PITT COUNTY BANKS.

Five Strong Institutions of Finance.

The recent establishment of banks at Farmville and Bethel makes five banks in operation in Pitt county. THE REFLECTOR does not hesitate to say that these banks are as solid and make as fine showings as any in the state outside the cities. The report of the condition of these banks at the close of business on Nov. 10th, made in response to the call of the state corporation commission, gives the public an idea of the excellence of these institutions. The reports have all been published in THE REFLECTOR and the people of the county should feel a pride in the existence of such splendid financial institutions in their midst. The amount of money on deposit in these banks also gives an idea of the condition of the people of the county.

The Bank of Greenville is the oldest of these institutions, being established in 1896 at which time it succeeded the private bank of Tyson & Rawls. Its business every year has shown fine progress, until today its total resources are but a little less than \$325,000. The deposits of this bank are above \$226,000, while the surplus and undivided profits are nearly \$5,000 in excess of the capital stock, a showing that very few banks anywhere are able to make.

The Greenville Banking & Trust Co., was established in 1901 and its growth has been remarkable. Beginning with \$10,000 capital, at the end of the second year it increased to \$25,000. At that time its previous earnings was distributed among the stockholders, and since then its undivided profits have reached nearly \$6,000. Today its total resources are close to \$180,000 and deposits above \$100,000.

The Bank of Ayden is less than two years old, yet its total resources in this short time show an aggregate above \$39,000 and its deposits are nearly \$29,000.

The Bank of Farmville was recently started and had been doing business only a few days when its report was made showing resources above \$23,000 and deposits above \$14,000.

The Bethel Banking & Trust Co. began business about the first of November, and in less than ten days showed resources of nearly \$21,000 and deposits nearly \$16,000.

Taking the statements of the five banks together they show resources of nearly \$600,000 and deposits of nearly \$400,000, which is a showing the county can be proud of. The banks are all well officered and conducted by thorough business men.
