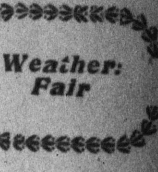

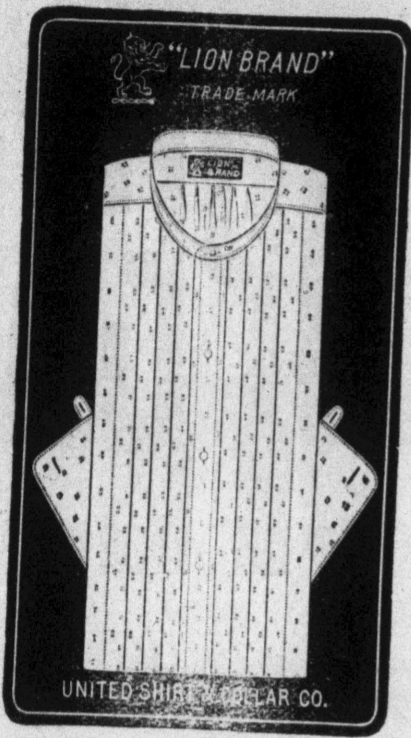

Thompson, of Wilmington, died Monday as the result of a violent form of lockjaw, following a wound inflicted a week before, by a colored boy, 10 years old, who threw a brick at his little white playmate, striking him a severe blow on the bridge of the nose. The boy is locked up at the police station, and has been sent over to Supreme court. He makes a free and open confession of everything.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE GREENVILLE BANKING & TRUST COMPANY.

The Cashier Interviewed as to the Progress of this Splendid Institution.

Today, the second annual meeting under the new organization, nearly all the stockholders were present and there was thorough satisfaction at the results of the past year's business.

"There was passed to the surplus fund \$6,500 and something like \$2,000 left in undivided profits."



TUESDAY, APR. 11, 1905.

The contest in the city of Wilmington which comes to a close today presents an interesting aspect to the people of the entire state. The intense interest manifested in the contest was not generated by the personalities of the leaders, though the leader on each side is magnetic interesting. Neither did the intense interest in the contest grow out of a conflict between political parties, for both factions belong to the same political party. Viewed from this distance the contest seems to be purely a moral one. Mayor Springer, the leader of one of the factions, stands for purity, sobriety, law and order, while Col. Waddell stands at the head of the great army that for one cause or another oppose them.

It is painful to write a sentence like this last one. Only a few short years ago Col. Waddell held the gratitude and esteem of the best people in the State. A man of fine address, undoubted courage, unsurpassed eloquence, and well furnished with valuable information on all important subjects. Up to a few years ago all these powers of this gifted man were exercised in the interest of good government and the people applauded. But in recent years the Colonel seems to have lost all interest in everything except open barrooms. Every time the people hear from the Colonel these days it is in connection with some sort of a fight in which liquor figures in one way or another. We sincerely trust that Mayor Springer may win out in the contest today, and that some friendly influences may cause Col. Waddell to pause, take his bearing and let the sun of his brilliant life go down behind no clouds.

At the fifth tri-ennial meeting of the National Council of Women of the United States, which convened Sunday in the First Congregational church of Washington, D. C., many women of national reputation delivered addresses.

Among them was Mary C. Terrell, who speaks of citizenship from a woman's point of view, and in this she touched on problems confronting the colored women. "The colored women of the country," she said, "are doing as much to promote good citizenship as their more fortunate sisters in white." She criticized the convict camp system of the South, and said that many good people sympathize deeply with the oppressed peasants of Russia, who either do not know or forget there are hundreds of colored women in the United States subjected to tortures as diabolical as those inflicted upon Russia's oppressed classes.

It's just such old crowing hens as this that are doing more than anything else to lessen respect for womanhood in our country. If some of the twentieth century women could only realize that it is just as becoming for them to get a few licks of work in at their homes as it is to get their names in print, some of our homes would not be so void of happiness.

