## HOW COFFEE GROWS.

Altitude Makes a Big Difference in Size and Color of the Beans.

Up to 1690 the sole source of the coffee supply was Arabia, but in that year it was introduced into Java by the governor general of the island, and the climate was found to be so well adapted to it that cultivation was begun on a large scale. One of the first plants grown in Java was sent to the botanical gardens at Amsterdam, and seed from it was sent to Surinam, resulting in its introduction into that country in 1718. Ten years later it found its way to the West Indies, and from that time its cultivation has been general throughout the inhabited portions of the tropics. The regions best adapted to its culture are well watered mountain slopes, varying from 1,000 to 4,000 feet in altitude and between the parallels of 15 degrees north and 15 degrees south latitude.

According to the altitude at which it is grown, the coffee bean varies in size and color, that from the highlands being small and light green and nearer the coast of a yellow tinge and much larger. The wild trees of Liberia, which flourish in lowlands, produce the largest beans known, which are, however, inferior in quality, as is the case with the majority of the African product. Eastern coffee generally may be distinguished by its yellow color and large beans as compared with the smaller green berries of Central and South American growth.

In its wild state the coffee tree is slender, reaching a height of twelve to twenty feet, but under cultivation it is pruned to grow not more than six or eight feet high. The leaves resemble those of the laurel, though not so dry and thick, and are evergreen, while the flowers are somewhat like the jasmine. The trees are completely covered with blossoms, which perfume the whole countryside. The fruit resembles the cherry very much, especially when ripe, when it is a dark purple.

### Curing a Smoker.

A wise mother caught her little boy smoking a cigarette the other day. Instead of inverting him over her knee and nearly spanking the life out of him she said:

"Johnny, dear, I see you are getting quite a big little man. Come away in, and I will give you one of papa's great big cigars to smoke."

So she marched Johnny away into papa's study and sat him down to smoke one of papa's cigars.

She sat down opposite and watched, while his lips grew white and his eyes yellow and his hands dropped helplessly, and as a little later she ministered to him she had the satisfaction of receiving his vehement promise that he would never, never smoke again until he was older.—London Tit-Bits.

### One Experience Enough.

When four-year-old Gertrude had cried for four successive nights with toothache and none of the family had been able to sleep well papa took her to the dentist and had the offending tooth drawn. Gertrude willingly submitted to the operation, not knowing the pain connected with it, but was very indignant at her father after it was all over.

Some time afterward she had a canker sore on her upper gum, and while at the breakfast table she bit upon a crust of bread and could not avoid an exclamation of pain.

"What's the matter now?" asked papa.

"Well," was the answer, "I have a sore gum, but you aren't going to have it pulled out."

### Age and Gray Hair.

As age advances the hair grows gray by a natural process, but this may be much hastened by severe anxiety or other causes, and in many instances premature blanching of the hair is hereditary. As the change is taking place hairs may often be found which are white at their bases, but retain their color at their ends. Brown-Sequard kept a constant watch on some of the hairs of his own beard while it was turning gray and found that at times an entire hair would change in the course of a night. This loss of color seems to be due partly to a loss of power to produce pigment and partly to the presence of air in the hair shafts.

### Mr. Gladstone Failed to Tip.

Mr. Gladstone's hatred of tipping, writes a correspondent, was not only shown in his avoidance of the custom whenever possible, but also in the smallness of the gift when he found custom too strong for him.

At a private hotel in Brighton where Mr. Gladstone had stayed for the week end one of the dining room waiters who had served Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone gives as one of his reasons for voting against Liberal candidates at local elections the fact that "Gladstone only gave me a shilling." For this "insult" the Liberal party lost one vote.—London Chronicle.
