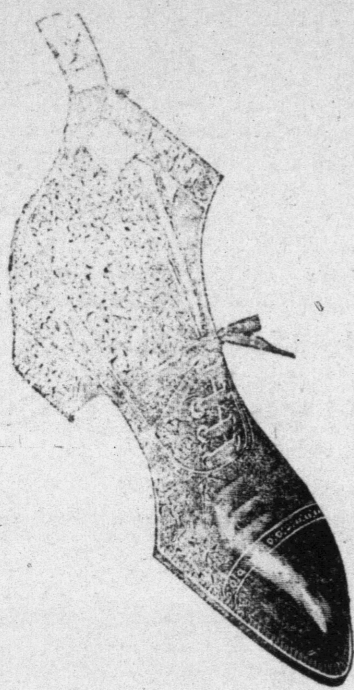

### STATE NEWS.

There is a movement on foot to macadamize the road from Greensboro to Guilford College.

Forty young men received diplomas at the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts Wednesday.

The entire fortune of the late Bishop Alfred Augustine Watson, amounting to \$20,000 was left to the diocese of East Carolina.

In the case of J. W. Harmon for the murder of his wife in Winston-Salem, the jury cannot agree, or hadn't at last account.

Two Republican dailies were incorporated in Greensboro Wednesday night. One headed by Chairman Rollins and Congressman Blackburn, and the other by Butler & Co.

The Rev. Nedham B. Cobb, D. D., a noted divine and excellent gentleman, died at his home in Sampson county yesterday. Dr. Cobb was born in the year of 1836 in the county of Wayne.

At the commencement exercises of Davidson college yesterday President Smith announced the offer of a \$20,000 library by Andrew Carnegie on conditions that the college raise a like amount as an endowment fund.

### Charters Issued Yesterday.

A charter was issued yesterday for the Greensboro Fire Insurance Company, capital \$100,000 subscribed and \$500,000 authorized. The incorporators are J. W. Fry, D. C. Woodell, W. E. Allen, J. A. Odell, J. A. Addison, Hodgins, W. H. Ridenhour, J. S. Cox, B. L. Siden, R. R. King, A. B. Kimbell.

Another charter was to the Pipe Bending Machine Company of Charlotte, capital \$100,000 by J. W. Conway, H. S. Hall and W. H. Mead.

The Laner Club, of Tyrone, Polk county, is incorporated for literary purposes without capital. Miss LeBue and L. L. Broadman are among the incorporators.—Raleigh Post.

### Eight more Street Lights.

The light and water commission and committee of aldermen have selected locations for eight additional arc lights on the streets at the following places: Intersection of Pitt and Second streets, intersection of Greene and Third streets, intersection of Cotanch and Third streets, intersection of Latham and Fifth streets, intersection of Dickinson avenue and Moye streets, intersection of South Washington and Eleventh streets, intersection of South Cotanch and Tenth streets, and on Pitt street near Banner's lane.

### New Jersey's Tribute to New Bern's Courtesies.

"Our people can never forget, and words fail to express our appreciation of the magnificent welcome and loving reception we experienced at the hands of your loyal people. God bless and prosper them all."

The above is the language of a letter which the Journal has received from a gentleman, a member of the state commission for the erection of the monument to the Ninth New Jersey volunteers, which was dedicated at New Bern May 18th, 1905.—New Bern Journal.

Mr. C. E. Harding, of this city, has been appointed by Governor Glenn as commissary officer for the Second Battalion, Second Infantry, of the State National Guard, with the rank of lieutenant. It is a most excellent appointment, and Mr. Harding will fill the position with credit and ability.—Washington Gazette.

### Kentucky Feudists.

Lexington, Ky., May 31.—Mrs. J. B. Marcum, whose husband was assassinated in Jackson, May 4, 1903, and who got a judgment in the Clark county circuit court against James and A. H. Hargis and Edward Callahan and B. F. French for \$9,000 damages for his murder, today swore out warrants in Jackson against James Hargis, A. H. Hargis, B. F. French and Edward Callahan, charging them with the murder of James Marcum.

Sheriff Woodson McCord, of Clark county, served the warrants in Winchester this afternoon and placed the men in jail in Winchester. The case is not bailable.

The Hargises were already held under bond here for the murder of James Cockrill. The assassination of Marcum was the last of a series of murders in Breathitt county, all of which have been traced to the Hargises and their adherents. James Hargis is the county judge, Callahan is the sheriff and A. H. Hargis was formerly a state senator.

