There were regular services in the Methodist and Disciple church Sunday.

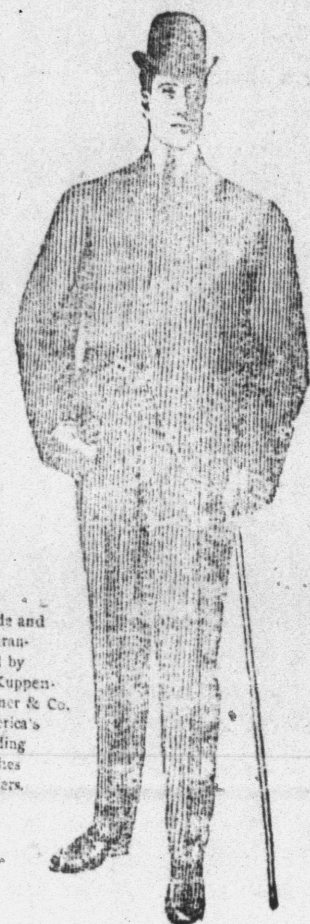
Dr. C. A. Blount, of Standard, paid us a very pleasant visit Saturday.

The interest that is being awakened all over the country in the Jamestown centennial exposition, to be held at Norfolk two years hence, indicates that it is to be a great success. Every state so far visited in behalf of the enterprise has encouraged it.

NORTH CAROLINA AND VIRGINIA.

If any one has an idea that there is animosity between the people of North Carolina and Virginia over the Appomattox monument, let him read the following suggestion from the Richmond Times-Dispatch and dispel the thought.

"TO THE PRESS OF NORTH CAROLINA AND VIRGINIA—GREETING:

"We have had a bout with our North Carolina friends concerning the claim which they set up for their soldiers in the war between the States. But the making up is so sweet that we are glad of the tilt. It is very like the traditional lovers quarrel—as well as we can remember. The Charlotte Observer, the Charlotte Evening Chronicle and the Raleigh News and Observer all speak us fair, and we return the greeting with interest.

"The brethren of the North Carolina press are very pleasant to us, and we wish that we knew them better. Prompted by that desire, we make a proposal. We move that the North Carolina Press Association and the Virginia Press Association hold a joint meeting next summer. Why not? It matters not to us whether the meeting be held on Virginia soil or on North Carolina soil, just so the brethren get together in neighborly intercourse. As for that, we might meet in one State this year and in the other State next year, for we feel sure that if the brethren did but come together once they would like to repeat the experience.

"What say the North Carolina brethren, and what say the Virginia brethren to the proposal?"

This suggestion is a good one. As the time and place for the meeting of the North Carolina association

has already been named, let the Virginia brethren, and sisters, meet with us at Asheville in July. Then let us meet with them in Virginia next time.

To the Cotton Growers of the South.

If you wish to win your battle and obtain a fair price for your cotton, you must reduce your acreage very considerably.

You have surprised the world by the manner in which you have held your cotton. Surprise it again by cutting down your acreage.

Do not be led astray by the present steadiness of prices.

Three causes have contributed to bring about this rise of more than one cent a pound.

First. The urgent need and demand arising from an unprecedented consumption.

Second. Your courage and wisdom in making the buyer meet your terms.

Third. The belief that you would cut your acreage to such an extent that the supplies from this crop and the growth of 1905-06 would make a commercial crop no larger than the world needs.

The first two causes lose their force the moment it is known that there is a prospect for a moderately large crop next year. Even if the mills take 12,000,000 bales during the current season, this would leave a carry-over of 1,000,000 bales. Hence the necessity of a smaller crop this year.

Do not let any rise in prices between now and the end of the planting season deter you from reducing your acreage.

Such an advance would be merely anticipating that you were making the decrease which your friends have advised you to make.

If the June reports of the government show that you have failed to make sufficient reduction the only persons who would be gainers by the advance would be the speculators, who sell out their futures at a profit.

The price of the cotton you produce will be regulated by the actual, not the expected, reduction.

Don't depend on your neighbor to do the reducing.

In this matter of acreage reduction bear in mind three suggestions:

Don't rely on bad weather to cut down the crop.

Don't put a large acreage into cotton simply because it is too late to plant corn or other diversified crops.

It would be far better to let part of your land lie idle than to run the risk of raising a crop so large as to make possibly another period of low-priced cotton.

I am making this appeal to you because I regard the next few weeks as critical to the South and because I believe that every man who is interested in the welfare of the South should urge the importance of a reduction in acreage.

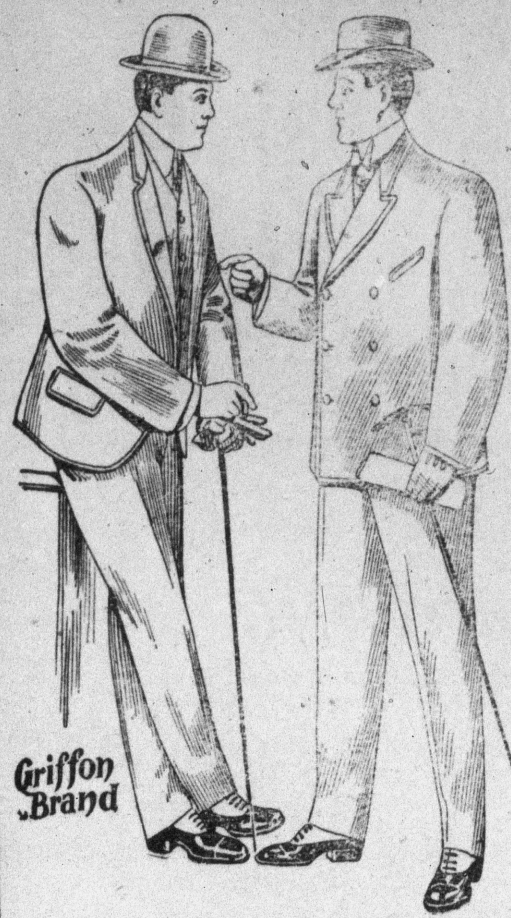
