BUFFALO HUNT.

We clip the following interesting article from an exchange. It comments upon the scarcity of the buffalo, also the sport that is in store for the National Editorial Association. It says:

We doubt if any specimen of the animal kingdom has been the subject of more ruthless slaughter or has disappeared more rapidly and almost completely than the American buffalo. In fact, it is not too much to say that the wild buffalo has entirely disappeared in this country, yet we have only to look back a generation or so to the time when they were numbered by millions on the great plains of the west. Just how far and in what numbers they existed east of the Mississippi is a matter of doubt, but west of that stream the number was beyond computation, even within the memory of men now living. To the Indians of the west the buffalo was almost the source of life. In their savage state they killed the animals with arrows and spears, drove them over precipices or corralled them in rude enclosures. The meat was to them the main source of subsistence, the hides formed tents, clothing and shoes, and the horns and bones were found useful. In short, the buffalo was to the Indians of our plains what the reindeer is to the Laplander.

And yet, notwithstanding their great numbers they have almost completely disappeared. They were killed for hides, for their meat and for their heads and horns, and millions of them were killed for the mere pleasure of killing. White men and red men seemed overcome by the lust of slaughter, and the result is that the buffalo as a wild animal is no more. The few of them yet living are such as have been carefully protected on reserves or have been raised as domestic animals. A few days ago the Kansas City Journal spoke of the arrival in that city of thirty-two head, "said to be one-tenth of all the buffaloes left in the world." This statement is probably correct, or practically so, and shows how completely they have vanished from among us as a native animal. Those spoken of by the Journal were being conveyed to what is called the "101 ranch" of the Miller brothers near Bliss, in Oklahoma, who already own a number, and it is stated that this addition will give them the largest herd now in existence. As an evidence of the value of such animals it is stated that this addition of thirty-two head cost the Millers \$16,000, besides the expense of securing them and conveying them to their ranch. The entire cost to them will probably not be less than \$600 each. The Journal adds:

The Miller brothers are preparing to give a buffalo hunt at "101" ranch, June 11, that will cost them \$20,000. At the last annual convention of the National Editorial Association Joseph Miller invited the association to hold this year's meeting in Oklahoma, and he promised to feed every man on buffalo. The Millers' National Federation, which meets in Kansas City June 7, has also been invited in a body to attend the buffalo hunt, and will go by special train. About 30,000 guests are expected at the ranch.

The news correspondents occasionally palm off some far fetched stories on the public. One of them was the recent rumor that a woman of soiled character had set up the claim of being a daughter of a prominent North Carolina tobacco manufacturer. It is no surprise that such a story has been declared false.

The rumor that the president contemplates going outside of his party and appointing prominent Democrats to several important positions in North Carolina, need not throw anybody into a spasm. It will be time enough for the fits if the appointments really occur.

We notice in the New Bern Journal that three merchants of that city signed an agreement to close their stores at 7 o'clock in the evening during the summer. In Greenville all the merchants except grocers and druggists close.

It may be pretty tough on our governor to live on \$4000 a year, but he had his eyes open when he "took" the job and ought not to have a kick coming now.

It appears, however, that the superstitions of the Russians are of the most stupid sort, and not such as tend to keep them from barbarous excesses. If they knew more, they would probably desist from Jew-baiting and making the Jews among them the victims of cruel persecution. They would consider the circumstances under which the Jews quit a condition of bondage in Egypt and the calamities that came upon the Pharaohs. They would think of the fate of the Babylonish empire—another scene of Jewish captivity; ancient Rome, and other places where that peculiar people suffered persecution, and, thinking of their own treatment of the Jews, they might connect it with Russian disasters in the Far East.

In short, they might tank up with a sort of superstition that would fill them with dread of the consequences of inhumanity to Jews, and such dread would do them no harm, for the news comes that many Jews lost their lives in a recent anti-Semitic outbreak in Russia.—Danville Bee.

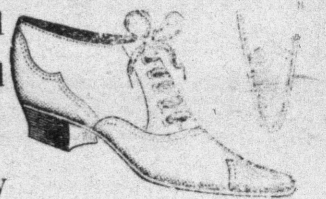
