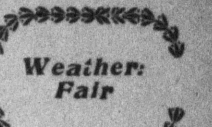

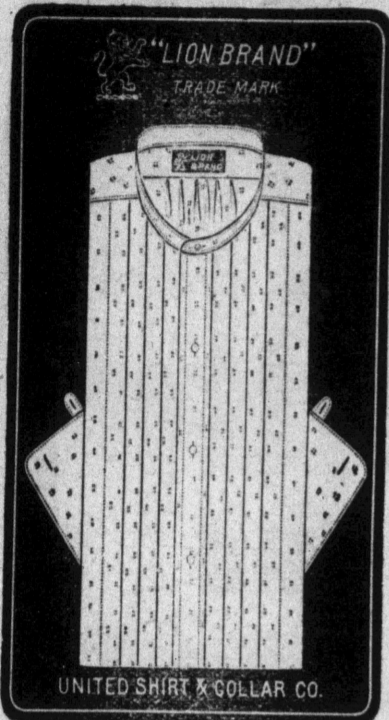

### STATE NEWS.

#### Good Strawberry Crop.

Reports from all the leading strawberry and vegetable points throughout the trucking belt of the Carolinas, to the Carolina Journal and True's Journal of Agriculture, indicate that the crop is good and weather and light frosts have done no damage to strawberries. The crop this year is a good one, and prices are fair.

#### Killed by a Baseball.

Engene Harris, age 15 years, son of J. J. Harris, of Biltmore, was struck in the head with a baseball Saturday afternoon at Asheville, shortly after 4 o'clock and killed. Two teams were playing a match game and Harris was the catcher for team, when he was struck in the back of the head, death resulted within a few minutes.

#### Placing the Furniture.

The furniture is being placed in the new union station in Durham. The city in the meantime is having all of the property on the condemned strip of land torn away and every arrangement is being made for an early opening of the new union station. There is no reason why the station should not be in use before the end of this month.

#### Two Men Shot

Two men, presumably professional safe crackers, were shot and seriously wounded by a posse of citizens in the woods four miles from Wadesboro late Saturday afternoon. A third man made his escape, and is being pursued. The wounded men have been lodged in Wadesboro jail. Both preserve absolute silence, and so far there is no clue as to their identity.

A quantity of nitro-glycerine, several tools, two dark lanterns, two pistols and a considerable amount of money was found on them.

#### Settlement Reached.

A compromise between the city of Durham and the Southern Railway Company has been arranged, and a long drawn out litigation settled. The settlement was arranged Saturday afternoon at a special meeting of the board of aldermen, when the aldermen endorsed and ratified an agreement that had been reached between the attorneys in the case.

Both the city and the Southern agree to dismiss the suits against each other, and the city repeals some of the restrictions regarding the laying of tracks on Pettigrew and Chapel Hill streets, while the railroad will take up the track recently laid on Pettigrew street.

### NEGRO SHOT.

#### One Negro Shoots Another in Hand and Side.

Early Saturday morning Ham Slaughter and Bert Outerbridge, two colored men, engaged in a quarrel at the factory of D. D. Overton, when Slaughter shot Outerbridge twice, once hitting the right hand and the other entering the right side.

The particulars of the difficulty are not known. Immediately after the shooting Slaughter rushed to the home of proprietor Overton, and informed him that he had shot Outerbridge. Slaughter then caught a train north, and has not yet been captured.

Outerbridge is at his home in a serious condition.

#### Orphans' Concert Tour.

On or about the tenth of May a chapter of children from the Oxford Orphan asylum will start upon a concert tour of the eastern part of North Carolina. After an interval of several weeks spent at Oxford, a tour of the middle and western parts of the state will begin the latter part of July.

The concert group is this year, composed of ten girls, four boys, with a lady and gentleman in charge—sixteen in all.

Our people have learned to expect from these boys and girls unusually bright, attractive entertainment.

The cause represented by the children strongly appeals to lovers of God and humanity. To help helpless, homeless children in such a way that they will, likely, become true helpers is indeed an important duty and a high privilege.

Interest in the orphans' homes of North Carolina is growing stronger and stronger and a ready and hearty response is always given by our good people to the claims and needs of these great institutions.

The outlook is bright for an exceptionally valuable, successful tour of the Oxford Orphan Asylum concert class this spring and summer.

Today this institution is caring for two hundred and seventy children.

Today North Carolina is "last at Appomattox."

All concerned can now take a rest. The mixup between Durham and the Southern has been settled.

Durham and the Southern railway have buried the hatchet and smoked the pipe of peace—we hope.

