There are no entrance examinations. There is no tuition. Everything is free to the farmers of the State, except board, room and fuel. The total cost for these for the ten weeks is but thirty dollars. If you wish to study your work; understand the soil and how to fertilize and improve it; how to breed and feed animals; how to make butter; how to judge farm animals and farm crops; and to study the various details for practical work on the farm; you ought to spend ten weeks at the Farmers' College. You can readily get away from home during the Winter months and meeting with other farmers and talking with them about our farm problems, immense good will come to you and to the agriculture of the State. You had better arrange early for this course. Talk with a friend or two and see if you all can't come.

Owing to the prevalence of smallpox in Onslow county a term of court has been called off.

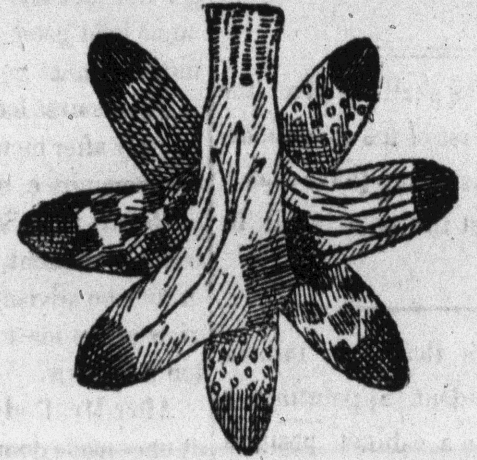

It is time everybody was realizing that the campaign is over and buckle down to business.

As much money as there is in the country it does seem remarkable that people should be so slow to pay their debts.

Since it became intimated that the president would make a southern tour, a number of towns have been sending in invitations for a date.

The report comes from out West that next year mules will sell at \$200 per head. Some folks had as well get ready to do their plowing with ox teams.

Edison says he shall yet give the world the greatest of his inventions. Marvelous as his others have been, he promises that the next shall be even more so.

Those papers that are talking about the president appointing a southern man to a cabinet position are likely wasting that much gray matter. Just as well let the president alone and leave him to run matters to suit himself. That is what he is going to do.

There are all kinds of cranks in the land. While the president was in St. Louis a woman tried to force her way in the house where he was stopping to get a chance to paint his picture on glass. Another woman came along with a tremendous Texas steer which she wanted the president to look at.

There is much uneasiness among Republican office holders in this state. So many of the outs want a place at the pie counter that they view the situation with alarm. No doubt there is walking ahead for some who would have been less enthusiastic during the late campaign had they anticipated what is coming.

We thought Coxe, of the "Commonwealth Army" fame, had dropped out of the public eye for good and all time. But here he bobs up again and in the United States court at Columbus, Ohio, he files a personal petition in bankruptcy. His liabilities are placed at \$287,000, which shows that he piled up debts when he had the chance.

There are candidates galore for speaker of the next house of representatives. The Raleigh News and Observer says four have already been announced—Judge Graham, of Granville; Judge Winborne, of Hertford; Mr. Guion, of Craven, and Mr. Wood, of Randolph—with a suggestion that Col. John S. Cunningham, of Person, will also be in the race. And there may be others by the time the returns all get in.

WARREN CLERKSHIP.

The whole State remembers how in the latter part of the summer Judge B. B. Peebles went contrary to the wish of the County Executive Committee and of a large number of the people of Warren county in refusing to appoint Mr. J. E. Rodwell clerk of the court to succeed Mr. J.

W. White, who had resigned the office on account of ill health.

It will be remembered, also, that the ground upon which Judge Peebles appointed another man was that Mr. Rodwell had been a defaulter while sheriff of his county, a charge which was entirely new and which has since been utterly disproven.

Indignation ran high in Warren county and the State but the appointment was made and the Judge's appointee, Mr. Rowland, took the office. Under the terms of the appointment he was to fill the unexpired term of his predecessor, which was two years. The people had been thwarted, but they determined that there was a way out of the difficulty and that was the nomination and election of Mr. Rodwell on the ground that Mr. Rowland's appointment held good under the law only until the next general election.

This course had been decided upon only after members of the executive committee of the county had conferred with Senator Simmons and other prominent lawyers and Democrats who advised them that their view of the matter was in their opinion a the law.

After Mr. Rodwell's election he at once made demand on Mr. Rowland for possession of the office, which was refused on the ground that under his appointment from Judge Peebles he held until the time when Mr. White's time would have expired had he not resigned. Mr. Rodwell then sued out a mandamus, a case agreed was made up and the question as to the rightful holder of the office will be argued as soon as possible in the Supreme Court.

The exact point in question is said never to have been decided, but Mr. Rodwell is proceeding upon the theory that his case is analogous to that of Justices MacRae and Burwell, of the Supreme Court who were appointed by Governor Carr to fill the unexpired terms of deceased Justices. The question having arisen as to the true construction of the constitutional section covering such cases, the three judges not affected, Chief Justice Shepherd and Justices Avery and Clark, decided that the appointments held only until the next election, their decision costing both Judge MacRae and Judge Burwell their seats in the fusion upheaval of 1894.

Mr. Rowland claims that there is a distinction between a clerk of the court and a Supreme Court Judge, but Mr. Rodwell and his friends are confident that the court will not so hold, in view of the decision of 1894 in the case involving the seats of two of its members.—Raleigh News and Observer.
