There was so much tobacco on the market Tuesday that the sale blocked, one warehouse having to hold over until today to sell. The weed is coming in.

Repairing Storm Damage.

New York, Nov. 15.—While considerable progress had been made in repairing the damage wrought by Sunday night's gale, conditions today had by no means become normal. After more than thirty six hours of steady work the repair crew sent out by the telegraph and telephone companies had succeeded in patching up the main lines, but the wires in many cases were worked under most discouraging conditions and were unable to handle the great mass of matter that had accumulated. Good connections had been established between New York, Philadelphia and Boston, but beyond those points emergency circuits were still in use. Wall Street was in much better condition than yesterday. Direct communication between the Cotton Exchanges of New York and New Orleans, which was entirely out of yesterday, had been established by the Western Union, and there were two wires between New York and the cattle and grain markets in Chicago.

In Eastern Maine where more than 1,200 telegraph and telephone poles were blown down during the storm, the wires were still out of service.

Critically Ill.

He was taken Saturday with appendicitis, and Tuesday evening his condition became so alarming that Dr. D. T. Taylor, of Washington, was telephoned for and at 2 o'clock this morning he, with Drs. Laughinghouse and Moye, performed an operation. The little fellow stood the operation bravely and today his condition has been as favorable as could be expected, though he is yet very sick indeed. All hope he will get along well and soon be restored to health.
