Attempts Suicide in Buncombe Jail.

Asheville, N. C., April 15.—Minnie Cline, who was placed in the county jail yesterday afternoon attempted suicide last night shortly before 9 o'clock, and but for the discovery of the act by other women prisoners the effort at self destruction would have been successful. In the cell in which the Cline woman was placed was stretched a small rope or cord that had been used by a previous occupant of the cell to hang clothes on. The woman took this cord, and fastening one end about her neck, tied the other end to one of the iron bars across the window, and then allowed herself to dangle at the rope's end. The gruesome object was discovered by women inmates shortly before 9 o'clock and the noise and cries of the women attracted the attention of Sheriff Reed. The woman was taken down in an unconscious condition and a physician was summoned. She was revived, but is in a critical condition.

A GOOD FRIDAY THOUGHT.

Why Esteem One Day Above Another?

Why observe Good Friday? somebody asks. Why make one day of more importance than another?

The observance of certain days for the commemoration of significant events is native to the human heart and common to all people in all the walks of life. The child and the aged man celebrate the anniversary of their birth. People in married life commemorate their wedding day. The birth-days of Washington and Jefferson, Lincoln and Lee are observed. On the tenth of May we leave our plow-handles, shut our business houses, and assemble to honor the living and the dead who fought our battles of the sixties. July the fourth is made a National holiday. Public offices are closed. Public officials are excused from duty. Business is suspended, and private interests are laid aside. All rally round the flag of Liberty, and with long processions, stirring orations, and sweetest music, lay our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving upon the altar of our country.

And for what is all this display? Is it ludicrous or useless? Certain it is that we should be patriotic every day. We should never forget the heroism and sacrifice of Lee and his armies, or Washington and the glorious liberty he won for us. But it is equally certain that our stated celebrations of their sacrifice and their glorious achievements refresh our memory, quicken our love, and deepen our patriotism. In this sense such celebrations are not only right and proper, but they are in a measure necessary. Without them the patriotism of Washington and Lee would grow dim in our memories, and dimmer still in the minds and hearts of succeeding generations.

And if it is fitting that we commemorate the sacrifices of Washington and Lee, is it not a thousandfold more so that we commemorate the death and sacrifice of our Savior Jesus Christ? Should we not esteem it both a privilege and a duty to assemble together on the anniversary of His one supreme sacrifice, to voice our thanksgiving, quicken our love, and deepen our faith in Him who died that we might live?

We profess faith in Christ; we profess to love and honor Him. We proclaim it as necessary to salvation that such faith be a reality, a vital force in life; that such love be deep and true. And shall we reflect upon that faith or deny that love by ignoring and refusing to commemorate the very events upon which that faith and love forever rest? Shall we celebrate the event that liberated us from the tyranny of George III, and ignore that most momentous event of all history, secular or religious, which liberated us from the thralldom of Satan and gave to us the glorious liberty of the sons of God?

Friday of this week, commonly called Good Friday, is the anniversary of our Savior's sacrifice for the sins of the world. There will be service at the Episcopal church at ten o'clock in the morning in commemoration of this event, with a brief sermon on the practical meaning of the Atonement. This service is not for Episcopalians only. It is for every man, woman and child who loves his Savior, and I earnestly hope that a large congregation will gather there to lift their hearts to Him who shed His blood to wash away their sins.

Russian—Seven battleships, with a total of 87,314 tons, and two armored cruisers, 14,724 tons. Their principal guns consist of twenty-four 12 inch, four 10-inch and eight 8 inch.

Japanese—Five battleships, of 60,890 tons and eight armored cruisers, of 73,686 tons. Their principal guns consist of twenty 12-inch, one 10-inch and thirty 8 inch—Charlotte Observer.

It may be assumed that a good many of the Russian vessels are mere tubs, and that the Japanese vessels, being the more modern, are the more effective.—Charlotte Observer.

A Light, Palatable Meal One of the Best Aids to Rest.

A short time since a physician held the eating of food immediately before retiring almost a crime. The old theory is quite exploded. One medical journal, in commenting on the subject recently, said that while it is not good, as a matter of fact, to go to bed with the stomach so loaded that the undigested food will render one restless, still, something of a light, palatable nature in the stomach is one of the best aids to quietude and rest. Some physicians have declared, indeed, that a good deal of the prevalent insomnia is the result of an unconscious craving of the stomach for food in persons who have been unduly frightened by the opinion that they must not eat before going to bed, or who have, like many nervous women, been keeping themselves in a state of semistarvation. Nothing is more agreeable on retiring for the night than to take a bowl of hot broth like oatmeal gruel or some good nourishing soup. It is a positive aid to nervous people and induces peaceful slumbers. This is especially the case during cold winter nights, when the stomach craves warmth as much as any other part of the body. Even a glass of hot milk is grateful to the palate on such occasions, but a bowl of light well cooked gruel is better and during the cold months of winter should be the retiring food of every woman who feels, as many do, the need of food at night.—American Cultivator.

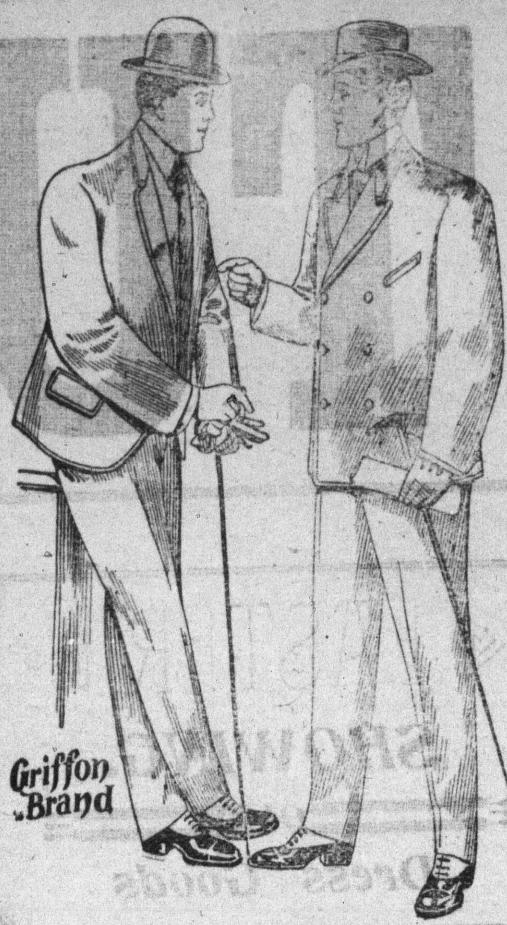
