COUNTY MATTERS

Proceedings of the Board of Commissioners

The board of county commissioners were in regular monthly session on the 6th, all the members being present.

Orders on the treasury were drawn aggregating as follows: For paupers \$160.25; county home \$158.88; convicting prisoners and insane \$4.65; convicts \$85.82; witness tickets \$73.29; bridges and ferries \$33.37; jail \$45.55; jury tickets \$2.20; constables \$1.85; small tax \$24.62; damage to horse \$10; stationery and books \$26.85; coal \$49.60; clerk court \$4.40; court cost \$10.50; coroner \$50.60; commissioners \$19.20; committee \$20; register of deeds \$12.25; stock law territory \$1,038.94.

The treasurer and superintendent of health filed their monthly reports.

S. F. Hardee, R. L. Baldree, George Haddock and James Manker were released from poll tax for 1904.

The following names were added to the pauper list to receive the amount stated per month: Martha Briley \$1; W. S. Dunn \$1; P. H. Cobb \$1.50; Willie Atkinson \$1; R. A. Roberson increased to \$1.50. Clayton Joyner was released from payment of taxes in Farmville township wrongly listed.

Sylvester Vance was released from school taxes charged in error.

James H. Moore was refunded 89 cents charged in error.

W. L. Brown was released from taxes on \$500 solvent credits.

The board contributed \$50 to the Confederate celebration to be held May 10th.

The committee heretofore appointed to examine reports of the county officers for year ending Dec. 4th, 1904, reported that every county officer had made satisfactory statements.

Petitions for public roads in Contentnea, Chicod and Carolina townships were presented.

Pitt County Legislation a Matter of National Interest.

The March number of "Law Notes," a magazine published at Northport, N. Y., contains the following item, which is of interest in North Carolina: "To Legislate Fleas Out of Churches.—The North Carolina Legislature is at present considering a bill to prohibit the attendance of fleas in the churches of Pitt county. It seems that in that county the churches are built on pillars with a space left between the floor and the earth, and in these sub-sanctuaries the hogs and goats of the neighborhood have been accustomed to foregather, bringing with them, after the custom of hogs and goats, sundry and divers fleas. As is well known, fleas have absolutely no local attachment and will forsake a hog for a Christian without the least compunction or regret. Consequently, religious exercises are rapidly losing their popularity in Pitt county, and the Legislature must take measures to prevent the county from turning heathen."

Girl Bitten by a Mad Dog.

The 12-year-old daughter of Mr. Butts, of Shine section, Greene county, was bitten a few days ago by a mad dog, the vicious brute inflicting serious and painful injuries to the little girl.

The child and her mother were sitting in their home when the dog came in and attacked the little girl, seizing her by her ankle, throwing her on the floor and severely tearing her flesh, the animal's teeth piercing to the bone. After biting the child the dog went on, attacking hogs, dogs and other animals that were in his path.

The little girl has been taken to Baltimore for the Pasteur treatment.—Kinston Free Press.

McAden Cotton Mills Robbed.

Charlotte, N. C., March 6.—The safe in the office of the McAden Cotton Mills, at McAdenville, N. C. was opened and robbed of between \$1,800 and \$2,000 and a number of valuable papers, some time between the closing hour Saturday night and this morning. It is plainly evident that the robbery was the work of professionals, but there is no clue as to the identity of the person or persons who committed the theft. The safe was opened by the combination which was changed in the operation.

Sensational Shooting.

Gastonia, N. C., March 6.—A very sensational shooting affray occurred at Bessemer City last night.

Mr. Charles Smith, 22 years old, was returning from the home of Miss Peola Jenkins, when some one fired five shots, one taking effect. The bullet passed through the fleshy portion of Smith's right leg, lodging in the left leg against the bone. It made a very painful but not dangerous wound. Suspicion points to Ed Jenkins, a half-brother of Miss Jenkins.

The Hun Reddened.

