### Cotton and Tobacco.

No doubt the statement is a surprise to most North Carolinians that the cotton mills of our State consume ninety-seven per cent of her raw production. It is said the crop of the State this year will be between half a million and six hundred thousand bales. With the rapid growth of the milling industry in the State we will soon have to draw on the production of other States or greatly increase our own.—Wilmington Messenger.

That is good for our cotton mill industry. North Carolina is now producing about seventy million pounds of manufactured tobacco annually, or counting the stems taken out, working up about eighty million pounds of leaf. We may safely say that North Carolina is manufacturing at least one half of the State's crop of tobacco.—Winston Sentinel.

**Million Dollars For Cars.**

The Atlantic Coast Line has placed another order with the South Baltimore Car and Foundry Company for 500 box cars of the standard pattern. The order is to be filled at the earliest possible time. The cars are to be equipped with every modern appliance and will have a capacity of 60,000 pounds.

About the middle of the past summer the Atlantic Coast Line placed with the above named company an order for 500 of these standard box cars and they are now being delivered to the road in blocks of about fifty a week.

The Coast Line's business has grown so rapidly in the past twelve months that the freight equipment has been found to be entirely inadequate for the demands. It was thought at first that the 500 cars ordered in the summer would relieve the situation temporarily, but it has since been seen that double that amount will be needed to meet the requirements of the business. The thousand cars will represent an expenditure of about a million dollars. -Wilmington Dispatch.

**Taggart Shadowed.**

A dispatch from Indianapolis says that Thomas Taggart, national Democratic chairman, is being "shadowed" wherever he goes by two men, for what purpose he does not know. The two men were on the train when he left New York and the next day he saw them here. He went from place to place about the city, and at every turn he was followed by the two.

To make sure they were watching him he announced last Saturday he would spend Sunday at French Lick. He entered a car and in a few moments the two men entered the coach just behind the one in which he was seated. Mr. Taggart left the coach unseen by them and wired friends at different points on the road to watch for the two men. Late at night he got a telegram from Gosport saying that the men had left the train at that place and had taken the next train back to this city.

Yesterday, when he joined the Bryan special and went to Chicago he slipped away from them again, though the men followed him till he got upon the train with Mr. Bryan. The fact that Mr. Taggart knew he was being "shadowed" explains why he has refused to say one day where he was going the next.

15. Have a change of occupation.
16. Take frequent and short holidays.
17. Limit your ambitions; and,
18. Keep your temper.


