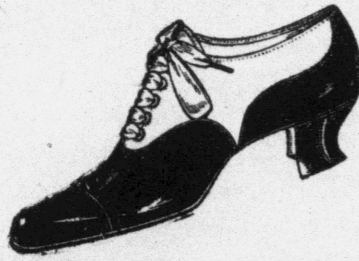

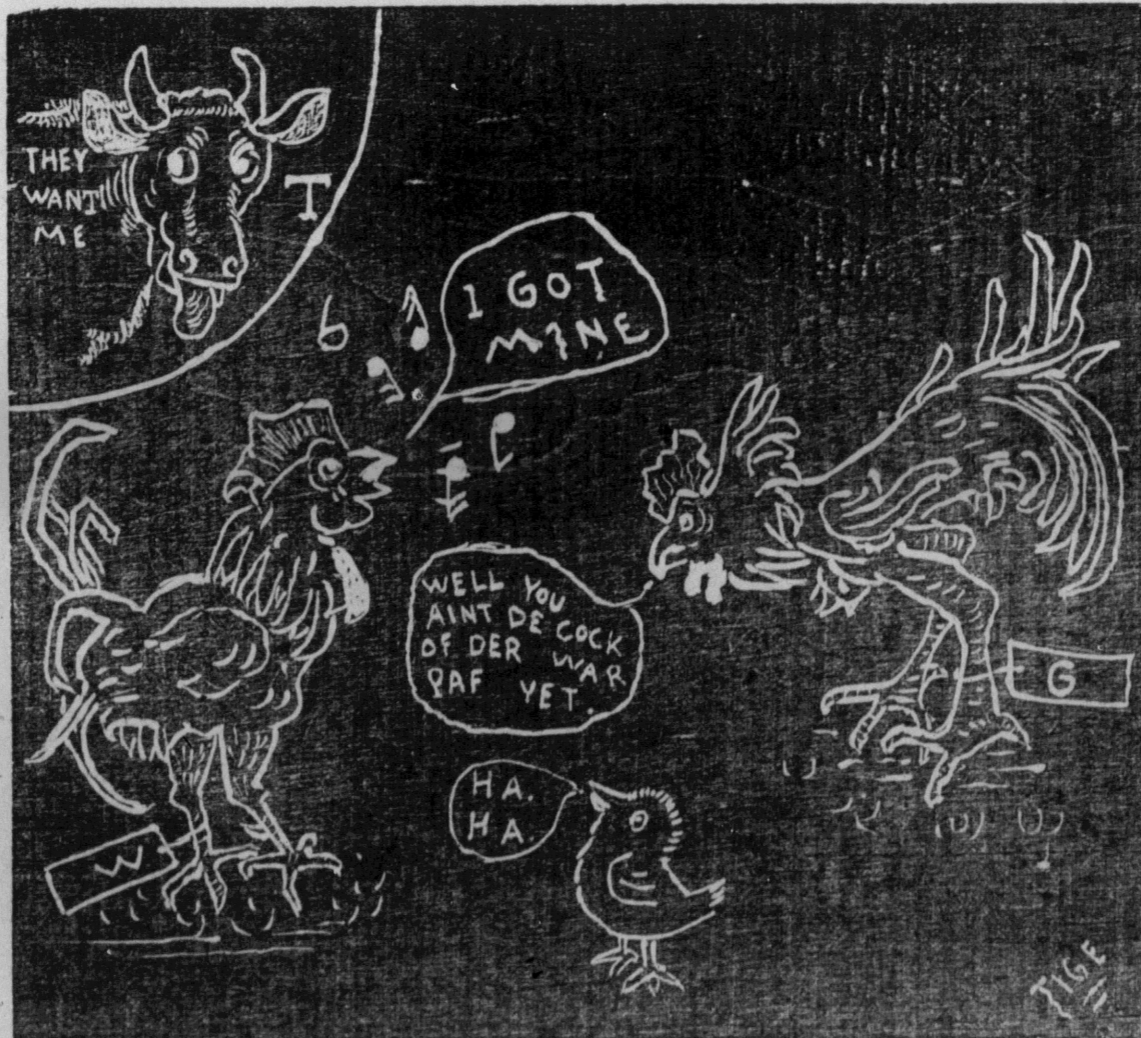

A BIG HALL IN SOCIETY.

