law. That is one law that has come to stay, and no amount of Republican opposition can overthrow it.

And Mr. Reynolds, the Republican candidate for congress in the fifth district, says if he is elected he will feel under obligation to support the measure to cut down the representation of the Southern states in congress. Sure. That is just what the Republicans all want to do. They don't like the straight Democrats that go up from the South.

The estimate of the outcome of the presidential election made by the Democratic national committee is that Parker will get a majority of seventy eight votes in the electoral college. On the other hand the Republican committee is claiming that Roosevelt is going to get all the votes except those from the South. Just wait until the night of Nov. 8th and you can see which side is right.

In a speech at Esopus Monday Judge Parker strongly denounced the campaign abuses of the present day. He said startling changes have taken place in the method of conducting campaigns, a change not for

the better but for the worse. Special emphasis was given to campaign contributions by the trusts, and on this point he said:

"Political contributions by corporations and trusts mean corruption. They cannot be honest. They are moved solely by business considerations. A corporation will subscribe to a political party only because the corporation expects that party, through its control of public officers, executive or legislative, to do something for the benefit of the corporation or to refrain from doing something to its injury. No other motive can be imagined. In the nature of things, no other motive can exist. The relations established mean the expectation, if not agreement, actual or implied, that governmental action is to be influenced by and for corporation interests. No sophistry can give any other aspect to the transaction in the minds of reasonable men."

Who Shall Do Jury Service?

It is worth while to notice how many of the jurors in the McCue trial in Charlottesville, Virginia, are failing to qualify for jury duty. A large percent of the special venire has been stood aside for the reason they claimed not to believe in capital punishment under any circumstances. Not a few were rejected because of their opposition to convict on circumstantial evidence, others escaped because they had read the papers and had therefore made up their minds and could not be induced by evidence to change their opinions concerning the guilt or innocence of the prisoner. Under these conditions it becomes a question, who, after all, shall do jury duty? If the reading of the news concerning the facts, as reported by the press, is to disqualify a juror from sitting on a case, then it would appear that the most intelligent part of the community is to have little part in this most important duty. It looks to be absurd for a juror to declare he would not convict on circumstantial evidence where capital punishment was the penalty. Circumstantial evidence, when complete, is the most certain of all other forms of evidence and carries its own conviction.— Ex.

A Word With Democrats.

Every man is responsible for his influence, be it small or great. Every Democrat who votes for Parker votes to defeat Roosevelt. Every Democrat who does not vote for Parker contributes toward the election of Roosevelt. On every question upon which Judge Parker's position is open to criticism, President Roosevelt's position is worse; where they differ, as they do on many important questions, Parker is right and Roosevelt is wrong.

Roosevelt favors a high tariff; Parker favors tariff reform. Roosevelt favors a standing army of 60,000 at the minimum; Parker favors a reduction of the army.

Roosevelt has brought the race issue into national politics; Parker would remove the race issue from politics.

Roosevelt stands for a colonial policy; Parker favors independence for the Filipinos and would make the promise now.

Roosevelt took into the White House a spirit of war; Judge Parker would substitute for it a spirit of peace.

Four years more of Roosevelt would make economic and industrial reform more difficult; Judge Parker's election would clear the way for economic issues. Let no Democrat by voting against Parker or by refusing to vote, take upon himself responsibility for four years more of Rooseveltism.— Bryan's Commoner.
