### MAN MURDERS A WOMAN

Otto Dehart Fatally Shoots Mrs. Pink Goode at Woodvine, Va.

Reidsville, N. C., June 6.—News has reached here of a brutal act of a drunken young man at Woodvine, just across the Virginia line.

Mrs. Pink Goode, a respectable woman, was shot to death in her own yard, the shot going through her chest.

Otto Dehart was arrested and given a preliminary hearing. He was charged with the crime and sent on to the grand jury without bail. It appears that Dehart was drunk and went to the Goode home and shot a chicken, and when Mrs. Goode protested against his conduct he put another shell into his gun and fired on her, killing her almost instantly.

He then left, but was later arrested while making his way to West Virginia. No one saw the shooting except some very small children of Mrs. Goode. Her husband was at work at a saw mill some four miles away.

Dehart claims that the shooting was accidental. He is a young man about 21 years of age. There is considerable excitement, but no danger of violence.

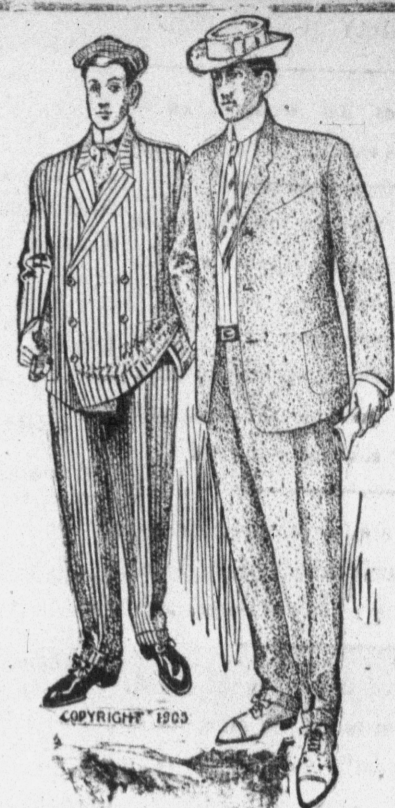
### Lawn Party.

### Newest Thing in Snakes.

A most remarkable and uncommon "flying snake" that was captured and killed at "Berry Plain," the home of Mr. John S. Dickinson, in this county, a few days ago, has attracted wide attention and excited no little interest. The curious reptile was first noticed flying about in the air with several feet of its horrid snakeship dangling around, presenting the appearance, may be, of an ordinary snake attached to a strange-looking bird.

As far as is known, it never once descended to the earth and crawled

It was finally killed and measured and proved to be five feet long, and about one inch in diameter of body. It had perfect wings of good size, and these were covered with feathers "Berry Plain," where the curious thing made its unceremonious advent and met its untimely end, is one of the finest plantations and homesteads in King George, and, being situated on the banks of the Rappahannock, it is conjectured by some that the "flying snake" may have come from an impenetrable marsh of the river or some neighboring creek.

The inventor claims that with two or three men to feed bricks and mortar into the machine and operate it, his machine will lay as many bricks as good as a dozen men can do it. It is said that it will build up a wall as if by magic and is so quickly and easily adjusted that it will skip wherever it is desired to leave openings in a wall for doors and windows. The further claims are made that the machine is not complicated, will not easily get out of order, and has been demonstrated to be such a practical and useful invention that it is sure to come into general use by contractors. It will be given a practical test on some large contract in Columbia within a few weeks.

A bricklaying machine that will do work that will stand the test as well as those laid by hand is certainly an important invention, and since there are other machines that automatically perform work of difficult nature with the assistance of men, nobody is going to doubt that the bricklaying machine has arrived or will come along later.—Wilmington Star.

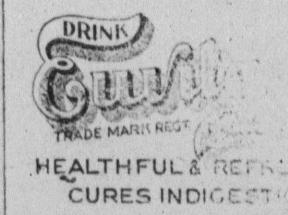
