The farmers who did not plant tobacco this year are calculating how much they lost. But if a big crop had been raised the price might not have held up so well.

The statue of Frederick the Great which was presented to the United States by the Emperor of Germany, was unveiled in Washington City on Saturday with appropriate exercises.

The Republicans do not seem to be satisfied at controlling practically all the balance of the country and are trying to devise plans by which they can also strengthen their party in the South. The South is too strongly Democratic to suit them and will remain that way.

A woman may be as chaste as a sunbeam, as pure as the soul of a snowflake, when drifting from its stainless home in the sky, and yet a mean, cowardly wretch can blot and blur and destroy the beauty and purity and glory of her reputation by a low and wicked thrust at her virtue.—Raleigh Times.

The Lumberton Argus, in talking about the custom of leaving cotton bales out in the weather, makes this argument: "You not only risk a loss for yourself in loss of weight by removal of rotten cotton and lower price, but you do the world a wrong. You are ready enough to complain when the merchant sells you rotten goods, but how about the man who lets the cotton injure from which the goods are made? How long would your shirt last after lying on the ground all winter? Just so long will one made of cotton that has laid on the ground all winter last."

Some Flitting Rot.

A good deal of rot is going the rounds of the press about the South's declaring its political independence of the Northern and Western wings of the party. Of course, it is all nonsense but some Northern papers take it seriously.

The time was when the South was glad to have the Northern Democracy and independents to come to the rescue, and the badly digested editorials which pass current for the real stuff now is no indication that the Southern Democracy as a whole is not graceful for the elbow touch of Northern Democrats, many of whom are more fundamentally Democrats than some of our Southern howlers whose noggins are stuffed full of socialism and paternalism while they don't know it.

There is no occasion for the South to further alienate itself from its Northern friends, and of course, there is no serious movement along that line, for the South will keep its shirt on and await issues that the next four years will bring to the front, calling for its co-operation with similar political sentiment and convictions in the North. That is what we will do, too, flop-doodle editorials to the contrary notwithstanding.

The New York World, the New York Times and other Independent and Democratic newspapers in the North are wasting time in seriously taking note of some of the sore-headed ideologists emanating from some Southern newspapers. The South is going ahead with its business and

is neither crawling, finching or alarmed. The political hash up to date is settled, and Dixie will wait for the 1908 developments. All talk of the South's further isolating itself from either the respect or co-operation of its friends in the North is merely flitting rot.—Wilmington Star.

NAPOLEON'S HATS.

Seven hats once worn by Napoleon are in existence. That is settled by Prince Victor Napoleon, who has answered an inquiry. One of the seven was bought for 17,000 francs by Gerome, whose monument of the "Broken Eagle" was unveiled at Waterloo last summer. Three are owned by the Empress Eugenie, Prince Victor Napoleon and Prince Louis Napoleon. Two are at the Invalides and one in the Military museum.

Prince Victor Napoleon owns bills for hats supplied to the great emperor. They cost 60 francs each. Napoleon sent them back at times to the hatmaker to be done up. In the bills figures the item, "For repairs, 6 francs." The Gerome hat may now be seen at the Conde museum.

Sounds From Stars.

That the stars sing as they move in their courses is a poetical idea which is not so extravagant as it seems. A distinguished astronomer in fact has devised an ingenious apparatus for recording the sounds which come from them. The instrument by which the sounds are recorded is a combination of phonograph, telephone and telescope and is the outcome of the discovery that light rays falling on a polished steel plate produce a musical note. The machine, which is too complicated to describe in detail, is declared to convey musical sounds from the stars and planets, the sweetest tones being produced by the most distant of the fixed stars. The notes given out by the bright stars are stated to be far less pure and clear.

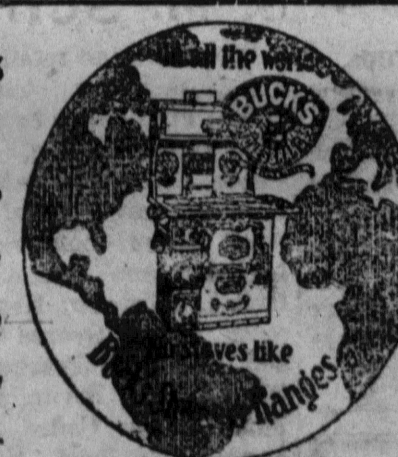
