ALDERMEN IN SPECIAL SESSION.

Invite Teachers to Hold Institute Here—Other Matters Before The Board.

The board of aldermen held a special meeting Tuesday night to consider several matters. One was in regard to having trash moved off the streets. There is so much trash put out Mondays and Thursdays that the town wagon cannot remove it promptly, and the matter of putting on another cart was discussed and referred to the street committee.

The most important matter before the meeting was the inviting of the teachers of the county to hold their next summer institute in Greenville. Two committees were appointed to take this matter in hand, one of them to raise funds to reduce board for the teachers, and one to canvass the town to secure boarding places for the teachers. We hope this movement will secure the holding of the institute here.

Application having been made for the purchase of the hand fire engine and hose with it, the board fixed the price at \$400.

The finance committee was instructed to ascertain upon what terms the \$10,000 to be used for sewerage can be borrowed and report to the board.

Pink Tea.

The Ladies Aid Society of the Christian church are making great preparations for the social event of the week, a "Pink Tea," to be held at the home of Mrs. T. E. Hooker on Friday night. The ladies are actively at work to place electric lights in the church and this is one of the methods adopted to raise the money. An admission fee of ten cents will be charged at the door and refreshments will be served free.

Fears for Rennenkampff.

London, March 21.—Russian official circles in London, although without official news are inclined to credit a Harbin story published in Paris connecting the firing reported to have been heard yesterday morning, about seven miles south of Tie Pass, with General Rennenkampff's division. The dispatch from Harbin points out that the only explanation of a cannonade in that locality is that Rennenkampff has at length arrived at Tie pass, where the Russian armies were ordered to rendezvous in case of retreat, but only to find the place occupied by the Japanese. Consequently it is feared that Rennenkampff is surrounded.

Cleveland, O., March 21.—It has been decided that Cashier Spear, of the defunct Citizens' National Bank, which was wrecked by Mrs. Chadwick, will be tried in the Federal court at the April term. Conspiracy is the indictment against him.

Now we'll see what kind of a boom for the presidency Fairbanks gets at Greensboro in the Tar Heel Club banquet.

Viewed from any standpoint you please, the South is always in the lead. Charleston had a colored collector of customs long before New York did.

The Orange, Va., Observer, a paper that is very much appreciated in this office, has just celebrated its twenty-fourth anniversary. The Observer is bright and sparkling, and we always read it with interest.

The REFLECTOR publishes in another column an act passed by the last legislature to enforce the Watts law. The wisdom of this law is readily seen. It makes it the duty of sheriffs, constables and police officers to seize illicit distilleries, and to arrest any person engaged in illicit distilling or who is found with unstamped liquor in his possession. Heretofore county and town officials throughout the state have largely left violations of liquor laws to officers of the revenue department, but this new law makes it their duty also to see that the Watts law is enforced.

TO ENFORCE WATTS ACT.

Measure That Will Enable Officers to Carry Out Law.

An act to amend section 1050 of the Code, laws of 1889, chapter 355, relative to giving further jurisdiction to process officers in the matter of the unlawful selling and manufacturing of intoxicating liquors.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That section 1050 of the Code and the laws of 1889, chapter 355, be and the same is hereby amended by adding the following thereto:

Section 2. That any person or persons who shall knowingly permit or allow any distillery or other apparatus for making or distilling of spirituous liquors to be set up for operation, or to be operated on lands in his possession or control, in any territory where the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors is prohibited by the State law, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished in the discretion of the court.

Section 3. That it shall be the duty of any officer mentioned in this act to search for and seize any distillery or apparatus used for the manufacture of spirituous liquors in violation of any State law, and to deliver the said distillery or apparatus to the proper authorities of the United States Government for confiscation. It shall also be the duty of said officer to destroy any materials in use or to be used, found at any distillery for the manufacture of intoxicating liquors contrary to law.

Section 4. That it shall be the duty of any officer mentioned in this act to seize any spirituous liquors found in the possession of any person not tax paid and stamped as required by the United States Government and to deliver the said liquors to the proper officials of the United States Government for confiscation.

Section 5. That it shall be the duty of the sheriff and his deputies and of any police officers when informed of violation of this act to procure warrants and to arrest the offender, and to subpoena all persons who may have information concerning the commission of the offense charged against the party arrested.

Section 6. That any person who shall unlawfully and illegally pro-

cure and deliver any spirituous or malt liquors to another shall be deemed and held in law to be the agent of the person or persons selling said spirituous and malt liquors and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished in the discretion of the court.

Section 7. Wherever the solicitor of any judicial district shall have good reason to believe that any person or persons shall have knowledge of the existence and establishment of any illicit distillery or that any person has sold liquor illegally, then it shall be lawful for said solicitor to apply to the clerk of the Superior Court of the county wherein said offense is supposed to have been committed to issue subpoenas for the said person or persons so having knowledge of said offense to appear before the next grand jury drawn for said county, there to testify upon oath what he may know touching the existence, establishment and whereabouts of said distillery or persons who have sold intoxicating liquors contrary to law; and who shall give the names and personal description of the keepers thereof, and such evidence when so obtained shall be considered and held in law as an information on oath upon which the said grand jury shall make presentment, as provided by law in other cases.

Section 8. That any officer mentioned in this act who shall fail or refuse to use due diligence in the execution of the provisions of this act, after being informed of violation thereof, shall be guilty of laches in office, and be cause for removal therefrom.

Section 9. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

The South Carolina Supreme court holds that it is libel to publish a white man as a negro. This decision was handed down in suits for \$10,000 each against The Charleston News and Courier and The Charleston Post, which had designated a white man as colored, but when the error was discovered, made corrections. The demurrer of the defendants was upheld by the lower court; but overruled by the highest tribunal. 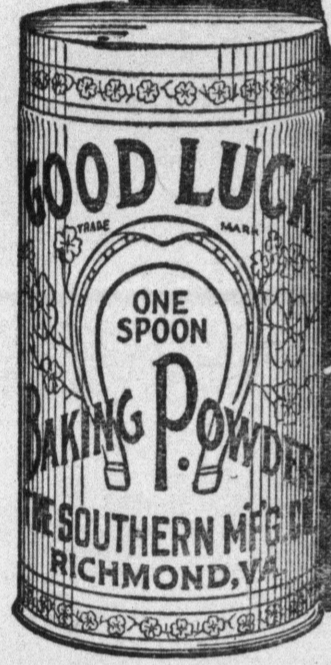

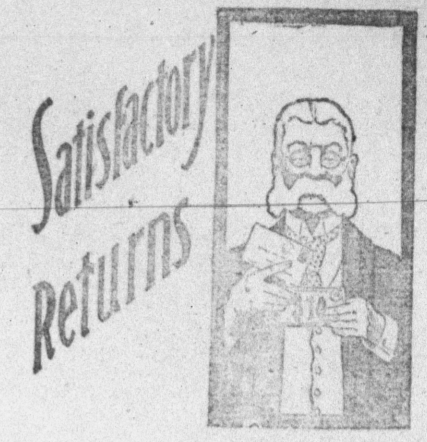

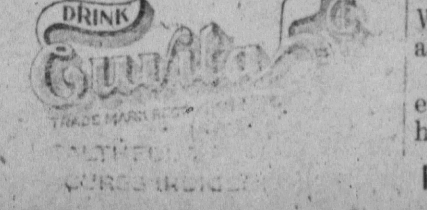
