THE LEGISLATURE.

MONDAY.

In the senate a bill was introduced providing that every rail road operating in the state and receiving franchises shall issue passes to the several state officers. Looking over the other new bills introduced none were found of general interest, all of them being local measures. The bill to amend the charter of Greenville passed third reading.

In the house Representative Laughinghouse introduced a bill to facilitate the collection of taxes in towns. The bill to extend the boundaries of Greenville graded school district passed third reading; also the bill to establish a stock law around the town of Winterville.

Over a Hundred Die.

Birmingham, Ala. Feb. 20.—By an explosion in the Virginia mines about 18 miles southwest of Birmingham at 4 o'clock this afternoon, between 110 and 136 union miners are entombed and it is believed that the entire number suffered death. Scores of vigorous rescuers are at work digging into the mine to relieve their friends and comrades on the inside. The explosion is believed to have been caused by an accumulation of dust although the mine has heretofore been noted for being entirely free from such. It is also believed that as the entire quota has probably been killed the details of the cause of the disaster will never be known.

Convicts Display Genius.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 20.—A complete counterfeiting outfit was found today in the cell at the State penitentiary, owned and operated by convicts. With the find was a number of spurious coins, mostly ten and twenty five cent pieces. The find was made by officers of the penitentiary Walter Turpia, a white convict and one of the most desperate of men, is said to have been connected with the gang, and it is believed that two others were associated with him, one of them a life man.

The coins are perfect as to size, figures, milling and thickness, but feel a little "greasy" and are lacking in weight. It was found that the men had been using a considerable quantity of canned goods, and that they melted the tin and the lead from the cans, and in this way got most of the metal they used. Some of the lead used in the showshop was also smuggled in to them.

THE WAY TO TEACH THEM A LESSON.

If those brutes who went into a factory at Wilson and shot down the superintendent are not justly and promptly punished, we shall think Wilson ought to be ceded to Virginia, at least long enough to get the benefit of her method of trials. Sunday was a day of big fires, several being reported in Monday's Charlotte Observer. Indianapolis lost eight large buildings with three hotels, the value being \$1,500,000. Detroit had a loss above \$80,000. Denver saw a whole block of stores and offices worth \$300,000 go up in smoke, and Dallas suffered to the extent of \$150,000.

As soon as Roosevelt was elected president he gave out the statement that he would not again be a candidate. With the inauguration yet to take place and a four years' term ahead of him, they are beginning to talk around Washington as to who will be his successor. There will be plenty of willing Barkises.

It is one thing to vote appropriations but quite another to pay them. The statement is made that the appropriations recommended by the committees of the present legislature one \$250,000 in excess of what the state revenues will be for the next two years. Let the members hurry up and go home or a bond issue may be a necessity.

Samuel Westray Battle, Jr., a son of Dr. S. Westray Battle, of Asheville, dropped dead Sunday at the Naval academy at Annapolis, Md. Young Battle was 21 years old and had been in the academy a little more than two years.

The Burdensome Poll Tax.

The system of taxation in North Carolina should be revised so as to greatly reduce the heavy and burdensome amounts—for state and municipality—poll tax charged. In Raleigh the poll tax is more than four times as much as is charged in the city of Norfolk. In the latter city the poll is only taxed \$1.50, one dollar for the state and fifty cents for the city.

In South Carolina poll tax is \$1.00 for the state and no poll tax can be levied by municipalities. It is the same in Georgia. In Tennessee the constitution provides that the state may levy not less than fifty cents and not more than one dollar on the poll, and the municipality shall not levy an amount in excess of that levied by the state, so that no more than two dollars can be collected in that state.

People will not seek homes where excessive and unjust taxes are demanded. Cities and towns offering the best inducements along these lines are always in the lead. Raleigh has a chance to do herself a good turn by being just to the citizens there now and by offering superior inducements to others to locate there.—Washington Gazette-Messenger.

