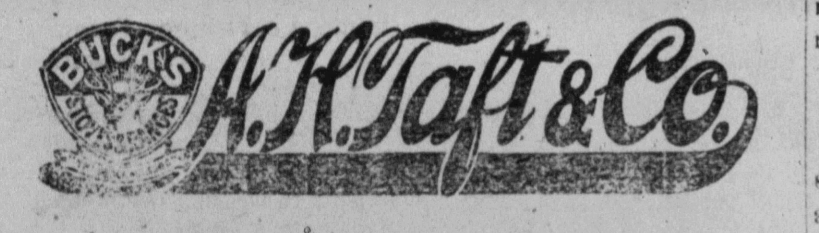

The latter won and the case may yet go to the Supreme Court. Bad as this is, it is not equal to the calf case tried here some fifteen years ago. A man sold another a calf for \$2.50 before paying for it the calf died and payment was refused. A suit was brought and it took three days to settle it. Judge Bryan, however, tells of one case that beats this—a suit that went through to the Supreme Court involving 17 cents worth of wheat straw. After once getting into the matter the costs become heavy and the fight is over this.—Greensboro Record.
