### HUGE AND HEROIC HITS.

Ponderous Pageantry and Daylight Pyrotechnics

All roads will lead to Greenville on November 18 when the Great Adam Forepaugh and Sells Brothers United Shows loom up, and all will be thronged with the holiday thousands thronging to see the grand, gorgeous, auriferous arenic free street parade. Besides the standard gay, glittering and spectacular pageant offerings characteristic of the bigger circuses there are announced uncommon pompous and historical additions, among which the Oriental and military sections will command unusual attention and are striking innovations. The former is a regally mastodontic and rich reproduction of the recent gorgeous State Durbar at Delhi, in which the native princes, potentates and other notabilities of India received and did homage to the British Viceroy, marking the occasion one of indescribably ostentatious and lavish display of priceless jewels and costumes. The show in question has the huge elephants, superb horses, costly trappings, people and paraphernalia requisite to appropriately perpetuate the event. In the military section of the parade will be found matter of unusual and striking historical interest; our country's martial progress, from Bunker Hill to Santiago, being illustrated and symbolized by the appearance of representatives, armed and costumed exactly as were the heroes who fought under Washington, Scott, Taylor, Lee, Grant and Miles. After the morning parade a free display of Japanese daylight fireworks will be given on the show grounds, during which, discharged from thundering mortars, will float, sail and dive skyward the huge and most strangely grotesque similitudes of fabulous monsters, dragons, sprites and Arabian Night's fantasies, accompanied by pyrotechnic rainbows and wonderful wreaths of smoke.

Abuse of the Mail System.

The shameful abuse of the mails is a matter that deserves the attention of the postoffice officials. For months the mails have been loaded down with matter sent out under congressional frank but which was in no wise entitled to the privilege. Tons of this matter have been carried over the country free of charge to the committees, but at immense cost to the general government. It is a heavy expense to the postoffice department, because it provides absolutely no revenue, and is an unfair advantage, because it makes the general public bear the expense of circulating campaign literature. During the mail weighing seasons, when a basis for payment for transporting the mails is being secured, tons of similar matter are hauled. It is a fraud that should be stopped, along with a number of others that are apparent in the postal department. — The Commoner.

Kleptomania and Stealing.

The Monroe Enquirer scores a good point when it tells about how the Charlotte papers failed to make a news item complete last week when they refused to give the name of a young lady who stole a lot of goods there during the fair. The reason they refused to give the name was because the young lady belonged to a very prominent family and she was therefore pronounced a victim of Kleptomania, which is a new fangled disease that is said to affect the minds of rich people who steal. It never affects poor people. As the Enquirer says, "If that woman who is such a light-fingered thief was nothing more than an ordinary cotton picker whose father was somebody's cropper, the name would be the first thing given." Certainly it would, and she would have been sent to jail and you would have heard nothing about "Kleptomania," either. This is another instance that shows how being prominent and wealthy covers up some awfully bad sins, for it puts a person up where medical science has discovered a disease that will apply in such cases without calling it stealing. — Marshville Home.

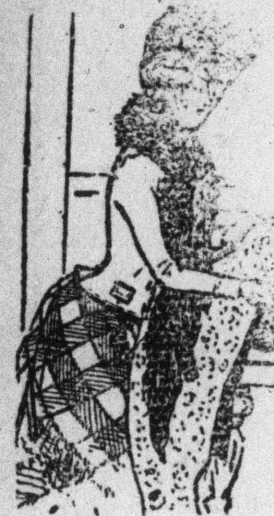