Washington, Feb. 11.—Information is received at the life-saving bureau, that after a desperate twenty-eight hour battle, Thursday and Friday, the Cape Look, N. C., life-saving crew conquered a heavy sea piling over the shoals and succeeding in taking ashore from the standard four-masted schooner, Sarah Derossen, her captain and five of her crew. One man was washed overboard Wednesday and drowned.

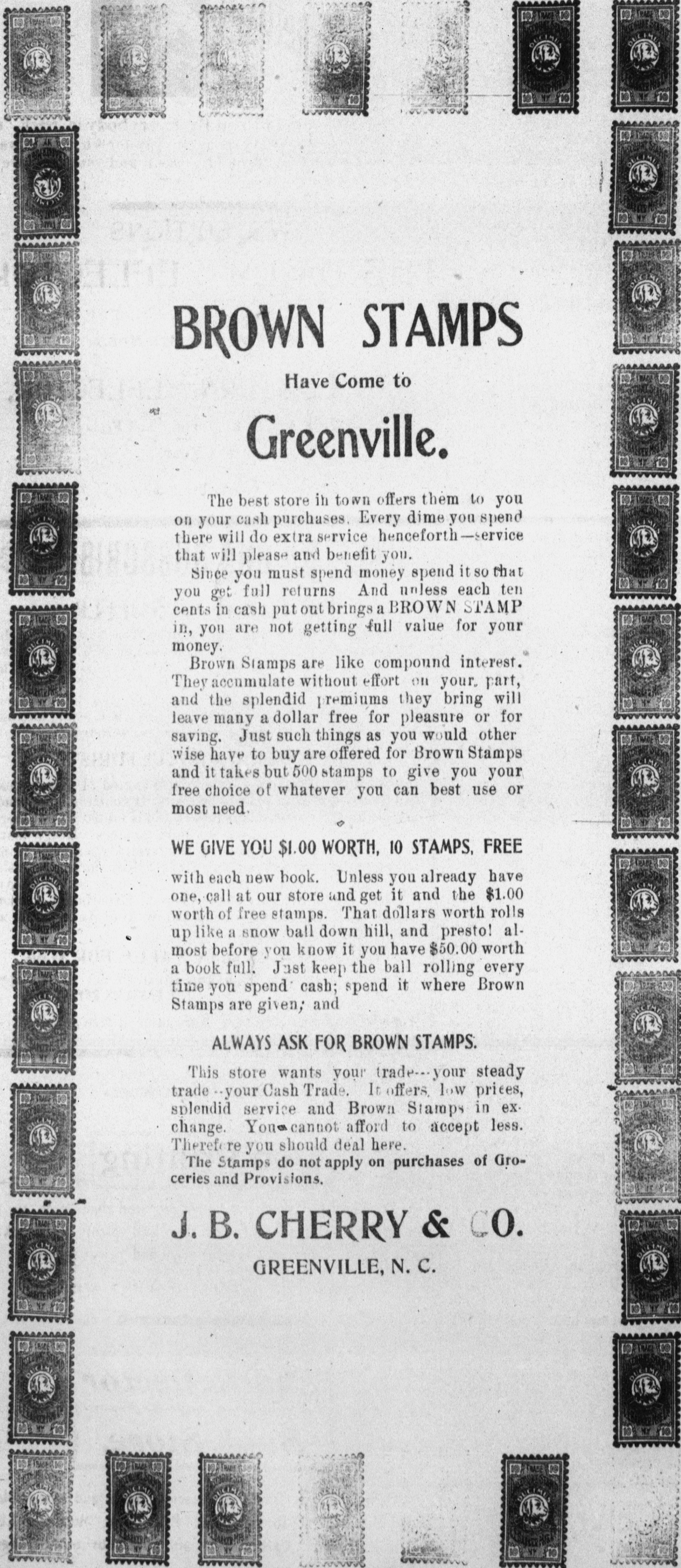
