Send the Children to the Public School.

The public schools are, in all probability, not to your liking. They may not be what they should be, but they are a great deal better than no school and you cheat your child out of his rights when you keep him away from school more than eight months out of the year. The argument is used that your boy who becomes of age after 1908 cannot vote unless he can read and write, therefore you should send him to school. We would not use that argument on a man, for a father who really has his child's best interests at heart would hardly think of that when it comes to the education of the child, but for higher reasons than merely preparing them to cast a ballot we urge every man to send his children

to school. The public school is the only means the great majority of children have for getting any training whatever in books.

Personal Neatness Counts.

In the course of an address the other day on how to obtain success, the president of a prominent street-railway company said: "Clothes do not make the man, but good clothes have got many a man a good job. If you have twenty-five dollars and want a job, it is better to spend twenty dollars for a suit of clothes, four dollars for shoes and the rest for a shave, a hair cut and a clean collar and walk to the place, than go with the money in the pockets of a dingy suit.
