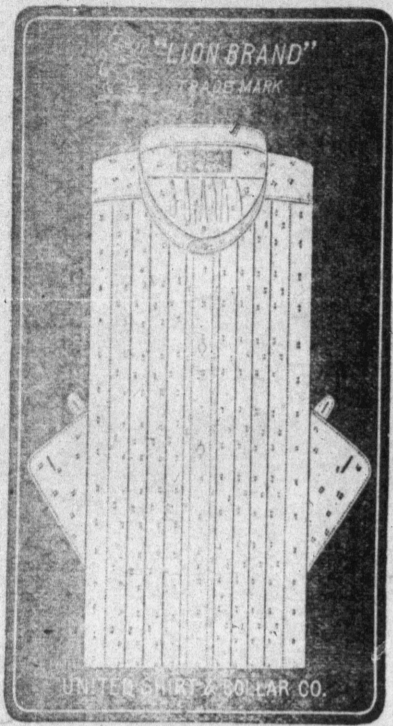

Whether Russia acknowledges she is whipped or not, the balance of the world knows she is.

The president cannot complain of the reception he is receiving along the route of his journey.

Almost as soon as the thunder storm season opens there begin to come accounts of deaths and damage by lightning. A woman was killed near Hamlet a few days ago.

That was a nice little speech of the president to the people of Indian Territory when he told them that he looked forward to meeting their congressmen and Senators in the near future. He knew just where to strike a popular chord and win applause, hence the prediction of their early admission to statehood.

In the eighth inter collegiate debate between representatives of the University of Georgia and the University of North Carolina, held Thursday night at Athens, Ga., North Carolina won the victory. There is some honor in a contest of this character and is far more creditable to the colleges than the baseball and football contests the schools depend on for a reputation.

It looks cruel that any reporter would send out such a fake story as the one a few days ago purporting that the last son of Senator Beasley, of Currituck county, had been found. The grief of the family over the disappearance of their little boy should be too sacred to tamper with in such way, and there ought to be some punishment for the correspondent who started such a story.

We hear much commendation from the friends of the old soldiers that the board of aldermen of Greenville made such a handsome donation for their entertainment at the coming reunion on May 10th. The board of county commissioners at a recent meeting also made a liberal donation for same purpose. We honor ourselves whenever we do all possible for the old veterans toward making happy their remaining days among us. The coming reunion ought to be the most successful yet held, and we hope every old soldier in reach of Greenville will be here on May 10th.

North Carolina at Appomattox

Next Sunday is the fortieth anniversary of the surrender of the Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox Court House and the collapse of the Southern Confederacy. The 9th of April, 1865, was on Sunday just as is the 9th of April, 1905, and because this anniversary is on Sunday the exercises attending the unveiling of North Carolina's monument will be held next day, on the 10th. This monument is the first and only one thus far erected at so historic a place, and it is eminently right and proper that North Carolina should have erected the first monument or memorial. Without disparaging the bravery of any other Confederate soldiers (for they were all brave) North Carolina proudly boasts that she was the "Last at Appomattox" because:

1. A North Carolinian, Major-General Bryan Grimes, planned the last battle fought there and commanded the infantry engaged there in, the greater part of which were North Carolina troops.

2. A North Carolina Brigade, commanded by General W. R. Cox, made the last charge and fired the last volley of any organized body of Confederates immediately preceding the surrender.

3. A detachment of North Carolina troops from the 4th and 14th regiments did the last fighting of any infantry after the withdrawal of the main body of the infantry.

4. North Carolina troops (Robert's Brigade of cavalry) captured the last cannon that were captured by the Army of Northern Virginia.

These four facts, which have been fully proved, make it most appropriate for North Carolina to be the first State to commemorate and perpetuate with a monument the heroism and unshaken fidelity with which her sons remained faithful to the end, even after all hope of success had vanished.—Pittsboro Record, April 6th.

Strawberries Being Damaged.

Much anxiety is felt by the strawberry growers in this section at present over the damage that is being done to the strawberry crop by the beetle, an insect which seems to be rapidly gaining in numbers and destructiveness. Reports come to us that the strawberry yield will be greatly reduced unless something is done to check the ravages of the insect.

The beetle seems to be more in prominence this year than ever before, although some growers were badly damaged by it last year, one claiming to have lost at least fifty per cent of his entire crop. We were shown this week by Mr. J. A. Westbrook one plant which contained a large number of buds, and all of them save two had been killed by the insect. He states that his entire crop is being damaged, and this is true with nearly every grower that we have been able to hear from.

The injury by this insect consists in depositing eggs within unopened buds, and then severing the stalks so that the buds wilt and finally drop to the ground.—Mount Olive Tribune.

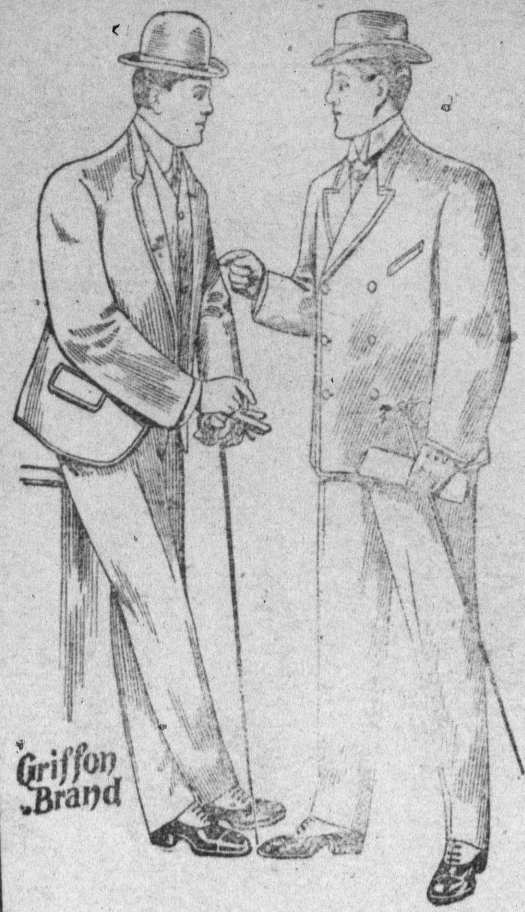
