### Car Load of Common Seed.

As incredulous as it may appear asolid car load of what is commonly known as Jerusalem oak seed was shipped from this city north yesterday.

This common seed, which is the result of dead Jerusalem oak, furnishes a fine foundation for a certain class of oil which is sold by druggists throughout the land. It is used for a number of medical purposes. The car was loaded near the foot of Market street and the seeds were obtained from Brunswick county, probably costing about 5 cents per pound. The Jerusalem oak grows wild and when frost hits it dies immediately. Then the seeds, which are numerous, fall off. They are gathered and packed in sacks and sold.—Wilmington Dispatch.

### ANNUAL REPORT.

Presbyterian Church Makes Good Showing for Past Year.

The Presbyterian church reports the following contributions for the year ending March 31st, 1905: Foreign Missions, \$18.67; General Assembly's Home Missions, \$4.09; Home Missions in Presbytery and Synod, \$81.95; Education (20th Century Fund), \$34.50; Publication, \$1.00; Colored Evangelization, \$1.00; Presbyterial, \$8.00; Pastor's salary, \$350; Congregational expenses, \$149.71; total, \$648.25, from a membership of 46. These figures show a decided gain from last year.

In submitting this report the pastor announced his purpose to ask Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relation existing between himself and the Greenville church. Albemarle Presbytery meets in Raleigh the 18th, inst., when this request will be considered.

### Died.

Mr. Orren Florah, formerly of Edgecombe county, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. W. T. Godwin, on Dickinson avenue, with whom he has lived for some time, at six o'clock this morning. For sometime Mr. Florah has been in bad health, and while his death comes as a great shock to his friends and relatives, it was not altogether unexpected.

The deceased was a resident of Edgecombe county, and was an active member of Temperance Hall Methodist church in that county. He was about 55 years old and is survived by two sisters and other relatives all of whom have the sympathy of the entire community. The burial will take place tomorrow afternoon at the Methodist cemetery at 4 o'clock.

### Another Road Hand.

Greenville has given up another of her citizens to join Guard Joe McLawhorn's force who are making time on the public roads. Leon Patrick, of color, whose occupation has been chiefly raising devilment, was sent over by Mayor Woolen for thirty days. Patrick would have been scooped by Sheriff Tucker for vagrancy, but the town already had a claim on him for disorderliness, and the mayor gave him an order for a month's rations with the road hands.

### Increased Salary.

At a conference of the members of the Baptist church Sunday morning the church voted unanimously to increase the salary of the pastor to \$1,000 a year. Two years ago the salary was increased from \$700 to \$800, and since that time the church has so increased in strength and membership that it is well able to make the further increase voted on Sunday. Every department of the church work is progressing.

### Cold Does Damage.

This cold snap is playing havoc with early vegetables and fruit prospects. All day Sunday there were predictions that frost would come. The wind was from the north and blew cold, which in itself was damaging to tender vegetation. The wind kept down most of the frost but brought ice in its place. ## NORTH CAROLINA AT APPOMATTOX

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I have been asked by a number of the old soldiers who followed the army of Northern Virginia to the fatal field of Appomattox, to give them through your paper an outline of the exercises incident upon the unveiling ceremonies of the monument erected where Gen. Grimes' men made the last gallant charge and fired the last volley that was fired by any organized body of the military forces of that army.

I wish that I were capable of expressing my feelings on that occasion but language is wholly inadequate as a medium to express such emotions.

To one who like myself was not a participant in that glorious struggle but was born during that awful, that terrible chaotic period known to history as the reconstruction era, the impulses, the expressions of those old soldiers assembled there last Monday just forty years from the day on which they stacked their arms and were allowed to go home and try again to pick up the thread of life, their beaming countenances, their eyes lit again with the fire of inspiration that smoothly flows at the mention of heroic, martial effort, the eager, anxious look, and tear wet face of many as their eyes met once again the familiar objects and scenes of forty years ago, the alertness and vigor with which they agreed, yielded or approved suggestions or contentions about the final ending of that greatest and most terrible of all wars—produced upon the mind a feeling of wonderment, an enthusiasm and an admiration that cannot be uttered in words much less put on paper. I felt as I truly was on sacred historic ground—ground that was bathed in the last ebbing life blood of an heroic nation, ground that held beneath its bosom the decaying bones of heroes offered as a last sacrifice to the short lived but brilliant young republic. Therefore I say to attempt to portray my feelings on that occasion were futile and useless, but for the sake of the old soldiers of the country for whom I have always held the highest regard and respect I will tell as best I can the incidents of the occasion.

I left Greenville Sunday morning with Messrs. A. A. Forbes and Frank Wilson. At Parmele we were joined by Mr. R. R. Fleming, of Pactolus. At Weldon we met quite a number of old Confederates, among them Mr. Frank Barnes, of Wilson.

As our train approached Petersburg we passed along the lines where many of the battles of the war were fought. To me it was most interesting indeed to hear and see those old soldiers point out the different scenes of conflict in which they participated in what is known as the trenches.

We reached the little village of Appomattox about 1 o'clock Monday morning and spent the remainder of the night sitting in the hotel office waiting for day, as every room in the town was filled early Sunday morning.

There was a large number of those who could not get rooms, but were made as comfortable as the circumstances would admit. Early Monday morning the little town was full of life and after the crowd was served to a splendid breakfast they began moving out to the old battle field some three miles inland from the railroad station. Mr. Fleming, Mr. Forbes and Hon. C. P. Watson, of Winston, and I went out together. At the old court house near which the terms of surrender were agreed to between Generals Lee and Grant, we discharged the driver and joined Mr. R. H. Ricks, of Nash, and Dr. Pitt, of Edgecombe, in going over the different points of interest.

