GREENVILLE'S THANKSGIVING.

Day Well Spent—Orphans Liberally Remembered.

Though the previous day gave a forecast of something different, Thanksgiving day brought pretty weather with it in this section. Greenville entered heartily in the observance of the day, and enjoyed it perhaps more fully than any like occasion in the past. With the exception of the hunting parties the day was very much like a Sunday. Business generally was suspended, the stores and offices being closed.

Services were held in two of the churches—Baptist and Methodist—with large congregations at each. In the Baptist church the sermon was by Rev. H. H. Moore, pastor of the Christian church, his congregation joining with their Baptist brethren in worship. Greenville people have had the pleasure of hearing no better or more appropriate Thanksgiving sermon. It was thoughtful, eloquent, one that made each individual feel his indebtedness and gratitude to God for His intumerable blessings. Pastor A. T. King made a brief appeal for the Thomasville orphanage and the collection was exceedingly liberal, amounting to \$35.86. The music at the service was splendid.

At the Methodist church there was a large audience and the pastor, Rev. J. A. Hornaday, preached an excellent sermon in keeping with the Thanksgiving spirit. The collection for the orphanage was indeed a liberal one, amounting to \$76.30. There was special music for the occasion which was much enjoyed.

Beside what was done in the churches there were other generous Thanksgiving offerings. The pupils of the graded school contributed \$13.26 to the Oxford orphan asylum, and the sixth and seventh grades took a feast to the inmates of the county home.

The Masons sent \$40 in cash and a valuable box to the Oxford orphan asylum.

The noble women of The King's Daughters, following their annual custom, took a feast to the county home and brought gladness and cheer, as well as thanksgiving, to the hearts of the inmates.
