FINE WORK.

Below will be found an outline of a talk made by Prof. G. E. Lineberry at the recent meeting of the Pitt County Teachers' Association on "The Art of Questioning." It ought to be preserved and studied by every teacher and followed closely in their work so that the very best results may be attained.

Kind of questions—(1) Preliminary. (2) Examinative. (3) Informative.

Qualities of a good question—(1) State question, then name pupil. (2) Have no regular or predictable order. (3) Avoid repetition of a question well asked. (4) Pause after asking question before naming pupil. (5) Avoid question that "yes" or "no" can answer. (6) Should be clear. (7) Should be brief. (8) Should be colorless, not suggestive of answer. (9) Should be definite. (10) Question on the lesson should be individual. (11) Should be adapted to the individual capacity of the pupil asked. (12) Question should exercise judgment as well as test memory. (13) Question should be logical. (14) Should be suggestive, stimulate, and arouse.

Recommendation—(1) Be as ready to answer as to ask. (2) Examine and criticize yourself. Quit bad habits. (3) Occasionally write out the question. (4) Read and study best literature on the subject. (5) Continually ask ourselves if these things be so.

"Wild Cat" Insurance.

The Insurance Commissioner has received many inquiries of late in regard to the Hartford Insurance Company of New York. This company is not licensed in this state and could not be. They are a "wild-cat" and "underground" concern of the worst character, and are attempting by similarity of name to get some character and business in this State because of the standing and character of the Hartford, Conn. The company has no money, and its officers no character, and the general manager, Rogers, has an unsavory reputation, even among the "wild-cat" promoters. Any one representing this company will not only defraud his neighbor, but lay himself liable to fine and imprisonment.

REGISTRY COMPANIES.

The Insurance Commissioner also desires to warn the people of the State against each and every registry company attempting to do business in the State. The International Registry Company, the Commercial Registry Company and others seem to be determined to try to do business in this State without complying with the law, and the people are warned against them. However "specious" their propositions may appear upon the surface, there is nothing in them for the citizens of this State. The Commissioner does not understand why they should continue to flood the State with their literature and offers of business, when they have repeatedly written him that they would not attempt to do any business in this State until they comply with its laws. These registry companies are going so far as to even

publish advertisements in some of the reputable journals of the State.

PUBLISH.

The papers of the State will confer a favor upon the Commissioner and do a great service to the citizens of the State if they will publish the above warning and call the attention of the people to them.—Morning Post.
