GAS BOAT CAPSIZED

Passengers Have Trilling Experience—

Capt. Forbes' Heroism.

Friday afternoon as Capt. Ola Forbes' gas boat Alteiro was on her trip from Washington to Greenville the boat was accidentally capsized, and there came near being a serious disaster.

The accident occurred about 3:30 o'clock when the boat was about 10 miles from Greenville. W. P. Symond was on shore and hailed the boat to be taken on board and brought to Greenville. The landing was made and he was taken on board, and while the boat was being backed out to the channel of the river it struck a submerged log that listed the boat and came near turning it completely over.

There were quite a number of passengers with several trunks and some freight on board. The sudden careening of the boat threw some of these overboard, while others jumped out in the water. The boat rolled back and forth several times and finally settled on one side. The engineer had presence of mind to stop his engine instantly, or the consequences might have been much worse.

The passengers on board were: Gus Gomprecht, Baltimore. Herbert Steifel, Baltimore. W. M. Poindexter, Chattanooga. I. D. Wolfson, Baltimore. R. A. Jones, Buffalo. M. P. Holmes, Cleveland. E. H. Thomson, Durham. W. P. Symonds, Greenville.

There were also two colored women with small children on board.

At the first careen of the boat Mr. Gomprecht and Capt. Forbes were thrown out on the off side, and as it listed back Messrs. Poindexter, Holmes and Thomson jumped out on the side nearest shore. The latter three swam to land without much difficulty. Capt. Forbes could also have made land easily, but he heard a cry for help from Mr. Gomprecht and noticing that the latter had become exhausted, bravely went to his rescue. Mr. Gomprecht had sunk three times when Capt. Forbes reached him, but he was in time to keep him up until others could go to their aid.

Seeing the two men struggling out in the stream, Mr. Holmes broke the lock of a skiff that was fastened at the landing and with Mr. Poindexter went out and got them ashore. The skiff was then used in getting all the others from the gas boat to the shore, and in saving the baggage and freight that was floating in the river.

When all were ashore the men went about to relieve their dilemma as far as possible. Mr. Steifel, being a trousers salesman and his sample trunk being in good shape, provided all with dry pants, and by helping each other out they all managed to get comfortably clothed. Capt. Forbes got the boat righted without much trouble and before night all were ready to resume the journey. The passengers were landed safely in Greenville about 10 o'clock.

The danger being over the passengers could see the humorous as well as the serious side of the accident. They say that Mr. Wolfson displayed marvelous acrobatic qualities by diving through a window every time the boat listed, alternating from side to side so rapidly that he saved himself from being thrown overboard. Another said he had his hands full holding the two colored women and keeping them from jumping overboard with the children. One of the women put up some loud praying. All the baggage that went overboard was damaged. Mr. Gomprecht was the heaviest loser. He had two sample trunks of clothing worth \$500 that was practically ruined. He is loud in his praise of Capt. Forbes for saving his life. There was also a crate of hogs thrown overboard and four of them were drowned.

GENERAL ROBERTS' COMING.

To Speak at Confederate Reunion May 10

The boy General of the civil war, W. P. Roberts, of Gates county will be with us on Wednesday, the 10th to be with and address the Confederate veterans of Bryan Grimes camp. Gen. Roberts was the youngest officer of his rank in the Confederate army, and was distinguished by his bravery. There is no introduction or comment that can be made upon Gen. Roberts to a camp of veterans. They know and remember the tie that bound in the days of '61-'65 and the bond is stronger as the days are going by. There will be great preparations made for that day of celebration, and a multitude will be in Greenville to take part in the exercises and hear Gen. Roberts. Everybody will come.

Bryan Grimes camp, Confederate Veterans. There will be a meeting of the camp at the court house, at 9:30 a. m.

Immediately after the adjournment of the meeting, the veterans will form in front of the court house and march in a body to the cemetery where the ceremonies attending the spreading of flowers upon the graves of the Confederate dead will be held.

The camp will then march to the opera house, where the exercises will be continued and the assembled multitude will be addressed by Gen. W. P. Roberts, of Gatesville, N. C.

After the ceremonies in the opera house are concluded a dinner will be served the Confederate veterans in open air.

But undoubtedly it is the proper thing for Southern cities of the present size of Nashville to pay the greatest attention to the encouragement, in every possible way, of the growth and early exercise of any desirable talent in whatever form it may appear, by rendering parties all reasonable facilities for ascertaining whether they possess such talent and by generously recognizing and substantially rewarding, when its possession is ascertained."

Defective Eyesight and Hearing.

Writing in the June Delineator on the care of the eyes and ears. Dr. Grace Peckham Murray says: "Many children have imperfect vision and suffer from it long before the parents are aware of it. These are some of the indications which should lead one to suspect trouble: The eyes are red and inflamed most of the time, and styes occur frequently. Children who need glasses squint and peer, or shut their eyes to a chink, or hold a book or an object close under their noses or far off at arm's length, or they may fear the light or have a dawn and anxious look and be unable to read from the blackboard. All such children should have a careful examination of the eyes, and be fitted with the kind of glasses that are necessary to correct their vision. Many children that have the appearance of being backward and stupid are not so in reality, but seem so because of their imperfect vision or hearing."

Elsewhere, in the same article, we read in regard to the ears, that: "Earache in a child is a symptom that requires immediate attention, since it may be due to boils and abscesses or inflammation, which give rise to chronic middle-ear trouble. The danger is that such trouble will extend to the soft bones back of the ear, and what is called a mastoid abscess will form, which, if it breaks into the brain, may prove fatal; so in case of earache and inflammations always look out for the swelling which comes back of the ear, and call in the physician in time to prevent disaster. Children who seem stupid and do not answer readily when spoken to may have imperfect hearing. This should be kept in mind and tests applied to discover if such is the case."

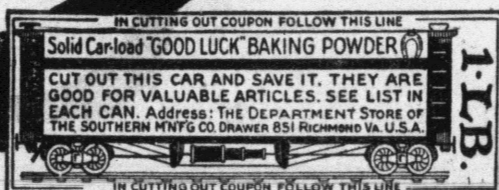
