At a meeting of the executive committee of the Confederate veterans association of Bryan Grimes camp held in the office of W. L. Brown, on April 11th, the following committee was appointed for the purpose of soliciting funds and eatables for the dinner on May 10. to wit: I. A. Sugg, A. J. Griffin and R. W. King. Col. Sugg reported that he had invited Senator B. R. Tillman, of South Carolina, to address the veterans on that occasion. A big crowd and a big time is expected on that day. We do hope the people of the town and county will come up liberally and help to make this an occasion long to be remembered in the lives of those who staked their lives for Southern rights and Southern women.

With Senator Tillman to be with us on that day, a man whom all know to be Southern to the core, the people may expect something worthy of coming out to hear, and to their tastes. Senator Tillman has been before the public gaze for many years and has fought many hard battles for the cause of the South since the war, and in all the bitter conflicts has never come out second best in any contest. We hope the people will not wait for the committee to see them, but will bring and send their means, turkeys, chickens, hams and any other edibles that can make the old soldiers happy. PEEPER CAUGHT.

Will Have to Answer Charges in Superior Court

Squire C. D. Rountree had a complaint before him this morning that stumped him for the time being and put him back to studying law.

W. P. Edwards was the complainant, and he wanted a warrant against Jordan Davis, colored, an inhabitant of New Town.

Somebody had lately been annoying the family of L. H. Smith, in South Greenville, by prowling around the windows and peeping through the blinds. Once Mrs. Smith had thrown open the blinds and frightened the intruder off Mr. Edwards, who is a brother-in-law of Mrs. Smith, was told what was going on and at once made up his mind to catch somebody. Thursday night he went to the Smith home but did not tell anyone his plans, and after sitting awhile with the family left the house. He did not leave the vicinity, however, but secreted himself in a convenient place to do some watching.

The wait was not long. A man soon came along, slipped up to the window and peeped in a few minutes. The man passed, then turned and came back to the window and peeped in again. He repeated this again when Mr. Edwards stepped out of his hiding place and grabbed him. Davis was turned over to an officer and gave bond for his appearance this morning.

After Squire Rountree got through looking up the law he drew a warrant containing three charges—trespass, eavesdropping and disorderly conduct.

At the preliminary hearing the evidence against Davis was such that he was bound over to Superior court. He gave bond in the sum of \$100 and was released.

Colored Man Drowned.

Thursday night Ben Banks and Rufus Reeves, both colored, went down to Red Banks, two miles below town, skinning for shad. They had caught several and were striking for another when their skid filled with water. Reeves jumped out of the boat and swam ashore, but Banks could not swim and was drowned. The body had not been recovered at last report.

Further than that, the men declined to attend mess if the new bridegroom was allowed to be present. The officers could not take official notice of the matter but unofficially had to solve the problem by issuing the 'unrecognized,' independent rations, with permission to eat them wherever he chose, except in the mess hall. The men are demanding that the repugnant miscegenationist be dismissed 'without honor.'" The authorities will doubtless find some way of getting him out of the service. —Charlotte Chronicle.

The Appomattox Statue.

It is to be regretted that there is some evidence of friction between Virginia and North Carolina because of the inscription on the monument the latter State has caused to be placed on the field of Appomattox to commemorate the valor of her soldiery who fought and fell for the "Lost Cause." "First at Bethel; farthest at Gettysburg; last at Appomattox." It is a proud record; but there was "glory enough for all," and old Virginia has too much lustre of her own to challenge the chronicle of her sister State's fame.

When the grand old Landdaman Blederman gave the English bow to Anne of Geierstein for young Philipson to try his skill, his elder guest expressed surprise at seeing in a Swiss tower such a weapon with the mark of its English maker, and asked its history. The answer of the noble old Switzer was that it would grieve his guest to recount it, since "it was taken in a day fatal to your country." To that the lofty Vere de Vere replied: "My country has gained so many victories that her children may well afford to hear of a single defeat." And Virginia has so many deeds of her own to boast that she need not envy the proudest inscription Carolina might carve. On the contrary, she might cultivate the spirit of Nelson the day he died—"See how that noble fellow, Colingwood, carries his ship into action."

There is glory enough for both Virginia and North Carolina. That is the thing for them to remember.

Neither Virginia nor North Carolina caused the war. Both entered upon the struggle reluctantly, but, being engaged, they threw away the scabbard. Both were at Gettysburg, and if North Carolina was a few paces to the advance of where Armistead fell, it was the chance of battle and did not evidence that her troops were more valorous than those of her sister Commonwealth.—Washington Post.

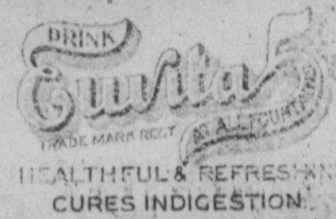