Mukden, March 7. The Japanese at 2 o'clock this morning attacked a Russian position on the Hun river from Machiapu. The artillery fire has been continuous and shifted northward after daylight almost to the Simmiatin road, from which wounded and Chinese refugees are arriving. Fighting is heard also to the northward. Numbers of wounded Japanese along the Simmiatin road have been brought in and cared for.

To Abandon Mukden.

Tokio, March 7.—It is reported that the Russians are preparing to abandon Mukden and Fushun and to retreat to Tie Pass.

They Find Strychnine.

Honolulu, March 7.—When the inquest into the death of Mrs. Jane L. Stanford was resumed today the first witness called to the stand was R. A. Duncan, Chemical Analyst to the Board of Health testified that the bottle of bicarbonate of soda found in Mrs. Stanford's room contained strychnine, estimated at half a grain. He said that no strychnine was found in the stomach, but that the color reaction characteristic of strychnine was obtained in tests of the intestines and kidneys. Dr. Edmund Shore corroborated Dr. Duncan's testimony.

No Carnival.

A representative of a street carnival company was here Tuesday endeavoring to work up interest in an exhibition for a week in Greenville. The board of aldermen held a special meeting at night to hear a proposition and consider the matter. After discussing the question fully the board by a vote of 5 to 2 decided against the carnival.

The Center Broken.

St. Petersburg, March 7.—A very specific report is circulating in exceedingly well informed quarters that the day has gone badly with General Kuropatkin, that the Russian centre is broken and that thirteen heavy siege guns have been captured by the Japanese. If this is true, it is pointed out here, the battle is lost.

NORTH CAROLINIANS INTERESTED.

The Lewis and Clark centennial to be held at Portland, Oregon, next June, to celebrate the one hundredth Anniversary of the completion of the survey of the Louisiana Purchase, will be of more than ordinary interest to the people of the Atlantic states, and especially to North Carolinians and Virginians. Lewis and Clark, who made the survey of the newly bought territory from the Mississippi river to the Pacific ocean, were Virginians. There is to be a Lewis and Clark day reunion of the Lewis and Clark families at Portland during the fair.

Public spirited and patriotic North Carolinians propose to participate in the functions of the Lewis and Clark centennial by celebrating the memory of one of her sons, Gen. Joe Lane, who moved to Oregon and participated in making the early domestic and political history of his adopted state. He became prominent in the political world of the Pacific coast and received the Democratic nomination of his party for vice president in 1860 on the ticket with John C. Breckenridge, of Kentucky. It is proposed to ask the managers of the centennial to designate a day during the fair period to be known as North Carolina and Joe Lane day, to celebrate the memory of Gen. Joe Lane, and all pioneer North Carolinians who participated in the hardships and struggles of life in the first settlement of that new country.

It will reflect great credit on the pluck, enterprise and patriotism of the people of the Old North State to unite with Oregon and the Pacific coast, in keeping fresh in the minds of the rising generations the heroic deeds of those noble sons who crossed the great American desert which was inhabited only by hands of savage Indians, buffaloes, deer, and blood thirsty wild beasts of the plains.

If satisfactory arrangements can be made with the railway company it is proposed to run an excursion from Richmond, Va., and Atlanta Ga., to Portland, Oregon, for North Carolina and Lane day. It will offer an opportunity to the people of the South Atlantic states to take a cheap and enjoyable trip to the Pacific slope, taking in the Yellowstone park, and many other interesting points, in the land of the golden sunset.

LOOKING TOWARD EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA.

During the Worlds fair at St. Louis last year there were a great many inquiries made by foreigners, and especially was it true of the Germans, about the cultivation of staple crops in the South. These investigations of the Germans led up to a point where they have become very much interested in the growing of tobacco, rice and trucking. One of the leading agriculturalists of Germany has taken such a deep interest in the South, that he has invited a number of his friends to accompany him to the United States for the purpose of looking at the lands and all agricultural and industrial conditions in North Carolina, of which he saw and heard so much of at the fair. The party is expected to reach New York about

April 5th, and will proceed at once to Norfolk, from which place they will start on an inspecting tour through Eastern North Carolina to see what are the chances for locating colonies, for agricultural and other industrial pursuits. Mr. Vonhall, of Berlin, Germany, will accompany the party through the South. His attention was especially attracted by the tobacco exhibit from Pitt county, at St. Louis. THE REFLECTOR hopes the party may be induced to come here while on their tour and look into the advantages Pitt county offers for the tobacco and trucking industries.

