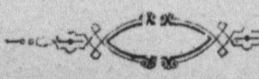

This was another of the quiet days with not much doing. The senate received several more petitions for the repeal of the merchants tax. There was also a memorial from the Daughters of the Confederacy asking that suitable marks be made to show position of North Carolina Confederates at Gettysburg and other places. A resolution was introduced to pay the expenses of the inauguration. An executive session confirmed the nominations made by Governor Glenn.

One new bill of general importance in the house was by Representative Butler providing for an appropriation of \$200,000 to be distributed among the public schools.

STATE NEWS

William Renegar, a farmer of Iredell county, committed suicide by hanging himself in his stables.

The first annual convention of the Southern Cotton Association will meet in Asheville on August 15th.

Washington Duke, the oldest citizen of Durham, fell down in his home a few days ago and fractured a hip bone. He is 84 years old.

R. O. Puryear, an engineer on the Southern railway, was instantly killed near Salisbury. He put his head out the window when he was struck by a mail crane.

Almost Killed By Engine.

Washington, N. C., Jan. 28.—William Latham, fireman on the steamer, "Albemarle," narrowly escaped death yesterday while on duty. Latham was using a crowbar to facilitate the movement of the engine which had stopped for the moment and starting up unexpectedly, the engine caught the iron bar in its turn and threw Latham with great force against the machinery, cutting a gash in his head and otherwise bruising him severely. Dr. Tayloe and Brown rendered instant aid at the Washington hospital, an institution recently organized here.

Mr. W. W. Satterwaite, foreman at the Havens Oil Company plant, met with a serious and well-nigh fatal accident while pouring some melted babbitt into a box on which he was working. Some of the metal splattered up and into his eyes. Medical attention was at once secured and the patient is getting along as well as possible in the circumstances.—News and Observer.

The Jimson Weed Did Her Up.

A Mrs. Marshall, of this city, will be a little more careful in the future as to how she takes old women's prescriptions. She had a cold, and "Bill" Smith's wife—everybody knows "Bill" Smith—"fixed" up some whiskey and hoarhound and gave her a full dose one day last week. A very good remedy, perhaps, if old lady Smith had not mistaken jimson weed for hoarhound. As it is, Mrs. Marshall is very sick, and for hours after she drank the whiskey etc., it took the combined efforts of three doctors to keep her alive. "She is now like an owl," said the physician who gave us the facts. "She can only see in the night." The jimson weed had the effect of enlarging the pupils of the eye, until she cannot see a wink in day-time, but her vision is good at night.—Mt. Airy News.

The Japs and the Russ are doing some more scrapping, but the report of it sounds almost like it was made up for the purpose of taking attention from the trouble in St. Petersburg.

The Charlotte Observer raises the timely point that the matter of the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad was settled some months ago, and the action of Kinston and some other towns along the road to have the legislature set the lease aside comes too late.

Mr. Page's Plight

Representative Page, of Biscoe, N. C., is in a plight, such as comes rarely to members of congress. He is the treasurer and chief owner of the Asheboro and Aberdeen Railroad, some eighty miles long. There was a wreck on that road the other evening, in which Rev. G. A. Oglesby, pastor of a neighboring church, was killed. It was the first time any one was ever killed on the road. Mr. Page was doubly grieved over the occurrence because it was unfortunate for his road and also because the victim was his warm personal friend.

But, to add to his troubles, Mr. Page learns that the dying request of Rev. Mr. Oglesby was that the member of congress should be the administrator of the estate. As the estate will naturally claim damages Mr. Page feels that it would put him in a delicate position to have to sue his own road. At the same time he does not like to refuse compliance with a dying friend's request.—Washington Post

The "Black List."

Some time ago the physicians of this county organized and got up a "black list." All who had refused to pay doctors bills were put on the list and the medical men agreed not to visit any one who was on the black list until the account of the physician who had put him on the black list was settled. The doctors have stuck to their agreement pretty well, so well that a petition is now being circulated asking the legislature to enact a law which will compel a physician to attend the sick when money is tendered for his services, if the physician has no other reason for refusing to answer the call than that the one calling him owes another physician.—Monroe Journal

Must Tell Where They Get Liquor.

Each defendant henceforth who is tried before the mayor or justice of the peace for drunkenness must be prepared to tell his honor where and from whom the whiskey that caused his intoxication was obtained. A statute of the State law gives to a magistrate the privilege of putting a defendant or witness on his oath to answer the questions that may be put to him as to where intoxicants were obtained. Refusal to answer imperils the defendant with a term of 30 days in the county jail. This statute will be the biggest bug-bear in the ears of the unlawful sellers of whiskey.—Lexington Dispatch

Col. J. Bryan Grimes has prepared and printed a convenient and valuable pocket manual for the use of members of the general assembly. It is full of interesting historical facts, many things every citizen would like to know, and facts that are indispensable to legislators. It required much time and care to prepare it, and Colonel Grimes is entitled to and will receive the thanks of the members for his painstaking and thoughtful work.—Raleigh Post

The patent office is one of the few bureaus of the government that pays its way and adds to the government revenue. Since 1837 it has been turning into the treasury of the United States large sums of money the amount this year approximating \$200,000. This, it will be understood, is a surplus after all expenses of the department are paid. It is stated in the patent office that the year 1904 will exceed all others in the number of patents issued. More than 31,000 were issued in 1903, but the figure for 1904 will be excess of 35,000. This gives some idea of the mechanical progress of the United States.—Durham Sun.

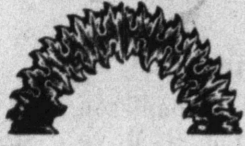
