ROUTE NUMBER SIX.

Rural Free Delivery Service Extending.

Another rural free delivery route has been established to go out from Greenville, making six routes that are served from this point. This new route, designated No. 6, will go in effect June 1st with J. W. Brown as carrier. It goes from Greenville out the old Plank road to the pine tree corner where the road turns by the Evans place, then in a southerly direction to English chapel, thence southwest to Noah Forbes school house, thence west to Jesse Baker's corner, thence northwest to T. Allen's corner, thence south to Tyson corner, thence southwest to Frog Level, thence south to Kittred's corner, thence northwest to the Plank road, thence southwest to Crawford's corner, thence north west to McArthur's corner, thence north to R. A. Willoughby's corner, thence east to J. F. Pollard's corner, thence north to F. M. Smith's corner, thence east to W. H. Flake's corner, thence south to J. W. Allen's corner, thence east to race track road and via depot back to postoffice.

The route covers a little more than 23 miles and serves 722 people. Postmaster R. C. Flanagan advises that persons to be served by this route should proceed at once to procure approved boxes and put them up, as their mail cannot be delivered until the boxes are up.

Delegates Appointed by the Governor.

Col. I. A. Sugg and Hon. J. J. Laughinghouse have been appointed by Governor Glenn as delegates to the Southern Industrial Parliament which meets in Washington, D. C., on May 23rd, continuing to 26th. Col. Sugg informs us that he will attend and thinks Mr. Laughinghouse will also. We are glad the colonel is a delegate and that he will attend. This parliament is specially in the interest of cotton growers and cotton interest, and the colonel has for a number of years been a very intense advocate of higher prices for the staple and that it might be managed so as to have more uniform reasonable prices. Pitt county will have two splendid representatives. Col. Sugg expects to take his daughter, Miss Jessie Lee, with him.

It seems as hard to determine Miss Patterson's innocence as it did to find out how old Ann was.

That talk of establishing a republican daily paper in Greensboro has bobbed up periodically for several years past.

On his return to Washington the president expressed much pleasure from his tour of the West. He expresses the intention of making a tour of the South in the fall. He may not find many bears to shoot down this way, but he will find it the best and most attractive part of the whole country.

A number of prominent North Carolinians are being mentioned for the vacancy on the Gettysburg Battlefield Commission, caused by the death of Maj. W. M. Robbins. Those noted so far are Gen. W. P. Roberts, ex-Judge A. C. Avery, Maj. H. A. London and Maj. C. M. Stedman. All are excellent men, and either of them would fill the position worthily.

Let a man engage in the illicit manufacture of whiskey and he is ready to resort to any crime to keep his business from being exposed. Many instances have occurred in which these "moonshiners" have resorted to murder and arson through revenge for information given about them. Five prominent farmers of Guilford county have just been indicted for arson, they being charged with burning the buildings of a man who had furnished information against them to revenue officers. "Moonshining" is despicable business, and all good citizens should do all in their power to break it up.

As we get further removed from the war between the states, unity of the sections becomes more pronounced and sectional differences disappear. This is not only true from a commercial standpoint but is noticed in religious matters as well. The question of slavery caused a division in the Baptist denomination that resulted in the organization of Northern and Southern branches. Now the announcement is made that a general meeting of both these divisions is to be held shortly in St. Louis looking to the organizing of a general convention of the Baptists of North America, including Canada. It is likely that other denominations having sectional divisions arising from the war will also be getting together.

Plowing up Cotton Fields. Americas, Ga., May 10.—Upon numerous plantations about Americus the unusual spectacle was presented today of farmers plowing up entire fields of cotton to successfully kill grass.

Hundreds of acres of cotton are thus being wholly destroyed, but it is the only effective means at hand.

The fine stands of cotton are completely concealed from view by rank grass, and as it cannot be worked successfully, farmers are plowing up entire fields and will replant the crop later. The prospect is very discouraging.

Up to Salaried Officers.

The Danbury Reporter, referring to the fact that under the new law, a constable or policeman finding a man intoxicated or in the possession of liquor, he may be called into court or before a magistrate and required to say under oath where he purchased the liquor, and upon his refusal he may be fined or sent to jail for contempt of court, says:

"This puts the great difficulty of temperance laws in the hands of the friends of temperance. They can require the local officers to enforce the law to the very limit."

The Reporter makes the usual mistake of supposing that the "friends of temperance" have in hand the enforcement of the law. As a matter of fact, while the friends of temperance ought to compel the "local officers" to execute law by a strong public sentiment, why should men paid to execute the law wait to be compelled to perform their sworn duty? It too often happens that a city official, elected to execute the law, sits down in his office and when criticised for not doing so says that he has heard no complaint that the law was violated and no demand has been made upon him to execute the law in question. It is not the duty of private citizens to tell officials when the law is violated and goad them into action. Officials are paid to find out and punish infractions of the law. If they are to sit idly by until a private citizen quits his business to compel enforcement of the law, then we might do away with paid officials and let the individuals take the law into their own hands.
