COUNTY MATTERS.

Proceedings of Board of Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners were in regular monthly session on the 5th and 6th and began the new fiscal year. The members of the board, J. J. Elks, J. R. Barnhill, J. R. Spier, J. W. Page and W. R. Horne, who had been re-elected for another term, qualified by taking the prescribed oath. J. J. Elks was re-elected chairman.

Orders on the treasurer were issued in the aggregate as follows: For paupers \$156.75; county home \$178.58; court officers \$17.35; elections \$71.06; convicts \$255.73; bridges and ferries \$630.36; small-pox \$1,893.05; stationery and printing \$8.10; coal \$28.75; jail \$76.90; coroner \$21.60; treasurer \$138.75; commissioners 38.95; court house \$55.93; witness tickets \$7.50; conveying prisoners and insane \$18.25; register deeds \$26.85; stock law territory \$61.65.

The treasurer and superintendent health presented their monthly reports.

Luke McLawhorn was released from taxes on real estate in Contentnea township valued at \$400.

R. F. Hill and A. S. and J. S. B. Bynum were released from special taxes in Farmville township.

Twenty members of Red Hawk Fire Co., and twenty-nine members of Rough and Ready Fire Co., were released from poll tax for 1904.

J. S. Corbitt, J. S. Barber, J. S. Clark and Lill Cannon were exempted from poll tax for 1904.

Pauper allowance of Alex. Daniel was increased to \$2 per month.

J. R. Spier and H. A. Blow were appointed committee to investigate annual reports of the various county officers.

J. A. Hardee was re-elected superintendent of county home.

C. E. Fleming was elected standard keeper.

It was ordered that the sheriff be paid for only one extra deputy in criminal courts at \$2 per day.

A petition was filed asking that the public road leading from Herbert McGowan's to Hardee's run, which road was discontinued at last meeting, be reopened as a public road.

Richard Williams, register of deeds elect; Leon W. Tucker, sheriff elect; Samuel T. White, treasurer elect; John D. Cox, surveyor elect; William Fountain, coroner elect, tendered their official bonds which were accepted and each took their prescribed official oath.

R. E. Belcher, constable elect of Farmville township; J. R. Overton, constable elect of Pactolus township; John L. Taylor, constable elect of Bethel township; J. R. Galloway, constable elect of Chicod township; L. H. Cox, constable elect of Swift Creek township; F. B. Tucker, constable elect of Contentnea township; C. L. Parker, constable elect of Belvoir township; G. V. Smith, constable elect of Falkland township, and J. S. Ross, constable elect of Carolina township, each tendered his official bond which was accepted and the prescribed official oath taken.

The jurors for the January term of Superior Court were drawn.

Three Convicts Escape.

On Wednesday night three of the county road convicts made their escape at Farmville. The convict are at work near Farmville and at night the guards have been placing them in the Farmville guard house for safe keeping. The three, all colored, made their escape through a window in the upper story of the building.

The Japs on the hill are pouring hot shot on the Russians down in the harbor.

It is said Thomas E. Watson, late Populist candidate for president, has speeches to burn. It's a pity all of them are not cremated before they are delivered.

Christmas is almost here and the average young man is asking himself the question whether to marry and settle down or to spend all he has for presents.

Notwithstanding his secretary says the president has not planned a Southern trip, invitations continue to go up from notoriety hunting towns and cities.

It is said there will be a lot of changes going on in Russia in the near future. We hope they will change some of those miserable names we try to crack every day.

You will not see the cotton crop pan out as large as the government estimate, but all the same the report had its effect on the price and served the purpose of those who wanted to make a "rake off" at the expense of the cotton producer.

The Merchants Journal of Raleigh says that State Auditor B. F. Dixon will recommend to the coming legislature that the tax on merchants be repealed. This is a step in the right direction. The burden of taxation that has been placed upon merchants by our lawmakers is very unjust. The merchant has to pay his ad valorem tax on what he has, just like other people, which is right. But in addition to this the merchant has to pay a privilege tax for doing business, then he has to pay an additional tax on his gross sales. There never was a more unjust tax levied than this tax upon gross sales and the legislature should repeal it. There is no more consistency in taxing a merchant so much on what he sells than there would be in taxing a doctor so much per capita on his patients, or a butcher so much per head on every beef he sells, or the farmer so much per bale on the cotton he raises. It is better to encourage business than to hinder it with so much unjust taxation.

Governor Aycock's administration will soon be a thing of the past. To say that he has been a great Governor is no exaggeration. He has done more than any one else for the cause of education. He has by his untiring efforts started a move for higher education that will tell in years to come. And notwithstanding that certain Republican politicians tried during the last campaign to slander and belittle his administration, it is a fact that there never was a clearer or more patriotic administration in any State at any time. The name and fame of Chas. B. Aycock will live and be cherished long years after his defamers shall have been lost sight of by all living men. His story will say of him that he "was a great and good Governor and true to every trust."—Lexington Dispatch.

OVER TWO MILLION.

The State Auditor, B. F. Dixon, is at work on his annual report, and from it yesterday gave some advance figures on receipts and disbursements of the State.

The receipts from all sources for the general fund for the fiscal year just passed amount to \$2,115,849.01, the disbursements being \$1,896,603.00, this leaving a balance of \$219,245.11. This is the balance of receipts over disbursements for the present year, and this added to the balance on hand the first of December, 1903, gives a net balance for the general fund of \$339,683.30.

The balance of the school fund on hand December 1st, 1903, was \$30,107.09, the receipts for the fiscal year 1904, being \$33,856.57, making a total of \$63,963.66. The disbursements from this fund in 1904 amounted to \$56,549.85 leaving a balance of \$7,414.81. This added to the general fund gives a grand total of \$347,097.11 on hand.

Of the total disbursements charged to the educational fund, this being \$56,549.85, the sum of \$55,789.97 was loaned the various counties for use in building school houses. In 1903 there was loaned from the educational fund for building school houses \$63,413.78, which added to the 1904 loan for this purpose makes a total of \$119,203.76. These loans have been secured by notes signed by the Chairman and secretary of the County Board of Education in which the loan was secured. This fund belongs to the State, and will be returned, the loans having been made to assist in the erection of new school houses.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Some Results of the Watts Law

The best results of the Watts law can never be written. They are found in the banishment of places of disrepute in country districts, in removing temptation from boys, in putting school houses in place of stills, and in removing from political domination interests that put the saloon and the still above every other consideration. These are blessed fruits of this new law which will be better as the law is better understood and better enforced.

Statistical results are also gratifying. During the past years the number of retail liquor dealers has been reduced from 1,185 to 817. The Watts law has decreased the grain distilleries from 392 to 78. The wholesale liquor dealers have been reduced from 59 to 52. Before the Watts law was enacted North Carolina distilleries consumed 282,714 bushels of corn and other grain. Last year the operating distilleries consumed only 146,436 bushels. Under the Watts law farmers may convert their fruit into brandy and the number of fruit distilleries has increased from 442 to 462, which now produce 54,963 gallons, nearly all of which is apple brandy.

These figures show why the revenue doodles and gaugers and liquor dealers hate the Watts law!—Raleigh News and Observer.

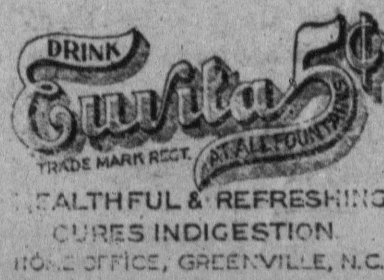
