### DOING GREAT BUSINESS

Security Life and Annuity Company of Greensboro Registers 114 Policies.

The first insurance policies to be registered with the State Insurance Commissioner under the new law were deposited yesterday.

These are from the Security Life and Annuity Company of Greensboro, and the register was made by Mr. George A. Grimsley, of Grimesley, of Greensboro, secretary of the company.

There are 114 of the policies, of value to nearly \$200,000, this representing the work of the past three weeks. The company is now doing over a quarter of a million dollars business every month and have written over a million dollars of insurance since the first of January. This is a magnificent record and it is by a North Carolina company.—Raleigh News and Observer, 16th.

### Freed From Gallows.

Reading, Pa., June 16.—After having a death warrant read to him in his cell Samuel Greason, colored, was today declared not guilty of murder and given his liberty.

Greason was attired in his black suit that was bought for him to wear on the gallows a few months ago. Then Mrs. Kate Edwards, white, also under sentence of death confessed that she had lied and that Greason was innocent and did not help her to kill her husband.

Previously she had sworn that he helped to kill John Edwards, her husband. Greason denied that he had helped to kill her husband. For over three years the woman insisted that he was guilty. Then she relented.

Today Greason's wife and the Edwards woman faced each other for the first time. Mrs. Edwards burst into a mood of tears. Greason will be taken back by his wife and they will reside together at Carlisle, Pa., Mrs. Edwards confessed that she alone had killed her husband, but that her daughter, Mary, was there. The pardon board will pass on her case next Wednesday.

One hundred employees of the granite quarry near Faith, in Rowan county, are out on a strike.

The state teachers assembly in session at Greensboro elected Dr. W. T. Whitsett president for the coming year.

W. H. Verner, of Columbia, S. C., committed suicide at Morgan Thursday. He shot himself in the temple with a pistol.

At Spring Hill, Halifax county, Friday a colored man named Eaton Williams was killed by lightning. A mule was also killed.

An old man aged 90 years came all the way from California to Raleigh in search of a son whom he thought was living in that city. He was disappointed in not finding the son and being penniless has become an object of charity.

### Section Hands Strike.

All the section hands on the Southern road between Mt. Airy and Sanford are on a strike and refuse to work unless the company puts up more cash for a day's work. The Mt. Airy News learns that only two section hands are working, and they are below Greensboro. This does not include the section masters, but they cannot do any work without hands, and the condition continues to grow worse.

**WHERE THE SHAME COMES.**