The greatest raid in the history of American cities was made in Philadelphia Sunday night. Over 2,000 arrests were made, many of them from the most prominent families of the city. Men and women of the very highest society and with families were arrested in houses of ill fame and shame.

It is this state of affairs that is undermining American life. The best families of the country engaging in such disgrace for years, and in perfect secrecy.

Rough On Vardaman.

Yankee ingenuity is just now responsible for a Mississippi sensation that must be peculiarly embarrassing to Governor Vardaman, he who hates a "nigger" only less than he does Mr. Roosevelt. Governor Vardaman has spoken, written and lived consistently at any rate. He made his campaign on an issue against negro education, incidentally roasting the President to a turn on his negro policy, was duly elected and has had the good taste not to turn about from abuse to fawning when success came to a friend of Booker Washington. The way the sensation arose was that the Text Book Commission which Governor Vardaman created with the announced purpose of securing only such books for the schools as were free from misrepresentation of the South and the poison of negro equality, has adopted an arithmetic which is worst ever. While the books will be stricken from the list and other selections made, the mistake must be a disheartening one to the Governor.

Naturally no one looked for sectional bias in an arithmetic. Histories were carefully scanned for inaccuracies and the "readers" were subjected to searching examination. It now appears, however, that even examples in addition and multiplication may be made the vehicles for slander and abuse. Many of the examples in the arithmetic in question, which is that of Stone and Southwick, are stated to be of harmful sectional character.

For instance: "If there are five hundred and ten children in a school, and three hundred of them are white, how many colored children are there?" Like examples are numerous.

When it is recalled that the Text Book Commission was one of the Governor's pet projects, and that he appointed its members personally, the facts will be seen almost to put him into disgrace with himself. Important as the matter is, there can not be restrained a smile that this should have happened to Vardaman.

It shows the old need, however, of Southern books in the schools before there can be hope of justice. Who in the world would ever have expected to run up with social equality in an arithmetic? That is the most innocent sort of wood pile in which "nigger" has yet been discovered. Yet as long as the text books are written by folks of the Boston "cult," it may be expected that the "brother in black" will figure somewhere between the lines, if not in his natural color.—News and Observer.

"Agriculture," said George Washington, "is the most ancient, the most useful and the most noble of all the occupations of men." It would do no harm to write this in the copy books of school children. It would do no harm to frame it and hang it in college lecture rooms.

There is no occupation more full of promise to educate and ambitious young men than farming. Farmers are better off financially than any other class. They are also better off physically; and they have that proud feeling of personal independence and liberty which is beyond price. To a man of intellectual taste, specially—farming (poultry-raising, fruit culture, truck gardening, etc., offers more opportunity for reading, thinking and writing than any business or profession except preaching. It is also, when intelligently superintended, far more profitable than any farm products are higher today than before, and will be higher in the future than they are now. Towns and cities are growing apace. The bigger they get the more it takes to feed them. There is money in farming.

The successful, well-educated farmer is a power in his county. He can go to the legislature, to congress, to the governor's chair, to the United States senate. The country needs college graduates for farmers, it does not need them for lawyers, doctors or editors.—Raleigh Times.

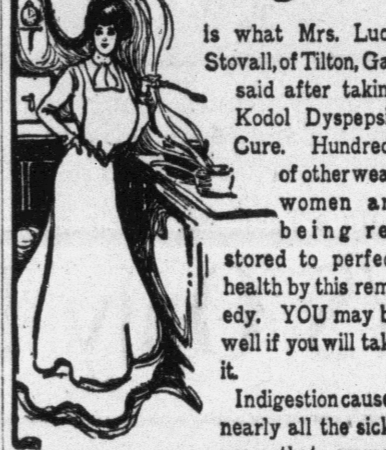
