THANKSGIVING.

A well known physician, who has for some time held to the theory given in the caption of this item, has been telling the Evening Times about it.

With the view of learning the opinions of other medical men concerning the efficacy of the habit of eating apples to destroy the taste for liquor he has corresponded with many medical men living in various States. He received replies from all but three.

From a large majority came answers that they had never known a case where a person was accustomed to the free use of apples and was a drunkard, nor had they ever known of a drunkard who was accustomed to the daily use of apples.

From a personal observation, covering a period of more than 25 years, the physician says he never has known a single instance where a person who was a free user of apples acquired the liquor habit, nor has he known a person addicted to the free use of liquor who was fond of apples.—Raleigh Times.