The move recently made by our town officials under the vagrancy law to rid Greenville of the gang of indolent negroes, who have been seen constantly loafing on our streets, is very gratifying and is to be commended. However, this law also applies to professional gamblers, and we believe that our town would be better off if a few of these "Jack legs" could meet the same fate that several of these negro loafers have met.

Now that Greenville has the dispensary and drunkenness is on the decrease is no reason why we should fold our hands and call off the fight against intemperance.

For many years the morals and growth of our town were hampered by the deadly effects of open saloons. Now that these saloons have been closed, and drunkenness is on the decrease, is no reason why we should cease our efforts. There is yet a great monster of evil among us, and the success that we have had only makes it doubly necessary that we fight to the finish, and rid our town and community of the deadly curse which has so long blighted our happiness and our prosperity.

The hearty invitation extended by the people of Greenville to the teachers of this county to hold their institute here during the summer, was only a manifestation of hospitality and courtesy on the part of Greenville. Our people were willing and anxious to do what they could to make the institute both profitable and pleasant to the teachers.

As the teachers did not choose to accept our hospitality, (and they could not accept the hospitality of all three places who offered it), we still hope that the institute this year will be the most profitable ever held, and that the people of Winterville, as well as the teachers, will reap much benefit from the institute.

A special from Durham says, "The W. R. Murray case is now almost ready to go before the supreme court. The case has been made up and the copy is ready for the printer. There are 203 type written pages in the case that will go before the court, this including all of the evidence as taken by the stenographer in the trial of the case. This is the case in which the defendant was convicted of manslaughter for killing J. S. Murray in a street duel here last fall. Judge Peebles sentenced him to two years on the roads and the defendant appealed. It is understood that the court will take up the case as soon as the brief is sent up."

As stated above W. R. Murray was convicted of manslaughter for killing his uncle, J. S. Murry, on the streets of Durham last fall. Regardless of the fact that the evidence showed that there had been ill feeling between the defendant and his uncle for some time; that two or three men were

fighting J. S. Murry at the time he was shot; that defendant wrenched the pistol from the hands of the murdered man, (thereby disarming him), and then pumped lead into him until he fell dead; regardless of all this, W. R. Murry was convicted of manslaughter, and sentenced by Judge Peebles to two years on the roads, and the defendant appealed.

The fact that W. R. Murray belongs to a lodge of blear-eyed Elks, and wears the badges of some high social societies, is no reason why he should not hang by his neck until he is dead, dead, dead, as other red-handed murderers have done.

The light punishment inflicted by our courts upon scoundrels, robbers, thieves and murderers, who have a little cash behind them, is to a large extent the cause of the tendency toward a growing disregard for the law, the proper respect for which is the palladium of our liberties, and the maintenance of which is the highest duty of the citizen.

**COFFEE AS A FUMIGANT.**

**No Pungent Burning Odor Eats Up Disagreeable Smells.**

"Coffee is an excellent fumigant, and one whose pungent odor vanishes more quickly than those in ordinary use," Professor Marcus I. Epstein states. "No matter what the disagreeable odor in the apartment may be, the coffee not only drives it out, but absorbs, decomposes it, one might say, and replaces it with the healthy odor of coffee, which cannot be disagreeable even to the most sensitive."

"A proof of the fact that the coffee actually absorbs the other odor is found when the coffee is first burned. If it simply drove the other odor from the room, the smell of coffee around the stove would be very strong, but it can hardly be noticed for some minutes, and then appears generally in all portions of the place being fumigated. To use coffee as a fumigant a quantity must be crushed and placed on the top of a very hot stove and allowed to burn, either directly on the stove or in a receptacle provided for the purpose. It destroys all odors effectually, and its own odor will vanish in one-fifth the time it takes to get rid of sulphur. Furthermore, one may move about in the room at will without suffering any inconvenience. A test of the utility of burning coffee for this purpose was recently made.

"A quantity of meat in a very bad condition was placed in a room and allowed to remain there, with the doors and windows closed, for some hours. When the room was opened the odor was such that none could enter without protecting their nostrils, but a quarter of a pound of coffee poured on the stove caused it to vanish completely within less than five minutes, and three minutes later the coffee odor had disappeared, and the atmosphere was fresh and sweet."—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

**The Doctor's Small Son.**

The five-year-old boy is usually a terrible infant. He acquires his full degree when he is much interested in his father's pursuits, and translates his knowledge in the terms of childhood, variegated by imagination. A Boston physician frequently consulted as an expert by life insurance people has a five-year-old son who is possessed by a desire to see what is going on in the private office.
