THE LEGISLATURE.

WEDNESDAY

In the senate several more petitions against the existing divorce law were presented. The governor sent in a message accompanied by reports of several of the state officers. All the bills introduced were local in their nature except one for the protection of livery stable keepers and one providing right for illegitimate children to inherit equally from their mother.

The bill to exempt the town of Fountain from the act prohibiting the sale of liquor near certain churches passed its third reading.

In the house a large number of new bills were introduced, more than on any previous day of the session, but they were mainly local in character. Several resolutions on the divorce law offered.

Representative Glenn offered a bill to establish a reformatory for white juvenile offenders.

Representative Alley introduced a bill to provide a lien for purchase money of timber by stumpage.

THURSDAY.

There were several petitions for the repeal of the merchants tax. A bill was introduced to enforce the use of broad tires on roads. The bill to increase salaries of judges caused much discussion but passed third reading by very small majority.

In the house there was another influx of local bills. The day was largely consumed in discussing the bill to repeal the anti-jugylaw.

STATE NEWS.

A large distillery at Walnut Cave was burned Tuesday night.

Asheville got a good lick of the cold wave; the temperature there reaching 6 below zero.

Seven houses in Goldsboro were destroyed by fire Tuesday night. They were all small buildings.

Bethel Hill Institute, Roxboro was entirely destroyed by fire Wednesday evening. The loss was \$6,000 with only half the amount insured.

ANOTHER MURDER.

Will Williams Kills Lawrence Hopkins Over Cards.

Thursday afternoon on the plantation of county commissioner J. R. Barnhill, about 6 miles from town, a murder occurred. It seems that some negroes had gathered at the house of Will Williams, a tenant on the place, and were playing cards. Lawrence Hopkins won 25 cents from Williams and this enraged the latter. Williams first began taking spite on his wife and commenced beating her. Hopkins was about to leave the house when Williams grabbed a gun, put a shell in it and fired the load in Hopkins' temple, terribly mutilating the head and killing him almost instantly.

The coroner, Dr. William Fountain, went out to hold an inquest and found the facts from the testimony about as stated above.

Williams has not been captured but officers are hunting for him.

A. P. Lunceford is off at Hobbgood and other points up the road.

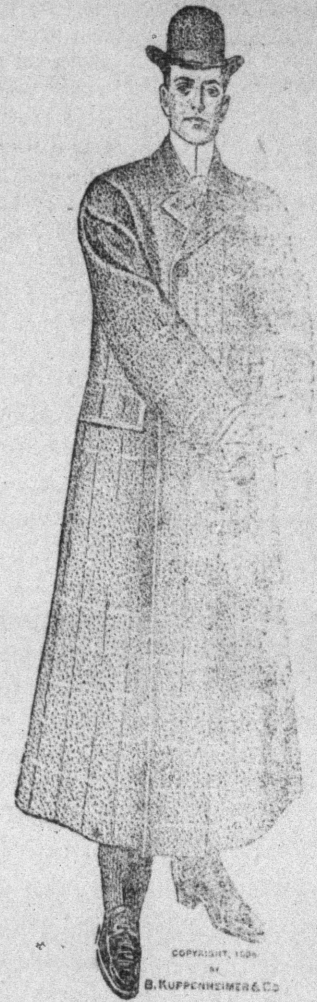

As yet no legislator has had the nerve to introduce a bill that will curtail the liberties of the dog. We are hopeful that it will come.

The cotton convention in New Orleans declared without a dissenting voice in favor of a 25 per cent. reduction in acreage and an equal reduction in commercial fertilizers.

Both the senate and house committees of the legislature have decided to strike the merchants tax from the revenue act. This decision of the committees should be approved by the assembly.

Five hundred citizens of Buncombe county have petitioned their senator for the enactment of a law prohibiting the running of automobiles on any public road in the county. The things are great for frightening horses, no doubt about that.

As to Witness Fees:

Here are some things suggested by the Rockingham Anglo Saxon that have long been a just cause for complaint, showing the need of some legislation as a matter of common justice to the citizens of the State. The Anglo-Saxon says:

"A witness summoned before a grand jury gets no pay, where a true bill is not found. Defendant's witnesses get nothing when a defendant is acquitted and the state, or rather the county is taxed with the cost.

"This looks like a hardship upon witnesses who are summoned because they were supposed to know something of a matter—it being presumed they have had opportunity to know something.

"A certain liquor dealer was supposed to have sold whiskey on Sunday, was presented before a grand jury. Two young men who sometimes drank whiskey, were summoned before that jury. They came Monday, spent four days at a hotel at the court house waiting to be called before that jury. They may have believed that the man sold whiskey on Sunday, but they did not know it, and a true bill was not returned to the court; they received no pay. And the clerk allowed them to throw away ten cents each in proving his attendance.

"If a defendant has you summoned and he comes clear, you are sure out your time and hotel bill. The solicitor and the state's witnesses get half fees. This doesn't look altogether right, but it is law.

"The reason this is so fixed is because so many take advantage of the court's unprincipled hangers-on around the court houses, who are looking for fees. But the county officers should know who are all right and who are not, and good, honest citizens should not be thus imposed upon."

It is manifestly unfair and unjust to require a man, under pain of penalty, to attend court, sacrifice his business interests, pay his own expenses, for—nobody knows how long, and be told when it is all over that his witness tickets and mileage strips are not worth a cent. We have in mind now a poor man who spent more than one hundred dollars cash, to say nothing of lost time in attending court as a witness for the defendant in a murder trial in which he cannot get a cent back. It is a rank outrage for the law to make such a demand of a citizen.—Raleigh Post.

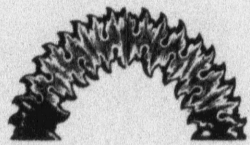
