THE LEGISLATURE.

SATURDAY.

A message was received from Governor Glenn urging the legislature to take some action in the matter of the bond suit by South Dakota against North Carolina. As to the judgment in favor of South Dakota the governor says only three courses are open: First, compromise on some just and fair terms; second, pay it; third, let the stock in North Carolina railroad be sold, or ordered by the court, and proceeds be used to satisfy the judgment.

The Ward bill passed third reading with only two votes against it.

The bill to extend and define the Greenville graded school district passed third reading.

No new bills of general importance were introduced.

The house had a large number of new bills, all of them of minor importance.

Woman Kills Assailant.

Givans, S. C., Feb. 11.—A killing took place near here this morning at about 6 o'clock. A peddler named Greenburg, frequently visited the home of J. D. Bivens, up to about a week ago, when he made advances to assault Miss Bivens and was arrested. He promised to pay a fine and leave the country if they would free him, which was done. But he came back last night and entered the Bivens house and made the same advances towards Mrs. Bivens, when she shot him with a shotgun, the load entering his neck. Magistrate Cummings was notified of the killing and he summoned a jury of inquest, the verdict being justifiable homicide. Mr. Bivens was in Columbia at the time.—Charlotte Observer.

THE MEETING.

Large Congregations Sunday—Two Great Sermons.

Notwithstanding the rain and mud large congregations heard Dr. Comann at the Methodist church Sunday. At the morning service he selected his text from Mat. 7 24-27. In discussing the importance of a secure foundation in character building, and the necessity of great care in the construction of the building, Dr. Comann developed several beautiful thoughts that were new to most of his hearers. He emphasized the fact that in a good sense judgment is now on with all who are living, and that at some time in the future—the great judgment day—our works are to pass in review before the high court of heaven. He affirmed that the devil is at large, permitted to roam about in earth and heaven to vex and accuse the children of God, and that Christ is our Advocate to defend us against the false accusations of the devil. It was indeed a great sermon.

At 2:30 P. M. the Sunday school and Epworth League met jointly in the church and Dr. Comann delivered an interesting talk to the young people on the wisdom of surrendering to Christ early in life. Close attention was paid to all the speaker had to say, and we are sure that good and lasting impressions were made upon their young minds.

At 7:30 Dr. Comann announced as his text John 3-3, "Jesus answered and said unto him, verily, verily I say unto thee, except a man be born again he cannot see kingdom of God." He drew a dark but scriptural picture of man's natural condition, and this without regard to surroundings, environments, blood or social standing in the world.

The respect that Virginia has for the execution of the law is a good example for other states to follow.

Gov. Vardaman, of Mississippi, says he will not attend the inauguration of the president. His absence will hardly detract from the ceremonies.

You should have added when the murder takes place in Charlottesville, Va., and not in Raleigh, N. C.

The Indianapolis Star speaks of the sun spot as "a 30 mile area," while other papers say it is 80,000 miles in diameter. The Montgomery Advertiser says that "between these two extremes there is room for several spots." Such reckless figuring creates a doubt about there being any spots on the sun at all.—Raleigh Post.

All of which goes to show that none of them know what they are talking about.

There is a great deal of disquietude in the ranks of the democratic party of North Carolina. For our lives we do not know why this should be, but in this statement we make no new contribution to the fund of common knowledge. If proof were necessary it could be found in the returns of the last election, when the democratic vote slumped and the republican vote increased. The next election occurs in an off year. In such years party ties sit more or less lightly and party men take vengeance. All this is said in friendship to the democratic party and by way of reminder to the democratic members of the general assembly. This is not a time for radicalism, but for the exercise of great and unusual prudence. If we were asked for advice and instructed to confine it to two words we should say Go Slow.—Charlotte Observer.

