## ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE MAYOR OF GREENVILLE

GREENVILLE, N. C., Nov. 4th, 1904.

To the Citizens of Pitt and Adjoining Counties:

Information has been received in Greenville that an epidemic of smallpox exists in our town, and we are informed that reports are current throughout the county of Pitt and adjoining counties that there are many cases of this disease in the town of Greenville. These reports are without foundation.

There is only one case of smallpox in the town of Greenville, and this one case is of an exceedingly mild type and the party is now practically well and will be discharged in a few days.

There were formerly three other cases in the town of Greenville, two of which were not residents of Greenville, but came here from elsewhere with smallpox already developed before they came here.

As mayor of the town of Greenville, I take this method of correcting these erroneous reports and to further state that the physicians of our town have the situation thoroughly under control, and no one need have any fear whatever. Greenville is not under quarantine and has no need to be, and every one who desires to do so can come to Greenville with perfect safety as all the reports in regard to smallpox epidemic in Greenville are erroneous and absolutely without foundation.

### H. A. LATHAM DEAD,

Victim of Street Car Accident.

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 3.—H. A. Latham, retail salesman of the Asheville Ice and Coal Company, died this morning at 8:30 o'clock at his home in south Biltmore as the result of injuries sustained yesterday afternoon by being thrown from a street car on the Biltmore line of the Asheville street railroad company. Mr. Latham boarded the 6:30 o'clock car at the square yesterday afternoon bound for his home in Biltmore. He had made several purchases during the day and carried in his arms these packages.

At what is known as the Good-like curve, or where the depot car turns into Southside Avenue, there is a spring switch that is always set to allow the Biltmore car to pass, but which must be turned in order to let the depot car follow the track in Southside Avenue. This switch had either been tampered with or else gravel or pebbles had gotten into the groove and did not permit the perfect working of the tongue, and when the Biltmore car started over the switch the car wheel turned suddenly into Southside Avenue. Mr. Latham, standing on the platform and not expecting the car to turn, was thrown to the brick pavement and struck on the back of his head. He was rendered unconscious by the fall and was taken to the Biltmore terminus of the line and thence taken to his home in a carriage. He lingered till this morning and died.

Mr. Latham came to Asheville several years ago from eastern Carolina, where he was engaged in conducting a newspaper. He was a bright writer and one of the most highly respected men of this section.

Mr. Latham was the eldest son of the late Rev. Josephus Latham. He was born in Pitt county, in four miles of Greenville, and spent his early life on the farm. He attended Greenville male academy and afterwards went to the State University from which he graduated. After his graduation he moved to Washington and purchased the Gazette which paper he edited several years. While editor of the Gazette he was twice elected reading clerk of the house of representatives. Later he sold the Gazette and moved to Tennessee, remaining there a short while and then moved to Asheville which was the former home of his wife. His mother, Mrs. Martha Latham, and a sister, Mrs. J. P. Quinerly, now live in this county. His untimely death brings regret to many of his boyhood friends here in Pitt county.

SMALLPOX SITUATION.

THE REFLECTOR has a time or two referred to the gross exaggeration of the smallpox situation in Greenville. All kinds of false reports have been circulated and neighboring towns have been using them to the detriment of the business of Greenville. This exaggeration has gone on to such an extent that the board of aldermen felt it their duty to take official notice of the matter and they instructed the mayor to publish a card setting forth the true situation of the disease in the town. Mayor Parker publishes such a card today. All told there have been only four cases of smallpox in town, two being citizens of the town and the others being persons who came here from elsewhere with the disease already contracted. The physicians and officials took prompt steps in the matter, the infected persons were isolated and nearly everybody in town who needed it was vaccinated. At no time has there been the slightest danger to any person coming and going throughout the town at will. All the persons here who had the disease, except one, have been discharged by the physicians and the remaining one is well but remains isolated a few days longer out of abundant caution. It is currently stated that one town in particular that has helped to circulate the false reports about Greenville in an effort to draw business that would come here, has more smallpox within its limits than has been here.

One of the laws passed by the Legislature provided a tax upon all outsiders who might come into this State to hunt. A landowner cannot invite a friend to hunt on his land unless the sportsman's tax is paid. The Raleigh Times does not like this law and contends that it will result in nothing except to keep men out of the State who would otherwise come, and, in all probability, aid in the development of our State. It adds that "there is entirely too much of the 'thou shalt not' legislating done, any way." There can be no doubt about the soundness of this last proposition. We are a law-ridden people. — Charlotte Chronicle.

Quite true, and if we could have the legislature to meet only once in ten years it would be a good thing.

The finding of the court of inquiry appointed to investigate the killing of two soldiers and wounding two others while riding on top of a car in returning from the encampment at Morehead City, has been made public. The opinion given by the court is that the officers of the regiment were remiss in the discharge of their duties in not taking precautions to enforce proper discipline. This finding of the court shows that the railroad on which the accident occurred is in no wise to blame for it.

Roosevelt's quietness is at last explained. He met with an accident while out on a reckless horseback ride that came near costing him his life, and had to lay up for repairs.
