After the Trust.

There is a plan on foot to make it lively for the "Tobacco Trust." Representatives of seven thousand manufacturers and dealers met in Philadelphia last week, and made arrangements for the formation of a national organization to fight the Tobacco Trust in the trade and by legislation. At the executive session that preceded the open meeting of the Retail Cigar and Tobacco Dealers' Association, it was decided to form a national association by uniting the manufacturers and wholesalers in one central body, the jobbers and sub-jobbers in state organizations, and the retailers and selling agents into local associations.

The local and State organizations are to be represented directly in the national body by accredited delegates appointed on the percentage of membership. Arrangements were made for the convention of the Independent Tobacco Manufacturers' Association of the United States to hold its convention in Philadelphia on December 12, and on December 13 the Independent Tobacco League of America will hold its annual convention at Horticultural Hall, Philadelphia. There were about twenty of such organizations in the United States, and the present movement is to consolidate all of these organizations into one national body along lines outlined at the executive session.

Reports were received showing that the imports of tobacco goods of independent manufacture from Havana during the year past exceeded the imports of trust product. This never before happened.

The interests represented at this meeting had an aggregate capital of \$250,000,000.—American Grocer.

The System is Bad.

The illness of a juror in the Nan Patterson case in New York after a great deal of the evidence had been put in and the consequent failure to proceed further, again calls attention to the present jury system in vogue all over the country. Twelve men constitute a jury, and it takes every man to bring in a verdict. When one member gets sick the whole case falls through. The common, every-day layman cannot understand why the system could not be changed, either by providing that in an emergency of this kind eleven men could sit and determine the case, or by making the full panel fourteen and allowing twelve of them to finish it. Of course down this way, where we seldom have trials requiring weeks to determine we do not have these failures often, though they do occur sometimes, and the cost resulting is enormous, causing a trial from the beginning as if nothing had been done. In the New York case it is going to be difficult to get another jury, for the evidence thus far adduced has been published and commented on, so that a man who has read or heard about it will not be competent. It is a bad system and surely needs some attention. The risk is too great.—Greensboro Record.

Sign No Papers.

Just now when there is much money in the hands of farmers adroit agents will be on the road. They will have the best and only clocks, sewing machines, steel ranges, improved churns, and other useful articles, all of which can be bought at home. The writer saw two negroes a few days ago who had just finished the last installment on \$60 sewing machines, which could have been bought for \$20 or less. These agents make an ignorant man feel that the last chance has come to secure the article they have for sale and then by giving two or three years time they deceive the purchaser completely. They have chattel mortgages which are iron-clad, and once signed there is no way of evading payment. Those agents generally demand the cost of the article the first payment. Never sign any papers of that sort. The prices asked by these agents are generally three times as much as your local dealer will ask. Those mortgages printed in such small type that the ordinary farmer cannot read them, are dangerous and deceptive.—Progressive Farmer.
