In the first three hours there was about \$8,000 paid in and only \$300 paid out.

End of Contempt Case

The rule of contempt recently issued against the mayor and board of aldermen of Durham and J. Sprunt Hill was argued before Judge Prichard in the city of Asheville Tuesday.

After consideration of the answer filed by these officials of the city of Durham, Judge Prichard held that they were not guilty and ordered that they be discharged.

The case against J. Sprunt Hill was not concluded Tuesday, and will be resumed today.

Had Burglar Outfit.

At the request of Sheriff McLeod of Robeson county, Mr. Sandy Barker, one of the deputies, went to the camp of two suspicious men near Lumberton on Monday, and found one of the men at the camp. The officer told the man to hold up his hands and consider himself under arrest. This was not done promptly, and Mr. Barker at once mounted his man, and a fist and skull scrap followed. There is no telling what would have been the outcome had not certain dwellers in the community come to Mr. Barker's assistance.

They captured the man, and landed him in the Lumberton jail. He had the usual burglar outfit on his person, and maintains silence.



You need not be surprised to hear at any time that the Japs have done for the Russian fleet what Schley did for Cervera's.

You cannot ask for better evidence of the business men's appreciation of THE REFLECTOR than to look at our advertising columns.

The unveiling of the North Carolina monument at Appomattox was as auspicious as could be wished for. It was a great occasion that reflects credit upon both North Carolina and Virginia.

The way they are capturing safe-blowers and postoffice robbers along the borders of the two Carolinas may put a check on the depredations of this class of professionals for the time being.

In Colorado they already have a bear captured for the president to hunt. That may assure getting a shot quicker than having to hunt up one in the wilds of the mountains, but it is far less sporty.

The population of New York city is growing at the rate of 100,000 a year, it being estimated that the increase is 510,000 since the government census was taken five years ago. Such rapid growth beats the most of us.

We imagine it is no trouble now for the Salvation army to raise a collection in Charlotte, since the experience of the shoe clerk in that city. If others fail to get such returns it is no need their faith should waver, though expected return should not be the motive that prompts charitable giving.

It was the governors of North Carolina and Virginia this time. They clasped hands at Appomattox and as the old Rebel Yell was raised they pledged "to stand for the glory and honor of our commonwealths and to make them greater states in the union as we cement the long standing friendship between our people." That has the true ring about it.

In a case recently being tried before Judge Neal one of the lawyers referred to witnesses as *scattle*. The Judge at once mildly rebuked the lawyer, for which he deserves much commendation.

The fact is lawyers have been allowed to slur and abuse witnesses far too much in this state, and we are glad that Judge Neal is one Judge that is not afraid to rebuke a lawyer if necessary in protecting a witness.

That Winston distiller who was convicted in the Federal court of defrauding the government and had to pay \$9,000 or serve a term in prison, will have to send lots of circulars in the jug counties to make it back. The truth is, a business giving the government that kind of trouble ought to be stopped. It has been said that distilleries cannot carry on a profitable business without practicing fraud, yet they are licensed to do business.

The Appomattox edition of the News and Observer issued Tuesday of this week was one of the most in-

teresting and valuable editions ever issued by that enterprising journal. The articles, addresses and poems appearing in that issue are of intense interest to the old, the middle aged and young of our beloved Southland. No one who ever heard Gov. Glenn at his best can for one moment doubt that he maintained the dignity of his position and the honor of the State he loves. Editor Daniels deserves the success he has won in journalism.

Theodore Roosevelt has said and done many things to excite the hostility of the people of the South, and it is by no means easy to forget these things, nor or we quite sure that it is the duty of the South to forget them. At the same time facts are facts, and they are stubborn things to deal with. From the accounts we read of his visit through the South it seems that one protracted evasion is given him. We may try to make ourselves believe that this is because he is the chief executive of our great nation, and this does in some measure account for it, but not fully. The truth is, in spite of his grievous faults, the president is a good natured, courageous, big-hearted, magnetic man, and the people of the South as they come in contact with him, ignore his faults and admire his virtues, and this is as much to the credit of the South as it is to the president.

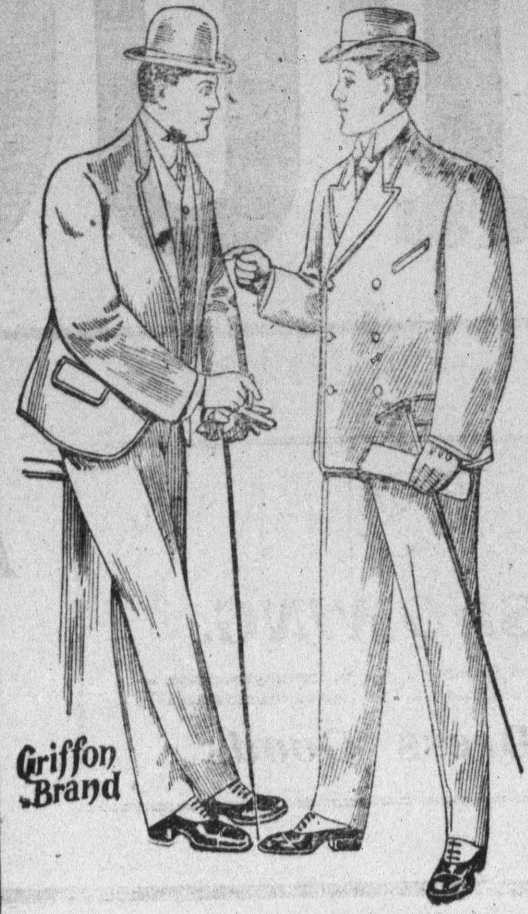
