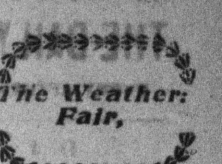

Her husband, William Moyer, was a well known merchant and cotton factor here for many years before his death. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. J. M. THE LEGISLATURE.

THURSDAY.

This being Lee's birthday both houses held short sessions and adjourned in honor of his memory.

Among the new bills in the senator was one creating a board of control for North Carolina industrial schools; one to disburse equal amounts per capita to land and naval forces for encampments.

Among the new bills in the house was one to revise, consolidate amend the pharmacy law; one to abolish tenancies by curtesy and make them tenancies in common; one to prohibit fishing with dutch nets, in Pamlico sound and Tar river; one to protect telephone messages by punishing mischievous listeners; one to appoint a cotton weigher for Ayden; one to amend law and punish the offense of taking a horse for temporary use; one in regard to running freight trains on Sunday; one to regulate dealing in futures; to establish a convict system for making roads in Greene county.

George E. Eldine, of Charlotte, committed suicide Wednesday, ending his life at the point of a pistol.

A charter has been granted a manufacturing company in Rockingham county with half a million dollars capital.

Charles Benton, of Wilson, an architect has been here drawing up plans and specifications for a brick block to be built by Dr. Joseph Dixon.

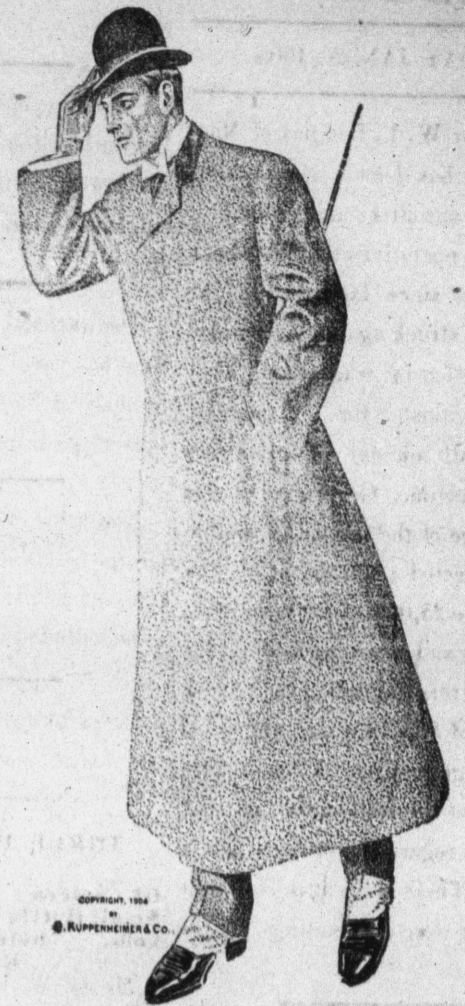
The electric light system seems to be doing a fine business. They are putting in new lines every day. Our people recognize a good thing when they see it and fully realize that electricity is a bright idea.

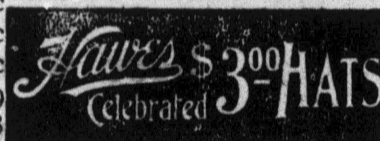
