Was Kenneth Drowned?

E. F. Lamb and H. Clay Tunis, of Elizabeth City, were in Raleigh yesterday, and were asked if any clue had been found as to the whereabouts of little Kenneth Beasley, or if he was kidnapped.

Both these gentlemen were of the opinion that the young boy was not stolen away, but was drowned in one of the many swamps surrounding the neighborhood in which he was last seen. Many places in these swamps are treacherous, and it is very probable, they said, that Kenneth had lost his way possibly, and had fallen into some stream or hole, and was drowned.—Raleigh News and Observer.

A College Blazes

Nashville, Tenn., April 20—The main building of Vanderbilt University was gutted by fire today. The fire originated in the second story of the building from a defective flue. A high wind was blowing and in a few minutes the structure was a mass of flames. A general alarm was turned in and every engine in the city responded. On account of inadequate water supply the firemen experienced much difficulty in fighting the fire. The loss is placed at \$200,000, with \$115,000 insurance on building and furnishings. The operation of the university will not be interfered with.

The annual meeting of the Southern Newspaper Publishers' Association will be held in Charleston May 2 and 3, at the Charleston hotel. Over one hundred representative publishers are expected and the sessions will be interesting and pleasant. Charleston committees, composed of members of the council, the commercial club and local newspaper men, have arranged to give the visitors a delightful time, the programme includes trips to the Isle of Palms, the Navy Yard, Magnolia gardens and a reception and banquet.

About noon today the dwelling house of Mrs. Annie Hooker, at Hamilton, was destroyed by fire, the building and contents being a total loss. The fire originated from a stove flue in the kitchen. The store of Baker & Salsbury and some other houses caught from the building but were put out without damage of consequence.

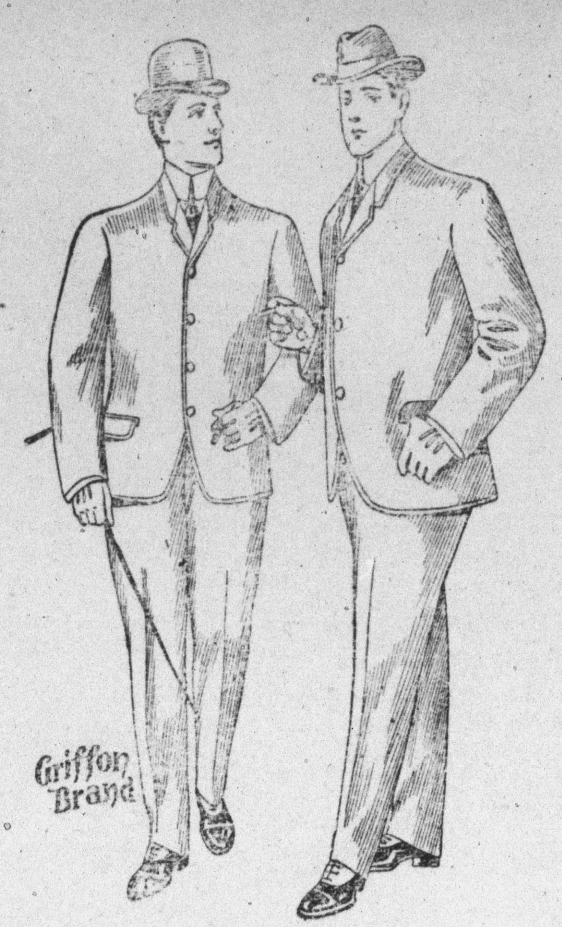
