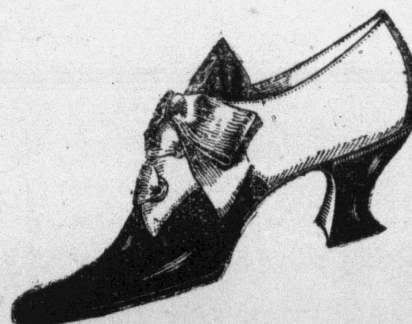

JAPS CAN'T CRUSH LINEVITCH.

Russian Opinion May Not be Held by Oyama, However, and Armistice Negotiations Continue Slow—Vladivostock Not a Ripe Apple.

St. Petersburg, July 3, 2:07 a. m.—Negotiations for an armistice between the armies of Russia and Japan, it can be definitely stated, are now in progress, presumably at Washington; but they have not reached a stage where any further announcement can be made.

The decision seems to rest with Japan, which country is weighing the relinquishment of the prospects of bettering her present advantageous position against the enormous cost of lives and money of another great battle.

The chances for a decisive and final Japanese victory, it is believed here, are no better now than before Liao Yang and Mukden, and it is pointed out that it is idle to talk of Vladivostock falling like a ripe apple into Japan's hands before the peace conference meets.

Death of Mayor Munn.

Elizabethtown, N. C., July 1.—Major Angus Munn formerly of Tar Heel, Bladen county, died in Norfolk, Va., and was buried at St. Pauls, N. C., recently. Before his death Major Munn was one of the oldest living alumni of the University of North Carolina. After his graduation he began teaching and devoted the greater part of his life to that profession. He was one of the best equipped educators of his day in North Carolina. Polished in manners, dignified in bearing, affable and courteous. His friends were limited only by the number of his acquaintances, all of whom will learn of his death with sorrow. Although possessed of great literary gifts, so quiet and reserved was he that he refrained from writing for the press save a few articles which he, with reluctance, wrote and which demonstrated his great ability as a writer.

Dewey Case Wednesday.

New Bern, N. C., July 3.—The case of Thomas Dewey will come up on Wednesday. Today counsel for Dewey moved a continuance of the case because of the appeal made to the Supreme court in the matter of the refusal of the judge to have the solicitor give a bill of particulars to the defense, but the solicitor opposed any continuance, holding the appeal to be interlocutory. The judge decided against continuance and the case is set for Wednesday.

Presidential Salaries.

That a republican form of government can be democratic in the administration of its affairs is evidenced by the fact that the late ex secretary of the navy, Paul Morton, will receive a salary as head of the Equitable double that of the President of the United States. Although The Citizen is not an advocate of extravagance in national government circles, it does believe that the pay of the chief executive of the nation is not in keeping with the dignity of his office. It has been asserted that many of our Presidents came out of the White House in comparatively poor circumstances, and we are ready to accept the truth of that statement when we look at the enormous expense which the occupant of the presidential chair has to incur. He must conduct the social functions of his office with all the pomp and ceremony of foreign courts, yet his salary is hardly more than that of a "lord-in-waiting." 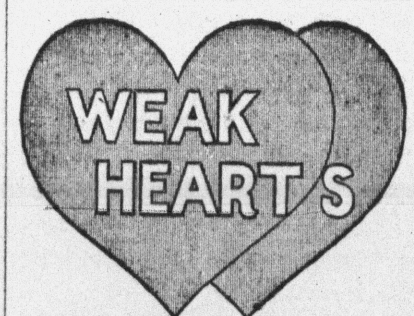

A BABOON HERO.

An Incident of a Stirring Monkey Hunt In Africa.

The German naturalist, Herr Brehm, tells this story of his adventure with baboons in Africa:

"Our dogs, beautiful, slender greyhounds, accustomed to fight successfully with hyenas and other beasts of prey, rushed toward the baboons, which from a distance looked more like beasts of prey than like monkeys, and drove them hastily up the precipices to right and left. But only the females took flight. The males turned to face the dogs, growled, beat the ground with their hands, opened their mouths wide, showed their glittering teeth and looked at their adversaries so furiously and maliciously that the hounds, battle hardened and usually bold, shrank back discomfited and almost timidly sought safety beside us.

"Before we had succeeded in stirring them up to show fight the position of the monkeys had changed considerably, and when the dogs charged a second time nearly all the herd were in safety.

"But one little monkey, about half a year old, had been left behind. It shrieked loudly as the dogs rushed toward it, but succeeded in gaining the top of a rock before they had arrived. Our dogs placed themselves cleverly, so as to cut off its retreat, and then we thought that they would catch it.

"That was not to be. Proudly and with dignity, without hurrying in the least or paying any heed to us, an old male stepped down from the security of the rocks toward the hard pressed little one, walked toward the dogs without betraying the slightest fear, held them in check with glances, gestures and sounds that seemed almost like intelligible speech, slowly climbed the rock, picked up the baby monkey and retreated with it before we could reach the spot and without the slightest attempt to prevent him on the part of the dogs.

"While the patriarch of the troop performed this brave and unselfish deed the other members, densely crowded on the cliff, uttered sounds which I had never before heard from baboons. Old and young, males and females, roared, screeched, snarled and bellowed all together, so that one would have thought that they were struggling with leopards or other dangerous beasts.

"I learned later that this was the monkeys' battle cry. It was intended to intimidate us and the dogs; possibly also to encourage the brave old giant who was running into such evident danger before their eyes."

Acids and Water.

Acids have a strong affinity for water, which they will even extract from any substance containing it with which they are brought in contact; hence when an acid comes in contact with the mucous membrane of the mouth and throat the watery secretion which keeps these parts moist and flexible is so far absorbed as to give rise to that dry, harsh and stringy sensation which is commonly spoken of as "drawing" the mouth, and so as a result a copious supply of fresh saliva is produced. Mineral acids, by their chemical action, not only draw the mouth and set the teeth on edge as they are taken, but also injure the enamel of the teeth, unless the precaution is taken to suck them in through a glass tube or quill.

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
