Appearances are deceitful. Two handsomely dressed women easily buncoed Columbus, Ga., jewelers out of several valuable rings.

There were terrific thunder storms in various sections of the country last week, and a number of deaths from lightning were reported.

The trial of the people in South Carolina on the charge of participating in a lynching resulted in acquittal. That is what was expected.

A scientist thinks he has discovered that man descended from a fish. One thing certain, there is a lot of boney and scaly specimens existing to support his contention.

The whole calendar seems to be out of gear. Every month so far this year has given us weather that was unseasonable. We expect summer weather in summer time, but such temperature as this in May puts us to wondering what it will be in July.

Virginia got first this time. The appointment of the Gettysburg Battleground Commission to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Major Robbins, will go to that state. Major General Lunsford Lewis Lomox, of Virginia, has been recommended for the position and the president has requested the appointment be made.

Every summer many people are drowned while bathing, and many of these fatalities occur on the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday. We have taken note of these matters for several years, as a rule confining our observations to North Carolina. The fatalities among Sunday bathers has already begun thus early in the season. Ten days or more ago a negro was drowned in a creek in Wake county while bathing on Sunday, and last Sunday a young man was drowned at Wrightsville Beach while surf-bathing with a party of ladies and gentlemen. If it were asserted that the fatalities among Sunday bathers was due to a violation of the Fourth Commandment the answer would probably be (1) that it is a strained construction to say that bathing on Sunday is a violation of the injunction to remember that day; and (2) if it is a violation, why are there not more fatalities among persons who engage in other and certainly more glaring forms of Sabbath breaking? And these questions could hardly be answered. But somehow we have a feeling that it is safer not to go in swimming on Sunday.—Statesville Landmark.

Under the Same Condemnation.

The Davidson Dispatch says: "It is currently reported and generally accepted as a truth that there are from three to five illicit distilleries in almost constant operation in Boone township, this county. Revenue officers are in Lexington almost every week, but one never hears of their visiting Boone township, notwithstanding the fact that they have had positive and reliable information of the condition of affairs existing in that township. Why is this? Can you explain it?"

We have no idea why it is and hence cannot explain it; but take leave to suggest that while revenue officers are in Lexington almost every week, it is likely that Davidson county officers, charged with the execution of the State laws, are in Lexington almost every day; and if the facts about these illicit distilleries are as stated, they are no more to be acquitted of dereliction of duty than the revenue officers are to be convicted of it. The operation of illicit distilleries is as much a violation of the Watts law as it is of any Federal statute. If county officers do not know this they should get down the acts of the legislature of 1903 and read about amongst the laws for a spell. Every one of these abominable little moonshine distilleries should be destroyed wherever found, and it is a duty equally incumbent upon State and Federal officers to find and destroy them. To exculpate one set by silence and rail cut against the other when both are equally guilty of failure to discharge a plain duty, is partisanship gone to seed.—Charlotte Observer.

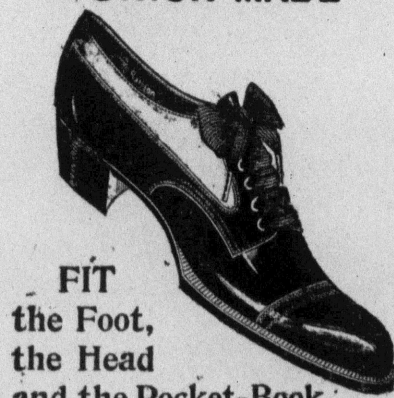

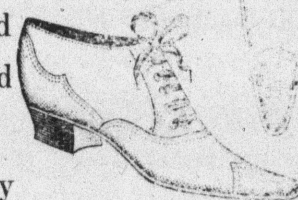