Every man in our party was present except myself, and were paraded there just forty years ago that day. I did not in the least degree feel lonesome, though. After looking over the ground while Mr. Fleming walked to a spot on the road side and said, "Gentlemen, I am now not six feet from the spot where I stacked my gun forty years ago today at about this hour."

From the tablets placed there it is easy to locate the position of the two armies. I visited the spot where the apple tree grew. I have heard it said there was no apple tree, but there was, and every piece of wood about it even to the roots were quickly taken away as souvenirs. It was under this tree that Gen. Lee waited for the courier whom he had sent with a message to Gen. Grant, looking to the terms of surrender. This spot is some six hundred yards from the court house.

Right near the court house, which was burned a few years ago, was the McLane house in which Generals Grant and Lee signed the instrument which ended the war. This house has been torn down but all the timbers are piled on the spot and a guard is kept over it. Appomattox court house stood just about midway between where Gen. Lee had his headquarters on this occasion and where Gen. Cox's brigade made the last charge, and from the information I gathered from those who were there it seems that a part of the Federal army under Sheridan and Custer had during the night thrown itself across the Confederate lines right at the court house, thus cutting off Gen. Grimes from the main army. From Gen. Grimes' position to Gen. Lee's headquarters the distance is something near one and one-half to two miles, hence in the light of these facts it is plain why general Grimes did not understand the order to withdraw and cease firing after he had cut his way through and church the road to Lynchburg.

The monument unveiled there on the 10th is right on or near the spot where this last fighting by Grimes' men took place. Maj. H. A. London, who was on Gen. Grimes' staff, was master of ceremonies on this occasion and a master of the art indeed he was. After briefly, but with force and vigor stating the reasons for the inscription on the monument, he introduced Gov. Montague, of Virginia, who made a most appropriate speech of welcome. His talk was a gem of force and excellence, after him Gov. Glenn spoke for about an hour, and I don't believe that the time or circumstance will again occur when he will be able to use his great talents to better purpose and in better taste than he did on this occasion. He spoke with force and strength inspired by a love labor and deep conviction. His description of the charge of North Carolina and Virginia soldiers at the battle of Gettysburg was simply indescribably grand and sublime. In explaining the claim made by North Carolina at Gettysburg he said the Confederates were ordered to go to a stone fence in front of the enemy and that the fence so curved that it was closer to the Virginia troops, whereas the fence in front of the North Carolina troops was farther off, consequently nearer the enemy, and to get to that fence they simply had to go further. That the soldiers from both states did what they were told to do, they went to the fence but the force of circumstances were just such that in doing their duty the North Carolina troops just had to approach nearer the enemy, that in making the claim North Carolina intended no disparagement, no reflection on the heroism, patriotism or glory and honor of the Virginia soldiers. In closing his speech in a magnificent climax he turned to Gov. Montague and they clasped hands and pledged the everlasting friendship of both states.

Gen. W. P. Roberts, the youngest General in the Confederate army, who made the last cavalry charge and captured the last Federals at Appomattox, was present and spoke eloquently of the fortitude, bravery and forbearance of the Confederate soldiers. His tribute to the women of the South was beautiful indeed.

Gen. Roberts is one of the most picturesque looking men I ever saw—tall, straight and handsome. He looks and moves like a thoroughbred fighter. Every muscle of his face bespeaks the fighter, but in his large expressive brown eye there is almost hidden the twinkle of friendship, but when awakened by kindly appeal sets off most charmingly the otherwise iron features. There were also present quite a number of Northern soldiers who were there with Grant at the surrender, among them Maj. Arms of the United States Army retired. Maj. Arms owns the Appomattox battlefield and gave to the state a deed for the land on which the monument stands. He made a very nice and appropriate talk for the occasion, praising the Confederate soldiers and commending the North Carolinians for the spirit that prompted them to erect the monument. After these exercises the monument was unveiled by Mrs. Mary Grimes Smith, daughter of Gen. Bryan Grimes, after which several smaller memorials were unveiled commemorative of different deeds of valor and heroism performed by the brave men who there fought the last battle of the greatest of all civil wars.

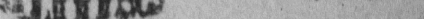

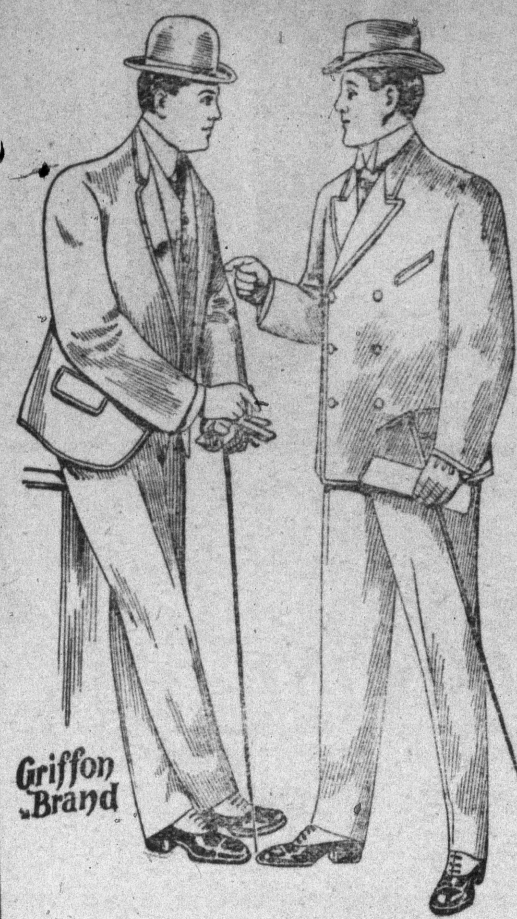
