A BOLD INTRUDER

The House of James Brown Entered.

Annual Meeting of Stock-holders—The Company in Progressive Condition

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers Consolidated Tobacco Company was held in the Farmers warehouse on Friday, 18th. The company paid a dividend of 15 1/2 percent, which in view of the very short crop is a most remarkably creditable showing.

As we have before stated, it seems to us that this company bids fair to become one of the strongest business organizations in the country. And why not? Killed in a Crash.

Indianapolis, April 17.—In a road rush from Masonic Hall tonight, caused by nothing more than a hurry to get out of the building to the street and attended by no cause for excitement, four newsboys were trampled to death and four others were so seriously injured that many of them may die. As the rush continued down the steps from the second story of the building there were heart rending cries from the little fellows who were being trampled to death, but those behind continued to push and shove those in front and the trampling of the helpless victims continued until the hall was practically cleared.

The boys had met in the hall to share in a free distribution of tickets to an entertainments at a theatre. It is estimated 300 were present. With the falling of the first boy on the steps a cry of warning was made by those near him, but the pressure from behind forced them upon his prostrate body. Others stumbled and fell as they reached the prostrate form, and thus one after another was added to the fallen boys until more than twenty were upon the steps. Still the pressure from behind continued, and those in front, though knowing that they were bruising and tearing those upon whom they were walking, were compelled to do so in order to escape the constant pressure which would have thrown them down had they not walked over the prostrate bodies of those already dying on the steps.

An extraordinary hobby is that of a gentleman living in one of London's suburbs. It takes the form of boot cleaning. Every member of his household is subject to his whim. 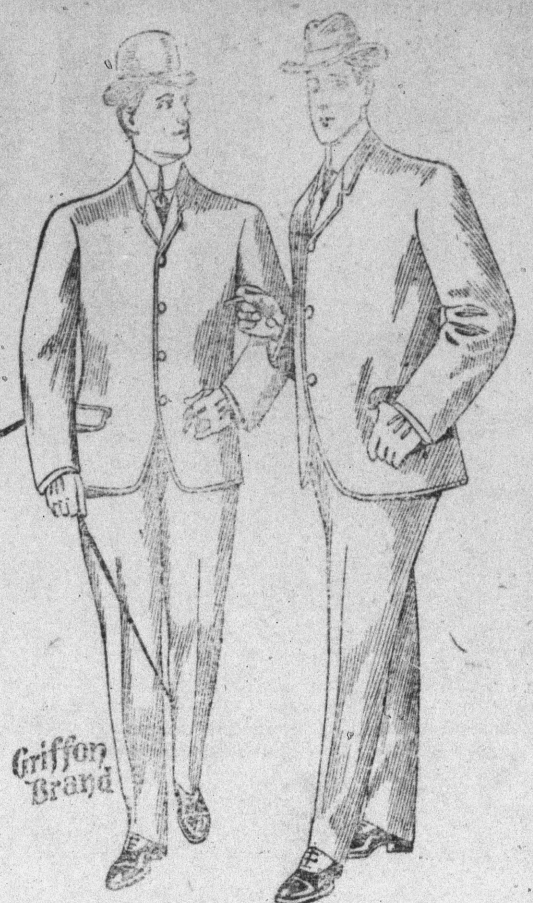
