TOWN MATTERS.

Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night, all the members being present.

J. S. Congelton, who had been previously elected alderman for the first ward in place of Edgar Buck, resigned, qualified by taking the official oath and entered upon his duties.

The street committee reported that only little work had been done on the streets as it was thought best not to do much until the laying of water pipes was completed; that the claims of Brinkley & Hooker for damage to their property on Dickinson avenue had been adjusted by the town paying them \$175. Two other adjustments with property owners incident to widening the avenue were made, Mrs. M. M. Harris to be paid \$175 and James Long \$75.

The lights and wells committee reported their department in fair condition.

The market committee reported that the old buildings on the lot formerly used as a market and guard house had been sold and that the new guard house was nearly completed.

The white cemetery committee reported no work done since last meeting.

The tax collector, treasurer, police officers, dispensary commissioners and chief of fire department presented their monthly reports for November. The dispensary sales during the month amounted to \$4,239.90.

J. E. Moye, C. S. Carr and W. A. Bowen were appointed a committee with the city attorney to look over the town charter and recommend such changes as thought advisable to ask the next legislature to make in the charter.

The chief police was instructed to notify the owners of the property or which Gorman factory was burned that the excavation must be filled so that it will not hold water.

An ordinance was adopted prohibiting boys under 18 years of age entering or loitering in pool rooms or playing games therein under a penalty of \$5, an equal penalty to be imposed upon keepers of pool or billiard tables who allow boys under the prescribed age to loiter in or play games in the pool rooms.

The manager of the telephone exchange was given permission to trim such of the trees in town, under police direction, as interfere with the telephone wires.

J. C. Lanier was elected a trustee of the graded school to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of M. A. Allec. Mr. Lanier and Dr. R. L. Carr were both placed in nomination for trustee and the vote was a tie for five ballots.

It was ordered that the note to the Greenville Banking & Trust Co., for \$1,000 borrowed be renewed for 30 days.

Night policeman Edgar Buck having abandoned the position the office was declared vacant, and W. H. McGowan was elected as night police.

Accounts were allowed and orders drawn on the treasurer amounting to something over \$1,300. Much of this was for building the new guard house and for the payments on Dickinson avenue.

The police were instructed to meet all passenger trains, to patrol every section of the town, and to be diligent in searching places where liquor might be illegally sold or gambling carried on; also that the ordinance prohibiting profanity on the streets be more rigidly enforced.

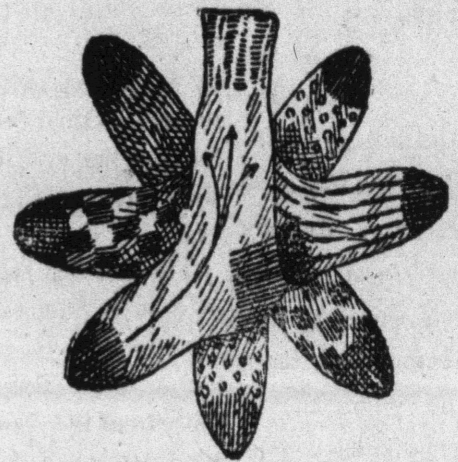

When you hang the new 1905 calendar beside the old one for 1904 it is a reminder of before and after taking.

This month the little folks write letters to Santa Claus and feel very happy in anticipating what he will bring them. It is hoped Santa will not disappoint them.

It was like adding fuel to the flame for the president of the St. Louis exposition to wire Governor Vardiman, of Mississippi, that President Roosevelt greatly admired the Mississippi building. There has been such congeniality between these two, you know.

The daily Concord Tribune announced some days ago that it would be discontinued on the first of December, but it did not stop. The people of the town in the meantime had got together in such a way as to show the publisher they did not want the daily paper to stop. Doubtless if they had been showing that kind of interest beforehand there would have been no suggestion of stopping. A paper must have support to get along.

The South is a great section—the garden spot of the world—but her own people are the ones upon whose shoulders stands her destiny. Outside capitalists may come to make investments and reap part of the advantages arising from development, but if our people wait for this they will wait indefinitely. We must take hold and bring things to pass ourselves, and then the balance of the country can see what they are losing by not being in it.

Several years ago, the daughter of the poet Longfellow paid a visit to the Ojibway Indians, on the north shore of Lake Huron, and for her benefit the Indians gave a presentation of their play "Hiawatha." Since that time the play has been given every summer near the village of Desbarats, on Georgian Bay, and those who have been privileged to see it are enthusiastic in their praise of the Ojibways' interpretation. The play and its accessories are fully described in the December number of the Review of Reviews by Mr. William C. Edgar, and his article is illustrated from photographs of the Indian actors in costume.

The Cost of Rural Delivery.

Postmaster General Wynne writes in the December World's Work: In 1897, when the rural service was started on probation, \$40,000 was deemed sufficient for its trial. During the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1904, nearly \$13,000,000 was expended for rural free-delivery. For the fiscal year upon which we have now entered \$20,816,000 has been appropriated for the continuance and extension of the rural mail service. There were 24,566 rural routes in existence at the end of the fiscal year on June 30th, last, 9,446 new routes having been put into operation during the fiscal year. On October 1, 1904, there were 27,135 routes established, and the service was being extended at the rate of about 800 routes a month.

Taking 450 people as the average number served on each route (a moderate estimate) the rural service in operation October 1, 1904, was bringing the mails within easy reach of the homes of 12,213,750 residents of rural districts.

Some Facts About State Pensions to Confederate Veterans.

The State Auditor is busy on his annual report and in making out the pension rolls, says the News and Observer. The warrants for pensions will be paid on the 15th of December and will come in good Christmas season for the needy old veterans. The pensions range in amount from \$120 to \$14 a year, the largest amount being given to those destitute old soldiers who are either totally blind or have suffered the loss of both arms or both legs. A sixty-dollar pension is given to those totally disabled and unable to work. The other pensions are graded to the minimum amount to fit the comparative necessities and poverty of the beneficiaries.

There are now 1800 old veterans on the rolls and the appropriation is \$200,000. This sum is increased by \$2,000 which remains over from the distribution last year, not called for, and the probabilities are that there will again be a surplus this year.

The fact that many of the needy pensioners do not call for their meagre stipend is a pathetic witness to the ravages of death among the old soldiers of the South. Two years ago there was a balance left from pensions after the distribution, therefore the auditor added many names of needy veterans to the rolls and drew his warrants for \$204,000. In spite of the increased number there remains a balance from last year's warrants of \$2,000. Anticipating the deaths of pensioners during the year, Auditor Dixon has again increased the number on the rolls and this year he will issue warrants for \$208,000 or \$6,000 more money than the appropriation calls for with the added balance.

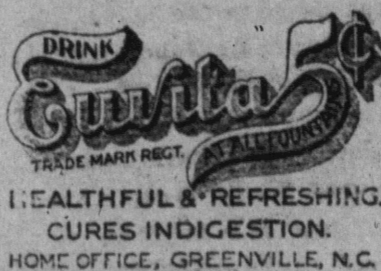

REPORT OF THE CONDITION OF THE BANK OF GREENVILLE, GREENVILLE, N. C.