Virginia does beat us in some things even if North Carolina was last at Appomattox. At Pulaski, in that state, a negro was indicted for murder, tried, convicted and sentenced in less than an hour. That record does the Old Dominion credit.

The vagrancy law enacted by the last legislature, which has been published in these columns, is worthy of the most careful thought and effective exercise of all the officials of every county, city and town in North Carolina.

There is no more efficient sheriff in the State than our young sheriff, Leon W. Tucker. He knows the people in every section, and is marking a reputation as sheriff of Pitt county that reflects credit upon himself and to the people.

The town officials are familiar with the names, faces and vocations of nearly all the people in their towns. The law is plain and mandatory and there is assurance that the executive and judicial officers of both towns and county can and will bring about a great reform in this class of violators of the law.

Man's inhumanity to man got a striking illustration a few days ago. A lumber laden schooner left Wilmington bound for Portland, Me. The schooner encountered unusual weather that caused it to spring a leak. It took all the crew could do to keep the vessel afloat and a distress signal was raised. A fishing smack answered the signal and was asked for five men to help keep the pumps running until the schooner could reach Norfolk. The men were sent aboard the schooner and Norfolk harbor was made in safety. The fishing smack also went on to Norfolk where the captain entered a claim for salvage against the schooner.

The irregularity in the arrival at this point of trains over the Atlantic Coast Line is causing much complaint. The Coast Line officials seem to know little, and care less about the convenience of the people in this section.

Freight and passenger rates are high enough on this line to justify excellent service, and we see no reason why passengers coming to this community should be held at Parmenter from thirty minutes to three hours, or why it should take from four days to two weeks to get a piece of freight from here to Tarboro or Rocky Mount.

Pitt county offers more comfort and pleasure to her teachers than any other county in the State—a summer school in mid Winter-ville.

Not so much ice and cold drinks will be needed to refresh and please the teachers at the summer school—because it is to be held in Winter-ville—in June.

The Greenville sea shore cut little "ice" with the teachers in selecting a place for the summer school—they preferred Winter-ville to such ice.

Which is the most attractive town in the Pitt county to ladies in summer? Why of course Winter-ville.

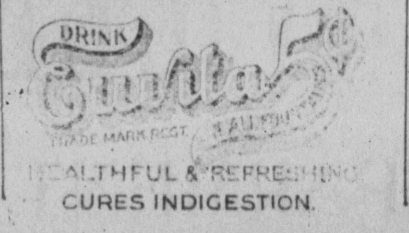

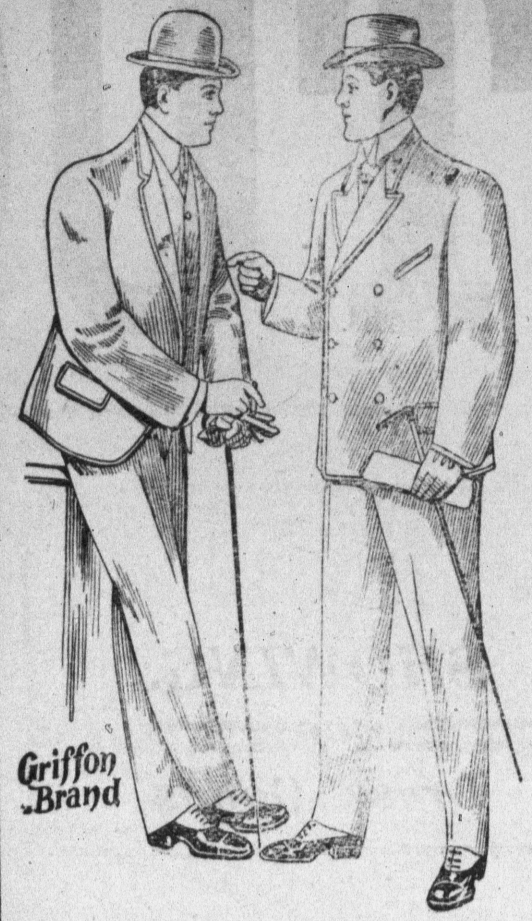