Eighty Million Short.

Conservative estimates, made by those who are more or less posted, place the shortage in bright tobaccos this year at eighty million pounds less than last year. We believe these figures are not far out of the way. The crop in South Carolina is about thirty millions less than last year, and in Eastern North Carolina it will fall behind at least thirty millions more, and add to these twenty millions short in the old belts, we have a shortage of eighty million pounds. We may be wrong in our estimates, in that the production this year may fall off nearly one hundred million pounds.

These estimates are getting down to the bottom of things, and are not speculative. It can be readily seen that there can be no excuse for low prices in the near future. We do not believe that the bright crop will be increased next year much over fifty million pounds, under favorable conditions. Farmers in the cotton belts, where the bulk of bright goods are produced, have been taught their lessons, and we do not believe they will again over-plant themselves. However, as to the future, we cannot say, but we do say that conditions, based upon facts and common sense, is most favorable to the tobacco producer, as well as those who are engaged in various branches of the trade.—Winston Tobacco Journal.

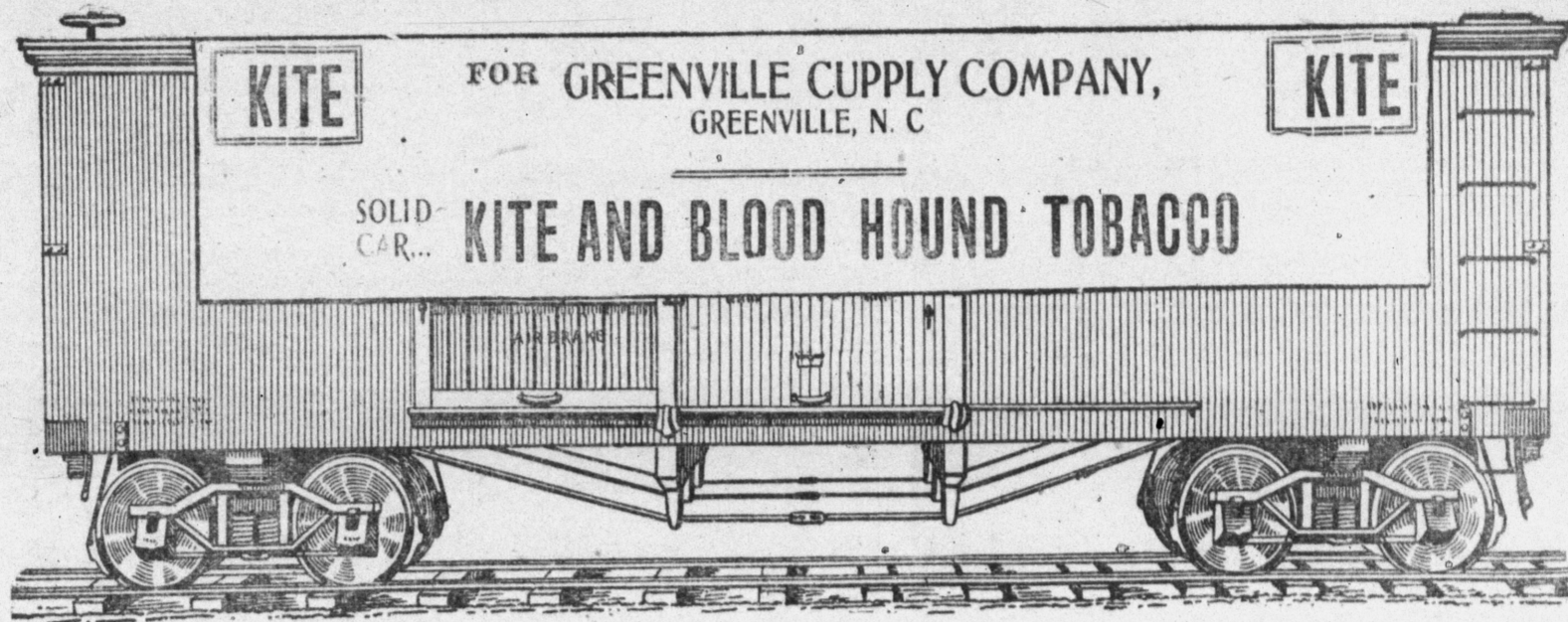

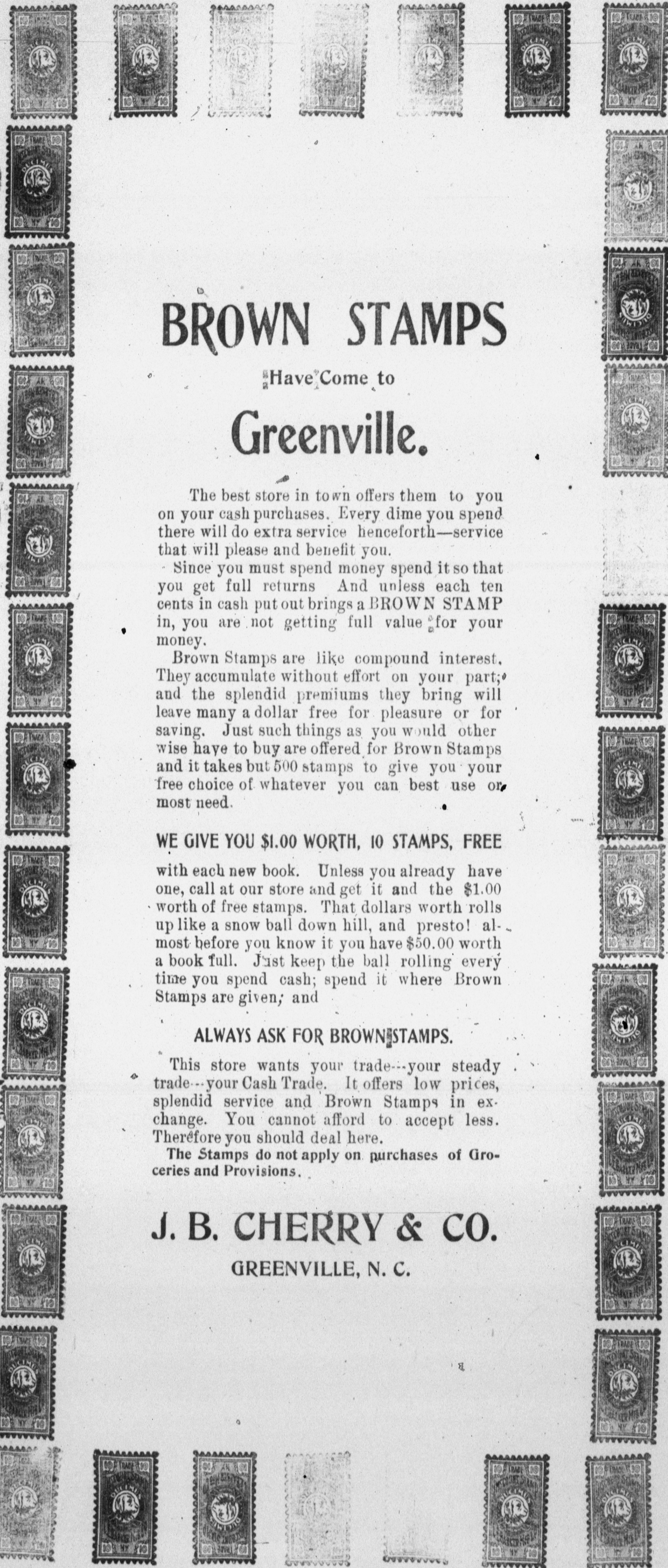