### Attempt to Assassinate King of Spain.

Paris, June 1.—An attempt to assassinate King Alfonso was made at midnight as His Majesty drove with President Loubert from a gala performance at the Grand Opera House. A bomb thrown by an anarchist exploded with deadly effect near the royal carriage. As if by a miracle, both the King and President escaped uninjured, but fragments of the missile seriously injured five persons, killed or maimed a number of cavalry horses forming the escort, and knocked out a child's eye. Intense excitement followed the incident.

The King and president retained their presence of mind. His Majesty sending back a member of his suite to make inquiry as to the condition of the wounded. The person who is believed to have thrown the bomb has been arrested, with two others who are thought to have been implicated in the plot.

### Flashed His Knife.

Washington, N. C., May 31.—The enforcement of the yagrancy law Monday night by the chief of police came near resulting in a tragedy in one instance. Armed with a warrant, the officer approached a young white man in one of the pool rooms on Water street and requested his company. The man refused to go, and, after some words, pulled a knife and threatened the chief, who promptly drew his gun and ordered the other to drop his knife. Upon his refusal to do so the officer shot at him, but did not hit him. The warrantee then dropped the knife and was led off to jail, though protesting and resisting at almost every step.—News and Observer.

The ladies were again confronted with bad weather at the lawn party and merry-go-round ride Wednesday night. The thunder squall and threatened rain a little past 9 o'clock hurried most of the crowd home and cut down receipts correspondingly, but under the circumstances they came out very well.

## VERY LONG MEALS.

**The Solemn Dinner of an Old Time English Archbishop.**  
Dinner in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries was often at 11 o'clock and supper at 4 or 5. These were very long meals, as the following anecdote from the "Arte of Rhetorike," by Thomas Wilson, will show:  
"An Italian, having a suit here in England to the archbishop of York that then was and coming to York when one of the prebendaries there brake his bread, as they term it, and thereupon made a solemn, long dinner, the which perhaps began at 11 and continued well till 4 in the afternoon, at which dinner this bishop was. It fortuned that as they were set the Italian knocked at the gate, unto whom the porter, perceiving his errand, answered that my lord bishop was at dinner."  
"The Italian departed and returned between 12 and 1. The porter answered they were yet at dinner. He came again at 2 of the clock. The porter told him they had not half dined. He came at 3 o'clock, unto whom the porter, in a heat, answered never a word, but churlishly did shut the gate upon him. Whereupon others told the Italian that there was no speaking with my lord almost all that day for the solemn dinner's sake."  
"The Italian, wondering much at such a long sitting and greatly grieved because he could not then speak with the archbishop's grace, departed straight toward London and, leaving the dispatch of his matters with a friend of his, took his journey toward Italy. Three years after it happened that an Englishman came to Rome, with whom this Italian by chance, falling acquainted, asked him if he knew the archbishop of York. The Englishman said he knew him right well. 'I pray you tell me,' quoth the Italian, 'hath that archbishop yet dined?'"

**A Nest Building Fish.**  
One of the queerest denizens of the deep and one which would very properly be called an ichthyological wonder is the gouramis, the famous nest building fish of the oriental seas. These fish are very plentiful in the waters of Cochinchina, Java, Sumatra and Borneo. At the breeding they pair off like birds and, selecting a favorable spot in shallow water among aquatic plants and grasses, build large spherical nests of floating weeds and plaster them over with mud. The broad, flat fins used in this last operation are attached to the abdomen and are wholly different from anything in the fin line known to naturalists. The full grown female gouramis is six feet long and weighs 110 pounds. The eggs of this queer fish, which are deposited in the mud plastered nest, number from 800 to 1,000.

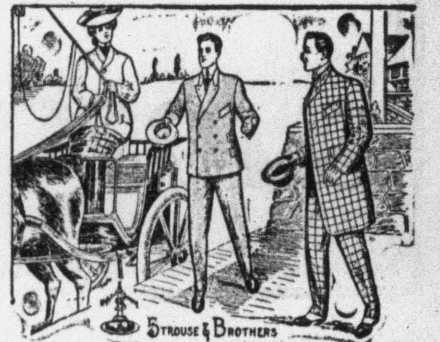

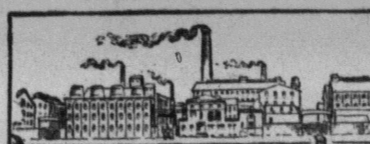
#### Corporation Commission Clerk Removed
