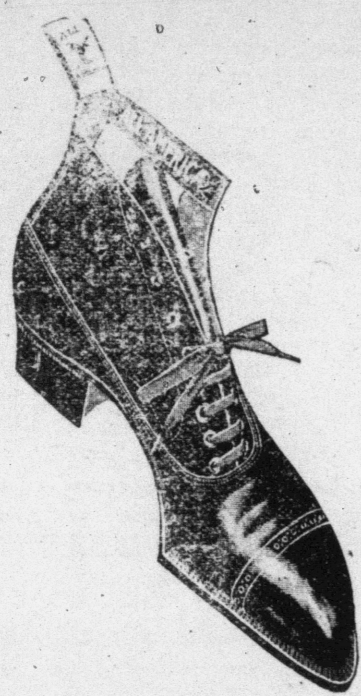

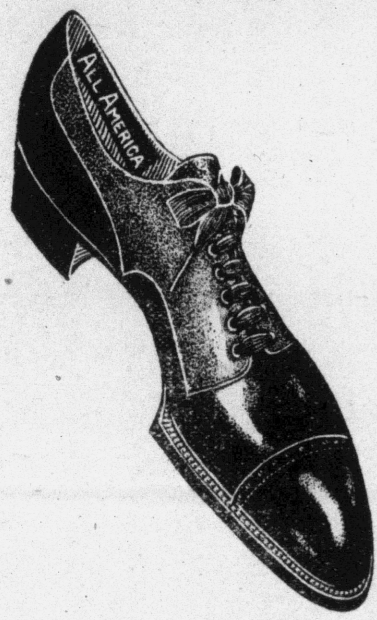

## JAPS DEFEAT RUSSIANS.

**Greatest Victory For Japan The World Has Ever Known.**

**NINETEEN VESSELS SUNK AND CAPTURED.**

**Russian Loss of Life is Terrible --Over Two Thousand Taken Prisoners--Remnant of Fleet Fleeing Before the Japs**

New York, May 29.—The first authentic report from the engagement between the Russian and Japanese fleets is that six Russian ships were sunk on the ground. It is also unofficially reported that the Japs had got twelve of Russia's ships and were chasing the balance of the fleet.

### List Grows Larger.

New York, May 29.—It is officially announced that twelve Russian ships and two torpedo boats have been sunk. A full Russian transport ship has been captured by the Japs, and the rest of the Russian fleet is in full retreat.

An unconfirmed report says that Togo's flag ship has been sunk.

### Greatest Victory World Has Known.

New York, May 29.—Official information from Tokio says that the battle between the Russian and Japanese fleets began in the fog Saturday morning shortly after 2 o'clock, and resulted in the greatest victory for the Japanese that the world has ever known. The Russians are fleeing with the remnant of their fleet, having lost fourteen battleships and cruisers sunk, two torpedo boats and two transports sunk and two battle ships captured. Among those sunk are the battleships Bardino and Oreil with all on board each carrying 740 men. Togo is pursuing the fleeing Russians.

Tokio is wild with joy. The Russian loss of life is terrible. The Japanese squadron is reported undamaged.

### Togo's Official Report.

Tokio, May 29.—Admiral Togo's official report gives the following list of Russian ships destroyed: Two battleships, one coast defense, five cruisers, two special service, three destroyers; also captured two battleships, two coast defense, one special service, one destroyer and over two thousand prisoners.

### Killed by a Train.

A telephone message from Goldsboro yesterday morning to Mr. E. C. Craft, of this city, conveyed to him the distressing information that his relative, Mr. Chas. S. Andrews, of Kinston, had just been run over and killed by a train in the latter city.

The deceased lived here at one time, being in the employ of the Coast Line, and was a son of the late Rev. John N. Andrews, who was a prominent member of the Methodist conference. He leaves a wife and three children, also a nephew, Mr. James Northam, and three nieces, Mrs. E. C. Craft and Misses Ophelia and Norma Northam, of this city.

