Lovely new veils just received at Mrs. L. Griffin's.

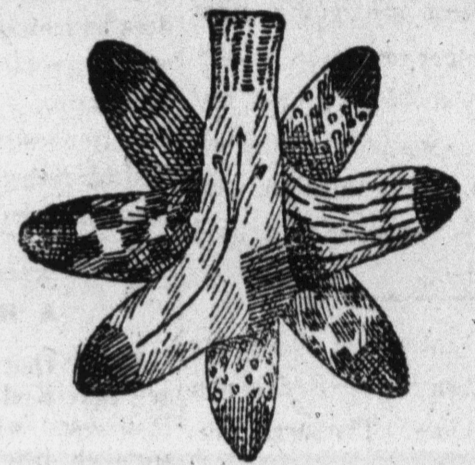
