THE LEGISLATURE

MONDAY.

Senator Ward, of Craven, introduced the most important measure that came up for consideration in the senate. This was an amendment to the Watts law that only makes that law stronger providing that whiskey shall be neither manufactured, sold or rectified in towns having less than 1500 population. It also provides that liquor cannot be bought at a drug store unless the prescription is accompanied by the written certificate of the head of the family stating that the same is needed for the use of some member of his family for medicinal purpose.

Senator Fleming presented a memorial from J. M. Cox, of Pitt county, that wants to remove the necessity of a married woman signing a deed or mortgage executed by her husband. In the house other memorials were presented on the matter of divorce.

Among the new bills were these: To amend the charter of the Raleigh and Pamlico sound railroad. To prohibit the operation of bucket shops. To regulate the sale of patent medicine containing alcohol, cocaine and opium. To govern the sale of cider. To encourage the pure in art.

Revolutions and riots are to be deplored, but it is hard to get American feeling up to the point of sympathy for Russia.

Richard Croker, of New York, who was badly injured in an automobile collision, died of his injuries Sunday morning.

According to reckoning by the calendar winter is half gone. The first half gave plenty of cold weather. We will be glad if the next half is milder.

Judge W. R. Allen who is holding this term of Pitt Superior court, has won the esteem of the people of the county by his method of conducting the court. He is an able judge, exceedingly pleasant in his address, clear and impartial in his decisions on all points coming under consideration, and firm in upholding the majesty of the law. He is an honor to the bench and to his state.

A party here from another town in which barrooms operate tells it is reported in his town that there are twenty five vacant houses for rent in Greenville, and that this town has been going back rapidly since the dispensary was established. Of course this story is told for effect, and it is very amusing to those who know better. We really would like for somebody to try to find the twenty-five vacant houses in Greenville. There are people wanting houses who would be glad to know where they are.

As had been feared from previous dispatches would be the result, Sunday was a day of rioting and bloodshed in St. Petersburg, the capital of Russia. Thousands of workmen growing tired of the oppression upon them united in a strike. They sent a message to the Czar asking for relief, but their petition fell on deaf ears. The strikers filled the streets near the palace in the hope of getting a hearing. Troops ordered them to disperse and upon refusal to do so they were fired upon and murdered by hundreds. This is the beginning of a revolution that will doubtless overthrow the present rule in Russia. With a revolution at home and a war with Japan the country noted for oppression has more on its hands than it knows what to do with.

The Republicans are certainly changing base. Whoever would have expected Senator Henry Cabot Lodge to say that he was in favor of a special court to pass upon freight rates, as he did at a club dinner in Boston Friday night? His idea is to have the special court not to fix rates but to say when they are too high. The question inevitably arises, what good will it do to say rates are too high if there is no power to make them lower? The present Interstate Commerce Commission has said time and again that rates at certain points were too high, but their saying so was all there was to it.—Greensboro Telegram.

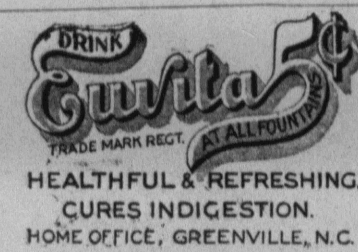

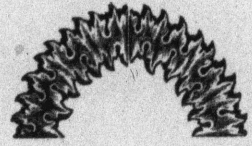
