### A TAR RIVER DEMONSTRATION

Of the Beauty and Benefit of Bible Baptism

### THE "MARTIN FAMILY."

Interest in the Meeting Continues.

Thursday night was a repetition of former ones at the Christian church large crowds, good music, and strong and able preaching.

The subject for the sermon was "The soul-cry of the 20th century." This was an exceptionally strong and able plea for Christian union and a kindly protest against the divided condition of Christendom.

The evangelist deplored the conditions brought about by the existence of 263 different churches, all claiming to be "Christians," yet wearing a distinctive name which formed more or less a dividing line between the members of the body of Christ.

He did not argue for the denunciations to leave their own and enter any particular church, but for all to eliminate the divisive feature and unite in one name, one faith, and one rule of practice - that rule of faith and practice to be the Bible only.

Tonight there will be preaching again at 8 o'clock and tomorrow at 3:30 and 8 p. m.

Sunday an extra meeting will be held in the opera house at 3:30 and Dr. Martin will address the audience on "Cuba and the Caribbean Sea." At this service a silver offering will be taken up.

Vance county has joined the progressive movement and voted bonds to build good roads.

The Lexington Dispatch, Commissioner Varner's excellent paper, is twenty-three years old.

The town of Snyder, Okla., has been nearly wiped out of existence by a tornado and five hundred people are reported killed.

The grand lodge of Odd Fellows in session at Raleigh, decided to erect a building to be used as a home for aged Odd Fellows in connection with the orphanage at Goldsboro. The building will cost \$6,000.

## GREENVILLE WATER AND LIGHT COMMISSION.

Rules, Rates and Regulations for the Supply of Water.

Section 1. Parties desiring to be consumers shall make application in writing in a book provided for such purpose at the office of the Water and Light Commission, stating what purpose the water is to be used for, giving number of fixtures; said application shall be binding on the applicant and premises for the term of one year (unless otherwise agreed) and the applicant agrees to subscribe to all the rules, rates and regulations necessary for the proper conduct of the water department.

Section 2. No water main shall be tapped nor any service installed except by and under the direction of the Superintendent, and no water will be furnished except on meter, unless as specified below, paragraph No. 9.

Section 3. The charge for a service to the curb line including the tap in the main, cock at the curb, and installing meter, shall cost \$10, and shall be paid when application for water is made.

Section 4. No person or persons shall be permitted to turn the water on or off at the curb cock except the superintendent or his agent, except it shall not apply to a licensed plumber desiring to turn the water off or on for repair purposes or testing.

Section 5. Each service pipe shall be provided with a stop and waste cock to be located upon the premises at a convenient point so that the consumer can turn off or on to make sundry repairs, or to prevent freezing.

Section 6. All water furnished for the public use, including street sprinkler, public buildings, watering troughs and the like shall be assessed at such rates as the Commission may establish, and the service shall be in the same manner as private service, limited to the uses for which it is assessed. It is intended by this section to set a just value on all public service rendered as a base on which to account for the revenues and expenditures of the water plant in all details.

Section 7. In cases where two or more houses owned by one party are to be supplied with water, the owner may have one connection: Provided however that he be required to guarantee the payment of the minimum charge for each house per month.

Section 8. The Commission reserves the right to shut off the supply of water for any of the following reasons: 1st for repairs, 2nd for want of supply, 3rd for non payment of bills when due, 4th for fraudulent representation in relation to the consumption of water.

Section 9. If proprietors of lumber yards, manufactories, stores, hotels, public buildings, regular consumers of water, wish to lay large pipe with standard fire hydrant and hose connection, to be used in case of fire, they will be permitted to connect to the street mains at their own expense, under the supervision of the Superintendent and will be allowed the use of water for fire purpose only at the rate of \$25. per hydrant per year.

Section 10. Bills are due on the 1st day of each month for the previous month service, and must be paid at the Commission office, or ten per cent additional will be added after ten days.

Section 11. Contracts are not transferable. New occupants are required to make application in person at the office of the Commission at the time they commence to use the water, to avoid being liable for back dues for water used until such notice was given.

Section 12. Any failure on the part of the subscriber to comply with these rules and regulations shall annul this contract, and the Commission therefor, without further notice, may shut off the water and remove its property from the premises.

I wasted all the time watching the fakir shove his wares off on the negroes who had gathered there and nursing the vain hope that after awhile he would swallow the knife. It is curious what deep impressions will sometimes be made by these trifling experiences in a country boy's life.