One of the most meritorious measures that has been introduced in the General Assembly is that by Senator Mason, of Gaston, forbidding any attorney from offering his services for the bringing of a suit against any person or corporation, under penalty of fine or imprisonment or disqualification for the practice. This has grown into a great evil in North Carolina. There are said to be instances on record of lawyers having approached the families of men killed on railroads and having offered to bring suit for damages, before the funerals or so soon thereafter as to render the offense against property scarcely less monstrous. This business of hunting up and working up damage suits is a scandal to the legal profession, which should in some way be stopped. It cheapens the profession, lowers the tone of the courts, and is an evil in every way.—Charlotte Observer.

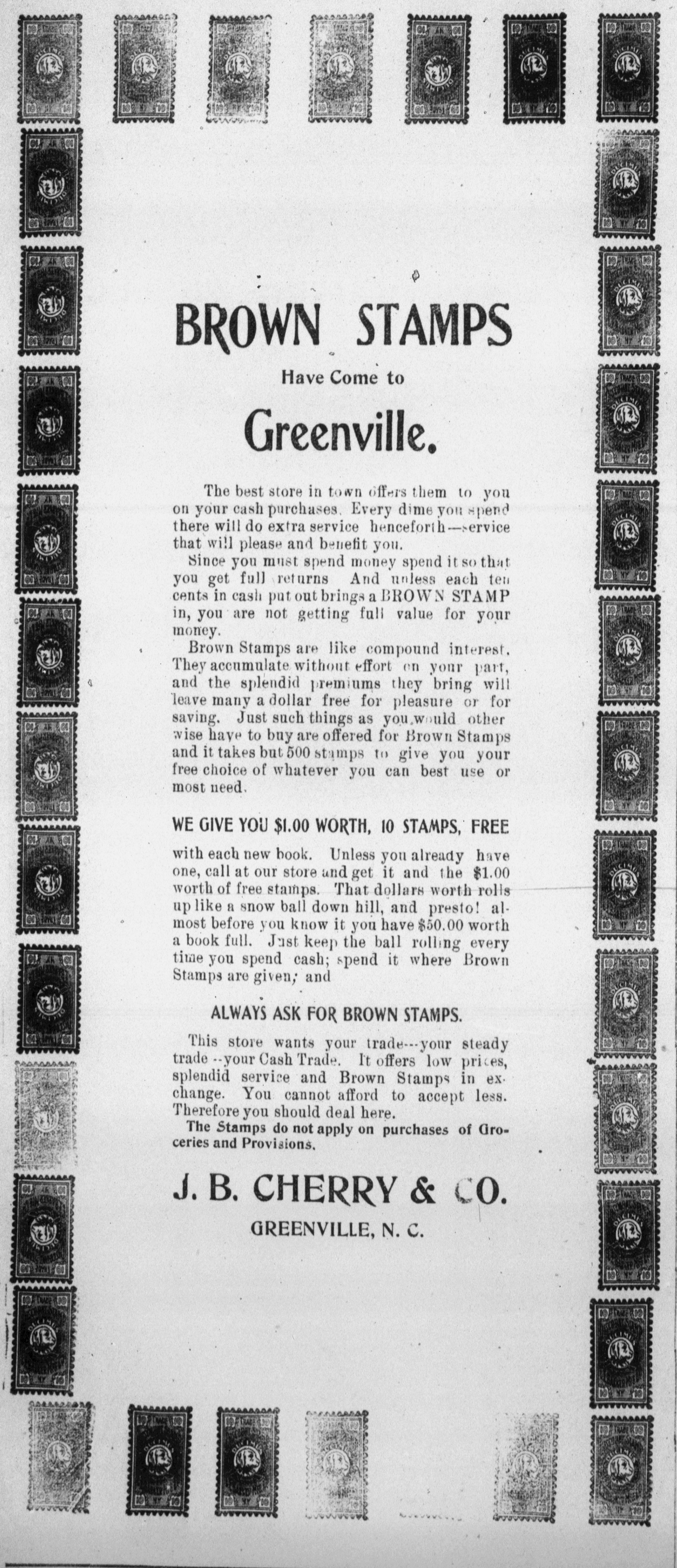