A later message stated that the accident occurred while Mr. Andrews was crossing the railroad tracks in Kinston. Mr. Andrews is deaf and the supposition is that he did not hear the approach of the train before he was struck. Mrs. Craft and two sisters left yesterday evening to attend the funeral in Kinston this afternoon.—Wilmington Star.

### The Norfolk & Southern.

New York, May 27.—That new interests have entered the Norfolk & Southern Railway Company was stated today by Adrian H. Larkin, the new secretary of the road. Mr. Larkin declined to disclose the identity of the new interests, nor would he say whether they have secured control of the property. He believed, however, that the policy of the company would be unchanged.

Norfolk, Va., May 27.—A. H. Flint former president, Henry Sprout & Co., Chas. R. Paynton and the Colonial Trust Company, of Pittsburg, are stated to be contending for control of the Norfolk & Southern Railway. All of the directors have resigned except Mr. Flint, who it is said, refused to retire; M. K. King, general manager of the road here, and Mr. Scoville, of Pittsburg. The new directors are said to represent the Pittsburg interest.

### Appeal to the Governor.

Raleigh, N. C., May 27.—J. O. Kerr, D. L. Kennedy and D. L. Carlton, of Duplin county, appeared before Governor Glenn for two hours this afternoon and urged him to commute to life imprisonment the death sentence of Daniel Teachey, white, of Duplin, who about two years ago killed a white man named Rivenbark. He was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to be hanged appealed and whose execution was set for May, but who was reprieved by Governor Glenn to June 19th in order that petitions for commutation might be presented. Kerr urged upon the governor that there was a reasonable doubt of guilt, Kennedy and Carlton argued that an alibi was also lately proved. It is expected that Monday J. O. Carr and W. S. Dortch, the latter of Goldsboro, will appear before the governor and also urge commutation.

next twelve months from July 1st. There may be some of our citizens who think that not much importance attaches to these primaries and that it is not worth while to attend. This is a mistake, and every voter should attend the primary of his ward. There is too much at stake for any to be indifferent.

If the friends of temperance think the dispensary question is settled permanently and therefore feel indifferent toward the coming primaries to nominate candidates for aldermen, THE REFLECTOR wishes to give them a word of warning. Do not take too much for granted. The opposition to the dispensary is still here, and while it is not outspoken there is work going on quietly in the hope of getting a majority of anti-dispensary men on the next board of aldermen. If this should succeed and they get control of the situation, the purpose would be to so conduct the dispensary as to make people opposed to it, and hold another election on the question next spring and vote it out to be displaced with saloons. Indifference on the part of voters who are friends of temperance might lead to this result. Attend your ward primary and be careful who you support for aldermen.

There was present the senior member of the firm of Schafer Brothers, Attorney A. G. Ricard, who represented them at the legislature during the winter, Mr. Brown and Mr. Lacy.

The bonds surrendered amounted to \$242,000 face value, and the sum paid by the State was in exact figures \$215,864.—Raleigh News and Observer.

**PITT COUNTY TOBACCO.**

More Bright "Weed" Grown There Than in Any County in the Country.

In the State Museum is the finest tobacco exhibit in America, which has taken several years to perfect and one of the best parts of it is from Pitt county. In the exhibit is a large shield sign, which was used at the St. Louis Exposition, and it reads as follows:

"Pitt county, North Carolina, grows more bright tobacco than any other county in the United States, while as late as 1885 none at all was produced.

"Greenville, with its seven ware houses, sells annually at public auction some 18,000,000 pounds of leaf tobacco, distributed all over the globe."

Some of the excellent selections of the leaf in this big exhibit are from Wake county, which grows as good tobacco as Pitt county produces.

A comparison shield sign is as follows:

"Tobacco was first taken from the New to the Old World by a returning expedition sent out by Sir Walter Raleigh in 1584, from Wokoken (Roanoke Island) on the coast of North Carolina.—Raleigh News and Observer.

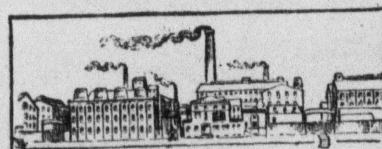
